The opening of the Fremantle Dockers' new elite training and administration facility (ETAF) at Cockburn Central West will be a significant event in the club's history, the beginning of an exciting new era for our club.

We are calling on all Fremantle Football Club members and supporters to be a part of this special moment.

After all, our history is only as good as the people who help make it.

To help fund the club's current and future strategic and community projects, including the ETAF, the club has established the Fremantle Dockers Foundation.

For more than two decades the Fremantle Football Club has proudly represented WA in the AFL competition.

In recent times we have enjoyed strong on-field results and consistent finals appearances by competing hard for our loyal members and supporters.

Outside of football, we are proud and active community members, continuously looking for ways to positively impact the lives of those within WA through football, utilising the game we love to deliver positive and healthy messages about life.

In partnership with the City of Cockburn, the State and Federal Governments and Curtin University, we have committed to a new major world-class sporting, community and education precinct at Cockburn Central West to become the future home of the Fremantle Dockers.

The facility will provide a new home for the operations

of the football club, integrated with regional sporting, leisure and educational facilities for the community.

It will also help put the club in the best possible position to achieve sustained success and to continue to contribute to the community in a meaningful way.

Members and supporters will be able to see major work starting on the site in July, following completion of work by Landcorp on base-infrastructure.

The City of Cockburn, the club and preferred building contractor

Brookfield Multiplex have been finalising the design in the first half of this year.

It is hoped the club will be able to move into the facility in early 2017.

With state-of-the-art sporting, community and educational facilities, the ETAF will be a new benchmark, both in Australia and internationally and will incorporate the following components into one integrated regional facility:

- » Administration offices for the FFC.
- » Professional permanent training facilities for the FFC and other elite athletes in the region.

- » AFL standard oval.
- » FFC retail shop and sports store.
- » Fully accessible hydrotherapy pool and aquatic recovery pools.
- » 50 metre, 10 lane, outdoor multi-purpose competition swimming and water polo pool.
- » 25 metre indoor swimming pool.
- » Regional multipurpose indoor sporting centre/indoor training centre, inclusive of six highball courts and integrated show court.
- » Program and learn-to-swim pool.
- » Children's aquatic play area and splash pad.
- » Multi-purpose community oval/pitch.
- » Community café.
- » Wellness and fitness studios including gymnasium, program rooms and rehabilitation facilities.
- » Sports medicine facilities.
- » Education facilities including lecture theatre, health and wellness laboratories, community classrooms, multimedia facility and interactive education room.
- » Community office and meeting spaces.

Fremantle Dockers Foundation ambassador Stephen Hill said the move to Cockburn Central West would help the club continue to grow on and off the field.

"To have those kind of training facilities for us to use on a daily basis will be incredibly beneficial to players," he said.

"It will help us achieve sustained success both on and off the field."



FREMANTLE DOCKERS FOUNDATION

To help fund the club's current and future strategic projects, including the elite training and administration facility (ETAF), the club has established the Fremantle Dockers Foundation.

It will focus on elite performance, including the club's move to Cockburn Central West, pathway and development programs and community engagement.

The ambassadors of the foundation are current player Stephen Hill and former captain Peter Bell.

"The club has established the Fremantle Dockers Foundation to support our many community programs and also raise funds for special projects," Bell said.

"The foundation's initial focus is funding the establishment of a new elite training and administration facility being established in conjunction with a new regional sport, recreation and education precinct at Cockburn Central West."

The Fremantle Dockers Foundation is registered with the Australian Sports Foundation (ASF), which was established by the Australian Government to assist the development of sport in Australia.

It will not just be a stand-alone facility at Cockburn Central West for Fremantle to use.

There will be massive community involvement, with more than 800,000 visitors expected to visit the City of Cockburn facility each year.

That will help us generate more supporters and engage with our fans.

There will be two training surfaces, shared with the community.

I can see a huge number of community members coming to the site to use its world-class facilities.

Football moves so quickly and inevitably we'll need to grow and at Cockburn Central West we have room for that.

On a week-by-week basis, we will be able to alter the main training ground size to suit the ground we are preparing to play on that round.

There will be world-class aquatic recovery pools, two competition standard lap swimming pools, a children's aquatic play area, a multi-purpose indoor sports centre, café, picnic areas and community meeting spaces.

We want new players to be excited about coming to the Fremantle Football Club, to the best training ground and to be a part of our culture with the aim of achieving sustained success.

It is about the next generation of players.

The next Nat Fyfe or Stephen Hill, we want to attract them and retain them.

We want all of our supporters to join in the effort for the future of our club.

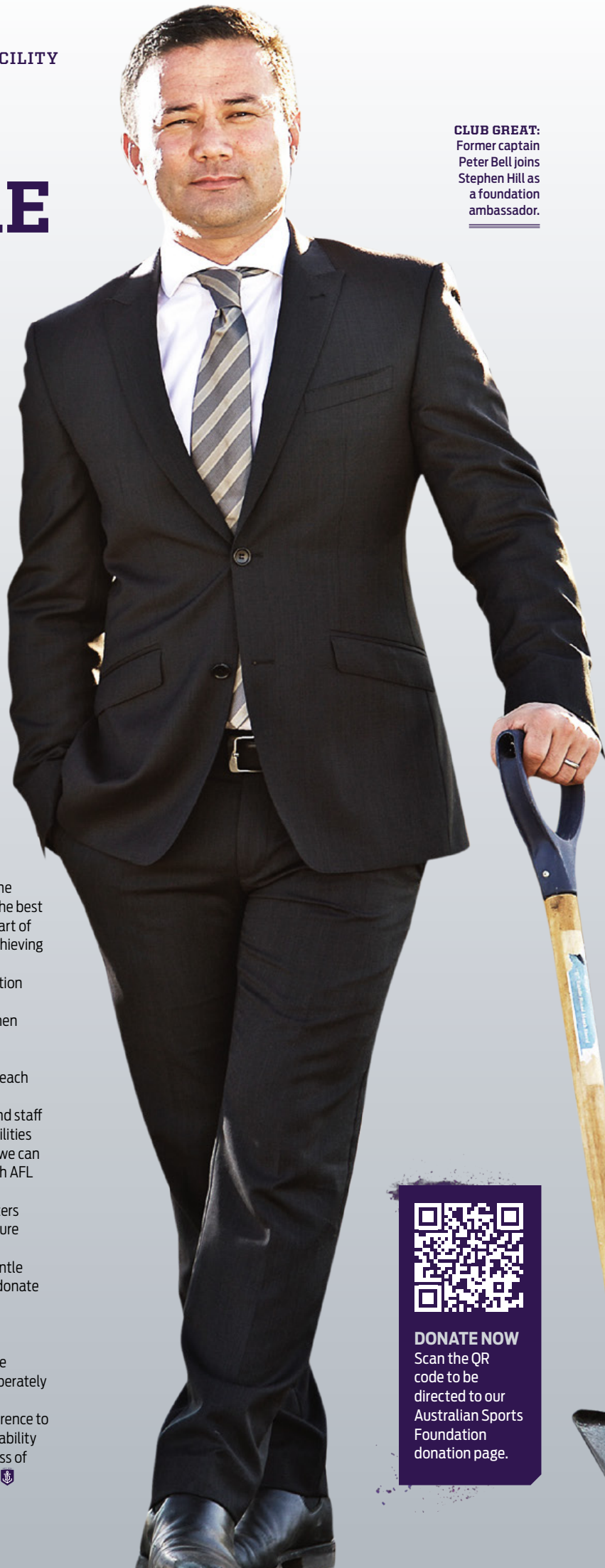

"It's been a huge eye opener," he said.

"They are incredible people for what they've done over the past 19 years."

Bev and John Lowe started the charity after the couple spotted a group of homeless people in Perth.

"We were driving down Newcastle Street and it was raining. I noticed a group of people sitting under these trees," Bev said.

"We came back five hours later and they were still there.

"I said John let's go home and make soup, that's how Manna Inc started."

Now with about 200 volunteers, Manna has become a critical lifeline for many across the city.

As well as serving up food, Griffin also used his time to help hand out clothing as part of the group's soup van.

"We're here giving out some food and gear, some beanies and scarves," he said on the night.

"I'm really proud and honoured to be part of what they're doing here.

"It's amazing what it has turned out to be today."

IRISH RECRUIT'S LONG ROAD TO AFL FREO

Sean Hurley never thought he would
play AFL football, until a phone call
one night.

Fremantle is a long way from the rolling, green pastures of rural Ireland. For Freo's Irish recruit Sean Hurley, the move from the small rural village of Johnstownbridge to suburban South Fremantle marked the start of a dream of one day playing an AFL match.

It's a dream that has brought the 23-year-old thousands of kilometres around the world, away from family and friends.

Hurley's move to Australia nearly didn't happen, if not for a last minute phone call from Gaelic and AFL champion Tadhg Kennelly.

"I was about 19 and Tadhg Kennelly rang my dad and told him he was interested in getting me to a draft camp," he said.

"I had a Gaelic game the next day for Kildare and I told Tadhg that I couldn't do it because I had an important game.

"He urged me to come along anyway and he picked about 20 from 50 that day and I got through.

"That really opened my eyes to the whole AFL system, before that I didn't really understand what it was all about."

Hurley joins a growing list of Irish recruits trying to break into the AFL, following in the footsteps of trailblazers such as Jim Stynes and Kennelly.

He was initially trialled by Carlton when he was 17 but was not drafted.

The Blues opted for fellow Irishman Zach Tuohy before Hurley trialled with Fremantle in 2013.

In late 2014, his hard work paid off and he was offered a rookie contract with Fremantle.

"I was disappointed I couldn't get drafted after my trial, I waited a year and now I'm in Australia," he said.

"When I was younger, I never thought I'd be playing Aussie Rules in Australia.

"I liked Freo, I like the place, I liked the lads and what they stood for."

It was no small decision to come to Australia for Hurley.

It meant leaving his promising Gaelic career, plus his family and friends.

However, the chance at a professional sports career was too big a chance to ignore.

"It's been a breath of fresh air coming over here to focus on my football and then having time to fit in university," he said.

Hurley is currently completing a Bachelor of Commerce degree at Curtin University.

In Ireland, Gaelic players must balance a sports career with a regular full-time job and it can be a difficult task.

"Gaelic is pretty much professional as you sacrifice a lot in your life," he said.

"You do recovery and training like AFL but you don't get paid for it.

"We didn't have all the benefits of a professional but you're trying to replicate that.

"If I took time off work, work would be upset with me, if I didn't train then the team would be upset with me."

Moving from the self-described "small country village" of Johnstownbridge, about 40km east of Dublin, to bustling Fremantle has been a dramatic change.

"Everything here seems to surround coffee, when are you going to have your next coffee?" he joked.

"At home it would be a cup of tea."

Hurley comes from a family of farmers and he still owns about 10 cattle on the 36-hectare farm.

The last time he visited his family was at Christmas.

"My mum was sending me pictures of calves last night," he said.

"It's really enjoyable when I get out on the farm with my dad.

"Working on the farm is a great break from everything, getting away, getting your own space."

There is an amusing story about when Hurley first arrived at the club in 2014 relating to his beloved cows.

Hurley was finalising his paperwork with Fremantle office staff and was asked whether he needed an advance to cover initial expenses.

He quickly replied that he had sold some cows before moving to Australia so was sorted financially.

"Owning cattle is better than putting savings in the bank or shares," he said.

Hurley's love affair with farm animals started when he was very young.

He says the fresh milk from his grandfather's dairy helped him reach his height of 196cm.

"My grandad had a small dairy farm," he said.

"If anyone asked me how I grew so tall or don't get sick, I tell them it's the unpasteurised milk my dad used to bring straight from the cows.

"It's not the wisest thing to do these days, drink unpasteurised milk, but it helped me grow up tall, fit and healthy."

Whatever the method that got him here, Hurley is already making a mark and has become a popular figure at the club.

But he admits adapting to the AFL system and skills set, especially the oval ball, is a work in progress.

"I'm getting better every game and learning new things every game," he said.

"The flight of the ball is different, the oval ball comes in motions, the round ball comes into my hands easier."

The best advice he has received, so far, came from a reliable source in two-time Doig Medallist Nat Fyfe.

"Fyfe told me that any time you have the chance to have a ball in your hand is a good chance," he said.

"If you see Fyfe during a warm up or before training, he always has a ball in his hands.

"It's good advice from a superstar."

The tackling and roughness of the AFL is renowned around the world, including Ireland, and adapting to the physicality has been a bumpy ride.

"You tackle the ball rather than the man in Gaelic, here you just go for the man," he said.

"Taking a mark at home, I jumped around guys to take the mark.

"Here you're meant to jump through them.

"You don't know if you're going to get a knee in the head."

Hurley has impressed with his fitness, setting the third fastest time in the 3km pre-season time trial.

"Fitness is one of my strengths," he said.

"Though I've had some stress reactions to the training load."

It was a shock to his system taking part in his first few trainings sessions.

However, Hurley said he was surprised by how well the Freo staff manage player workloads.

"My body had to adapt a little bit to the workload," he said.

"They manage training so well, they don't burn you out and it's really structured.

"At home our training would go for two and a half hours, you'd run as hard as you can until you couldn't run anymore."

Hurley is being groomed to be a key position defender and has been learning the ropes of the back line, initially playing for Peel Thunder reserves and then progressing into the league team.

Adapting to life as a defender has been hard for the Gaelic forward, who loved nothing more than kicking a goal.

"My new satisfaction is to get a spoil, or take a mark and give a good spread of the ball," he said.

"At home, the satisfaction would have been sell a dummy on a lad and kick a score."

Hurley is learning the defensive craft under the wing of experienced defender Zac Dawson.

"Zac takes me aside and goes through my vision with me and that's helped me," he said.

Hurley said the whole playing group and coaching staff had been extremely supportive and encouraging as he grasped learning a new sport.

"Sometimes I'll make an error at training and get down, one of the lads will always invite me over for dinner if I'm a bit down," he said.

"The lads have been good over here, I've never been pushed to the point of being homesick."

While most young adults in their early-twenties are still living at home, Hurley has moved across the world, away from his childhood home.

He concedes it has been tough, but it did not take long to feel at home at Fremantle.

"Of course I miss my family and friends, especially when times are tough," he said.

"I have a good group of friends since I've come over here and that

makes it easy to settle in, there's always a friend there to call if you want to go the beach or cinema."

Hurley said it was a long road for international recruits in the AFL, but he wanted to be treated like any rookie, whether Australian-born or not.

"We're not here to just be the Irish guy trying to learn the game," he said.

"We've been kicking the ball since we were young as well.

"Sometimes I don't like the way, if I do something wrong and get upset with myself, coaches might say you've only been playing the game for four months.

"I want to be as good as or better than the person next to me, I don't want any excuses."

Hurley said his dream is to replicate Kennelly's remarkable feat of winning an AFL premiership and an All Ireland Championship.

"That would be something I'd love to do," he said.

"Maybe one day I can break the line and put it into Matthew Pavlich, maybe in a couple of years.

"For now I keep on dreaming and see how we go." 🏈

It is safe to say, if Lachie Neale wasn't playing AFL footy for Fremantle, he'd be doing something involving sport.

The sports-mad midfielder has been put in the spotlight this season after an impressive start to the year, including a game-high of 42 touches against West Coast, that earned him his second Ross Glendinning Medal.

If he is not at the club training, he's likely to be playing a leisurely round of golf or watching soccer or basketball on television.

But nothing comes close to his passion for footy.

As it does with many fans, the love of the game started at a young age for Neale.

Growing up in rural Kybybolite in South Australia, he was a die-hard Port Adelaide fan.

He remembers turning his toy room into a make-believe football stadium and playing out Port's entire fixture, including finals.

"Mum has a few stories about me around the house, back in Naracoorte," he said.

"I setup my toy room as a field, with the doors at either end being goals.

"I pretended I was Port Adelaide, running around playing the games.

"I'd write out the full fixture and then play every game as Port.

"I think I started that when I was about four or five and kept going until I was about 10, which is embarrassing."

Neale said his life had been focused on fulfilling his dream of playing AFL.

"Playing footy is something I always dreamed of growing up and everything through my life has been footy focused," he said.

Neale said both his parents had supported his footy since he was a junior.

"Dad was playing at a pretty high level in the country and was always playing games," he said.

"He'd kick the ball with me all the time when I visited when I was younger."

Incredibly, Neale was playing under-14s when he was just 10.

"I was always the smallest in the team, I played in the forward pocket," he said.

"When I grew up and got a bit bigger I started playing in the midfield and have stayed there since."

Neale's life was destined to involve sport, he was not just a talented footy player but a promising basketballer.

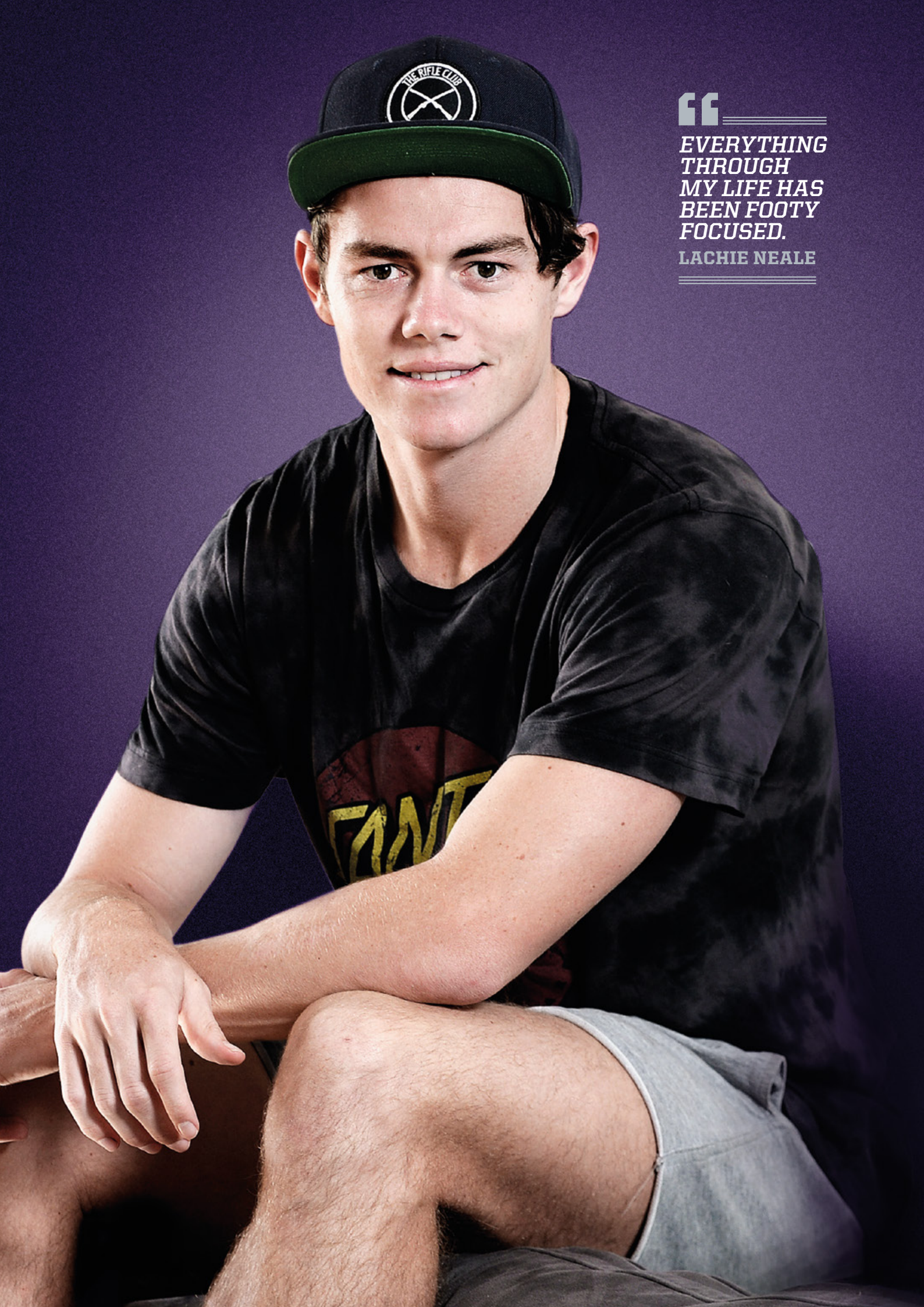
"I loved basketball when I was younger and played a lot," he said.

"But obviously I was too short."

Neale was not even certain he would be drafted into the AFL.

"Even a couple of years out of the draft, I was an ok player, never a standout, but it didn't look like it was going to happen, but luckily it did," he said.

He has proved a valuable pickup for Fremantle, and surely left other clubs

wondering how he slipped through to pick 58.

Neale was recruited from Glenelg in 2011 and debuted the following year in Round 4 against St Kilda.

While he was sad to leave home, Neale said he hoped to be drafted to a club outside of South Australia and Freo was his first choice.

"There were probably only five or six teams that showed interest," he said.

"I wanted to get away from Adelaide and start fresh and really concentrate on my footy.

"Coming over here and really just concentrating on my footy gave me the best opportunity."

Neale moved to Perth and lived with a host family, the Cowalds.

"The club is fantastic how it runs the host families, it made the transition very easy," he said.

"My family get over here and support me and I still speak with mum and dad on the phone, once or twice a week.

Now living in Hamilton Hill, he said Perth is feeling much more like home.

The walls and shelves of his home are an insight into his attitude to life.

Proudly hung on his lounge room wall is his first Ross Glendinning Medal.

Below that is a table with photos of his family and books.

While he has developed a hard edge on field, Neale is modest and measured off, enjoying time away from the game.

Among his favourite pleasures is picking up a good book.

"I love reading as well, I've always got a book that I'm reading at any given time," he said.

"I'm reading Jim Stynes' book at the moment, it's a really good one.

"I love autobiographies and dad always gets me one for my birthday or Christmas."

Sport is never far away though.

"I love soccer and the NBA," he said.

"I'm a Manchester United supporter. My grandad got me onto them from a very early age, so I didn't really have a choice.

"I've been to England, my grandad has taken me to Old Trafford a few times and watched the Red Devils in action."

NBA is also a must-watch, including his much-loved Golden State Warriors.

"When I was in year 11 at school, I didn't have a team and I was watching a college game," he said.

"I saw a bloke named Steph Curry playing for Davidson Wildcats and he scored about 40-odd points.

"I thought he's going to get drafted and whatever team he goes to, that's who I'm going to support.

"He went at pick seven to the Warriors, so I said rightio, that's my team."

It was a good choice, with Curry named the NBA's Most Valuable Player this season.

"A few of the boys give me grief, saying that I'm jumping on the bandwagon but I've been following them for seven years," he said.

Neale has drawn praise from plenty of football pundits including Hawthorn legend Dermott Brereton, who said Neale was the most underestimated player in the AFL.

"I think Derm was a bit off the mark with his comments, I'm sure there are plenty of other players who that fits better," he said.

Neale said his focus has been on tackling this year, working with assistant coach Brett Kirk in the pre-season.

"I've been more focused on my tackling and body work," he said.

"I'm certainly sticking a few more this year.

"The last few years I was letting a few go and it was turn-style type tackling."

Neale passed his 50 games milestone earlier this season, with Freo hoping for many more, but said he still gets a few butterflies before each game.

"I'm pretty relaxed," he said.

"The only time I really get nervous is when I start on the bench, I get a little bit of a sick feeling in my stomach.

"But that goes away as soon as the ball is bounced pretty much and I'm standing up, waiting to go on."

He keeps busy on and off the field this season, studying economics at Notre Dame on his day off.

"Hayden Crozier and I are actually in the same class at the moment doing economics," he said.

"We get up and go to the beach in the morning for recovery and then get some breakfast, then head into university."

The WA lifestyle suits Neale's laid-back attitude and the transition from South Australia was a breeze.

"I was excited to come to WA when I was drafted," he said.

"I have some family over here on dad's side and I had talked to them before the Draft and told them I may be heading over."

But nothing is better than heading back to South Australia and spending some time on the family farm in Naracoorte.

"I love getting back home and seeing my family and friends," he said.

"Especially going back to the farm where I spent most of my years growing up.

"Seeing all the dogs, little brothers and sisters, mum and my step-dad.

"It's a sanctuary to go back there and spend a few days or few weeks, especially in the off-season.

"It's a really good place to just unwind and spend some quality time with the family."

3/4 cup (180ml) milk
50g butter



PROCESS

- 1 Mix flour and sugar in a bowl.
- 2 Beat in the egg and then add a little milk until batter is smooth and lump-free.
- 3 In a hot pan brush some butter over the cooking surface and pour 1/4 cup measures for each pancake.
- 4 When large bubbles form on the surface, flip them over and cook until lightly golden on the other side.

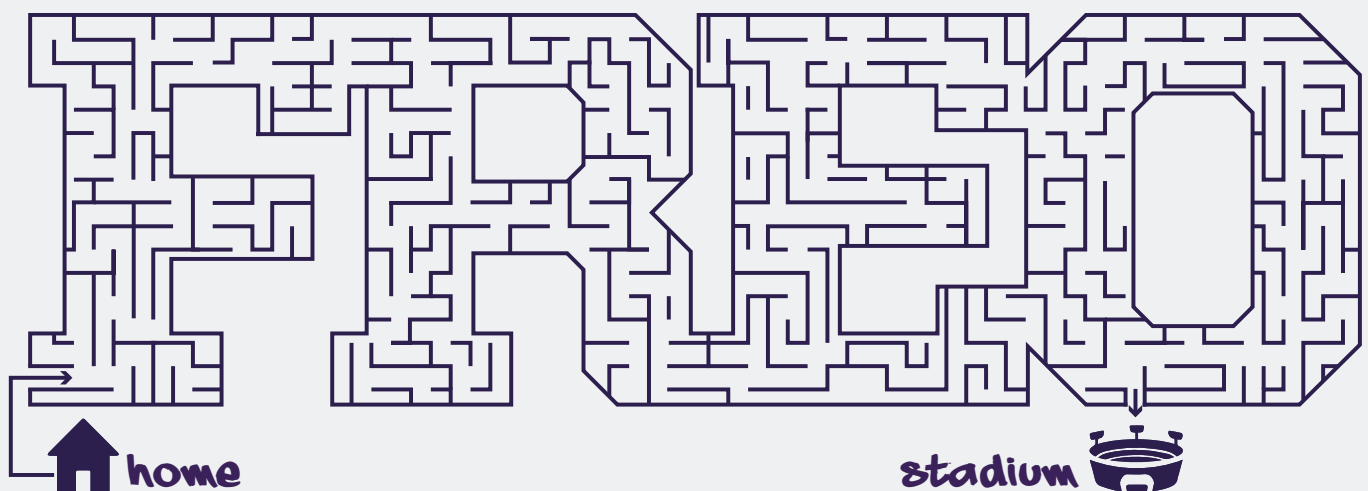
