
LOVE IS

t is a typical Monday night in suburban Perth. The kitchen is bustling with noise and movement, as the final preparations for dinner are made.

Children are busily drawing and playing while the parents chat.

It is a scene oozing in normality, but for football families it is precious time to savour, squeezed into a busy and demanding work schedule.

Fremantle players Danyle Pearce, Michael Walters and Michael Johnson regularly get together with their families for a meal or play-date.

It has become a vital part of the routine for the family focused trio.

This particular week. Fremantle assistant coach Roger Hayden and his family joined them.

"We spend every second weekend away from the family, which is tough, so these moments are precious," Pearce said.

"Sonny (Walters) and I catch up once a week because he literally lives over my back fence."

The bond between the families is crucial for the partners too, who are left to hold the fort while the players travel for interstate fixtures.

"Our partners are really close, they look after the kids while we're at training and travelling away," Johnson said.

"It's good because they get around each other and support each other."

This season alone, Fremantle players have spent about 30 nights interstate.

Johnson said it was difficult to miss out on moments many dads may take for granted, like children's birthdays.

"There have been times I've been away, I've missed children's birthdays or birthday parties," he said.

"It is a bit tough but it's part of the job."

All three players agreed that family offered a refuge and sense of normality to the rigid football life.

At 24, Michael Walters is the youngest dad of the trio.

His family has been the driving force behind his rise through the AFL ranks to become arguably one of the best small forwards in the competition.

Walters was famously sent back to play with WAFL club Swan Districts in 2012 for not meeting the club's requirements.

No one doubted his talent but he needed to improve his off-field work.

From there, Walters had to fight his way back and the spark that ignited that burning desire was simple – to provide for his young family.

"My partner puts up with me. that's hard enough," he said.

"She looks after two young kids when I'm away or at training.

"Marnie does the hard yards.

"She does an amazing job, my sole goal is to provide for her and my daughters because that's my job as a father."

His family is the first thing that comes to mind, when he needs extra inspiration to lift a heavy weight or run that little bit harder to chase down an opponent.

'They are always in my thoughts," he said.

"I run out each week through the banner knowing it's my job to provide for them.

"Every time I kick a goal and celebrate, I think of them."

Walters said the club, in particular senior coach Ross Lyon, was extremely supportive.

"Ross is really supportive,"

"He has his own kids, so knows the important of that balance.

"He really drives it amongst the boys, that family is crucial."

Despite his hard-nosed perception, Walters said Lyon was very understanding of players with families.

"Ross really pushes us to be good family men," Walters said.

"There has been a real focus on families at the club since Ross has come here.

"If I need to help out at home, I can leave earlier or come in later and do what I have to do.

"It's really supportive."

That is a sentiment echoed by Pearce and Johnson, too.

'We're becoming a much more family orientated club, as more players are having kids," Johnson said.

"It's great how the club has embraced families."

Heading into Fremantle's change rooms after a game, you might be mistaken for thinking it is a crèche.

Children nearly outnumber players.

"Ross has supported having kids in the rooms after the game," Walters said.

"The other boys, who aren't dads, love it too."

Walters said one team mate, in particular, was a favourite among the children.

"Mayney (Chris Mayne) is a big kid really," he said.

"He is always the first to come say hello to the kids and have a joke with them.

"They love having him around and messing about in the rooms."

Johnson said when he first started playing there were hardly any children around the club.

"I remember my first child, nine years ago, there weren't too many kids around then," he said.

"There are a lot of players, especially the older guys, with young kids.

"They really enjoy coming into the change rooms after the games.

"It's a great initiative."

Johnson has had to balance fatherhood with football for the majority of his career after the birth of Ameliah in 2006 when he was 22.

Nothing is a better reward after a long slog on the track than coming home to his family.

"Every time I come home in the afternoon it's a real relief." he said.

"There is always something to do with the kids.

"It's a nice change from the footy lifestyle."


Johnson said family was invaluable when times were tough on the field

"My family keep me focused,"

"Especially after a loss, it's always a nice change."

Johnson said he was like any other father and doted on his children.

"Saturday is netball, Sunday is Auskick," he said.









"Dancing pops up here and there too which I can't help with if I'm away." Johnson said working most weekends each year, gave him time

mid-week to spend with his children. "On my day off, I like to drop them off and pick them up from school,"

he said.

Pearce, often the chef at the family get-togethers, said the families have created a support group for each other.

with whatever they are up to."

It is a particularly vital network for Pearce, who brought his family from South Australia to WA, when he left Port Adelaide in 2012.

"All the kids are close friends, they do crèche together and are all similar ages," he said.

"One of us cooks each week, we all come together and catch up."

During away trips, the Pearces often have a sleep over at the Walters' place.

"The kids are all the same age, so they get on really well and have a great time playing and mucking around together," he said.


It is hard not to bring disappointment home after a loss, according to Pearce, but a smile from one of his children soon lifts his mood.

"When we lose, it's hard not to take it home," he said.

"But the family is a great focus away from footy.

"If the results aren't going our way, it's nice to come home.

"Family is always there, win or lose."

UP AND RUNNING



he Fremantle Dockers Foundation was established in June, 2015 to support the important on and off field work of the Fremantle Football Club.

The four key pillars that are supported by the foundation are:

- » Community engagement and social inclusion
- » Elite performance and sustained on field success
- » Pathway and development programs for aspiring athletes
- » Securing the club's future

Already this year we have seen the foundation support the club's Freo Footy Skills program involving thousands of young participants.

The program is delivered to thousands of students in primary schools across the State each year and involves three different football skill competitions: Freo Kwik Kick, Freo Long Bomb and Freo Fast Ball.

On Sunday 2 August, 2015 the program culminated in a Grand Final on the turf at Domain Stadium as a curtain raiser to the round 18 win over Greater Western Sydney.

One of the foundation's primary focuses is funding the construction of the club's new elite training and administration facility (ETAF) at Cockburn Central West.

The ETAF project took a significant step on Wednesday 21 July when Premier Colin Barnett, Fremantle president Steve Harris, City of Cockburn mayor Logan Howlett and Minister for Sport and Recreation Mia Davies officially

broke ground at the site that will become the club's base from 2017.

The facility will provide current and future Fremantle players with world-class training facilities and at the same time create a genuine link with the community.

Fremantle Dockers members and supporters have already got on-board to support the foundation. We encourage fans to continue to help us build a football club that current and future generations will always be proud of by donating to the Fremantle Dockers Foundation.

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
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t is a long way from the bright lights of AFL football, but for Clancee Pearce. listening to the stories of residents at Wandoo Reintegration Facility has been illuminating.

Pearce spends nearly every Monday at the Murdoch centre, talking with residents who are in the final stages of their prison sentences

"We talk about their relationships with family and how they are going at the centre." he said.

"I sit in on the programs on how they want to improve aspects of their life and learn new skills."

More than 70 male residents aged 18 to 28 are housed at the centre, where they can further their education and training, learn life skills and gain employment opportunities.

It is the first centre in WA that caters specifically for young men.

Through the AFL Sports Ready Program, Pearce is offering a compassionate ear to the residents while gaining valuable work experience.

"I wanted to do this because last year I did my diploma in youth work and I wanted to get some work experience and do some more hands on stuff," he said.

Pearce said he was a little apprehensive about how the residents would react to him when he first visited.

"It was a bit of an eve opener at first but the residents have been good," he said.

"I expected them to be a little bit more stand-off-ish but they are open and happy to have a chat about football and life.

"They are really open for people to come in and listen to their stories.

"Of course, they love talking football. too."

The passion for counselling work was sparked by his uncle, who works as a prison officer in WA.

"He has told me some stories about prisoners and how he's helped them," he said.

"It's a good feeling for him when they appreciate what he does with them," he said.

"I'm just following in his footsteps." It is not just the residents who are learning from Pearce but he is also finding out how a handful of bad life choices can lead into

a debilitating cycle. "The residents are focused on

getting on the right track," he said. "I've learned about the life decisions they've made.

"They may not be bad people but just made a few wrong decisions.

"They are trying to refocus and stay on the right track.

"It's an important message for everyone, when times get tough to refocus and make the right decision."

remantle has been kicking goals on and off the field this season. Thanks to the Harcourts Foundation more than \$13,000 has been raised to help support children with Dyslexia this season through the 'Kick a Goal for Literacy' campaign.

As part of the campaign, the Harcourts Foundation has donated \$50 to the Dyselxia-Speld Foundation (DSF) and The Mo, Evie and Otis Maslin Foundation for every goal booted by Freo

The Maslin Foundation was formed to honour the memories of the three Maslin children who tragically died in the Malaysian Airlines disaster over Ukraine.

Otis had only just been diagnosed with dyslexia at the time of the tragedy.


DSF chief executive Mandy Nayton said the funds raised would be used to support disadvantaged children with literacy difficulties.

The Dyslexia-SPELD Foundation is delighted with the Fremantle Dockers' performance this season," Nayton said.

"Students leaving school with low levels of literacy are less likely to find employment or proceed to further education.

They are more likely to have mental health problems, drug-related issues or become involved in anti-social behaviour.

"The funds raised through the 'Kick a Goal for Literacy' campaign will be used to prevent this occurring for some of the students currently struggling to learn to read and write."

s part of the Heartkids WA 'Cuppa Campaign' the club hosted some special guests for morning tea in August.

Twelve HeartKids and their families watched a training session at Freo Oval and spent time with Max Duffy, who is an ambassador for the foundation.

"It was great to see the kids down here enjoying the morning," Duffy said.

"Sometimes you can get caught up in it all, and then you meet these kids and you're reminded of how lucky you are.'

Ross Lyon also spoke about the importance of the foundation and acknowledged it was a worthy cause to support.

"There are eight babies born everyday with a heart condition," Lyon said.

HeartKids WA is encouraging people to host their own Cuppa for HeartKids event with family, friends, school or workmates throughout the month of September.



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

he rise of Alex Pearce

t 198cm Alex Pearce would not have been out of place in many sporting arenas. The handy golfer and cricketer has been a revelation for Fremantle in 2015.

But surprisingly, the Tasmanian product originally set his sights on a career in cricket and, if not for a fateful opportunity when he was 16, may never have played AFL.

"At one stage I chose cricket as a potential career when I was in under-16 level." he said.

The emerging tall said he even missed the highly competitive try-outs for the under-16 Tasmanian State football team because he wanted to play a cricket game for his local club.

"On one of the try-out days for footy, I had a local game of cricket," he said.

"It was cricket season, so
I thought, no I'm not going,
I'm playing cricket."
It would be more than 12 months
later that Pearce's trajectory swung
back to football.

"I wasn't asked to try-out for State footy the following year," he said.

"It was later in the season, afte playing senior footy for my local club, that I was asked to play for Tassie in the under-16s.

"That was when I thought it could become a career.
"I probably could have made

it a bit easier for myself by choosing football earlier on.

'It was pretty lucky in the end, the opportunity I got to play in that under-16 comp.
"It was clear that footy was

going to be the opportunity to go a bit further."

Pearce has earned wide praise since his debut in round 6 against Essendon at Domain Stadium.

Taken at pick 37 in the 2013 National Draft, he has become a versatile swingman for Fremantle, spending time learning the ropes in the back and forward line.

Adjusting to the rigours of AFL football has been a relatively simple change for the 21-year-old, who shows maturity beyond his years.

"Week on week I've become more comfortable playing AFL," he said.

"I've said to a lot of people leading up to my first game, I wasn't as nervous as I thought I would be.

"I feel as though I've been able" to settle in reasonably well."

Pearce grew up in Ulverstone, on Tasmania's north-west coast.

The small seaside town, 21km west of Devonport, has a population of just over 6000.

The regional town has nurtured its fair share of sportsmen, among them Melbourne forward David Neitz, Australian cricketer Ben Hilfenhaus and international tennis player Richard Fromberg.

"I loved growing up there," Pearce said.

"Growing up with all my school mates.

"A lot of my time was involved in footy and cricket for my school

and Ulverstone. "I loved it then and I love it now." Pearce's afternoons and weekends were spent playing a variety of sports.

He would play cricket, football, soccer and compete in little athletics.

Some of his AFL heroes growing up were Carlton legend Anthony Koutoufides, Brisbane premiership player Jonathan Brown and St Kilda captain Nick Riewoldt.

There was also one forward in particular who Pearce loved to watch in action and he now lines up alongside him. Fremantle captain Matthew Pavlich.

"I used to love watching those big power forwards," he said.

You can tell when you play with or against those guys like Pav and Nick, why they're the best.

"It's a great learning experience at the start of my career.

Pearce has spent much of the second half of the season playing as a tall target inside-50.

It comes naturally to Pearce, who was predominantly a forward before he was drafted.

"The last couple of years of juniors I played forward," he said.

"I enjoy playing up forward a little bit more than defence.

"As a junior I played in every position.

"I like being able to be thrown around the ground a little bit more.

"It helps me maintain my spot by being able to play more than one position.

"That's something I pride myself on."

Versatility is one word to sum up Pearce.

While most are not born with any natural sporting talents, Pearce seems to be a master of many.

On his day off, he tries to fit in a round of golf before university, where he is studying for a commerce degree.

"I play a fair bit of golf," he said.

"I played in Tassie and I've paired up with Max Duffy and we play a fair bit at Point Walter."

While his professional cricketing days may be behind him, he still enjoys some backyard hits with team mates in the off-season.

However, despite his tall frame, that rivals legendary Australian fast bowler Glen McGrath, he was not a pace bowler but a batting all-rounder.

"I bowled medium pace, I wasn't quick enough to be a pace bowler," he said.

'We have a backyard cricket comp in the off-season with

"I follow the cricket pretty closely, I keep up-to-date with what's going on.

"Other than footy, it's the sport I enjoy the most."

In a remarkable coincidence, Pearce grew up playing with and against fellow Fremantle listed players, Brady Grey and Lachie Weller.

"Brady and I played soccer, cricket and football against each other," he said.

"We first played cricket together for representative sides, it wasn't until a bit later that we played football together for the under-18 Tassie side.

"We were always competing against each other but we always got on really well.

"Brady was a good cricketer.

"We were captaining sides against

each other, Brady even made a State side when he was younger.

"I remember playing soccer against Lachie when I was younger, he played footy and little athletics."

Pearce said the bond between the three from the Apple Isle had grown since they arrived at Fremantle within 12 months of each other.

"We know the same people back home and keep up-to-date with the local footy competitions," he said.

"It's a great story that we've all ended up at Fremantle."

WA is now home for the trio. Pearce had not even visited the State before

he was drafted in 2013. "My first visit was when I was drafted," he said.

"I didn't know anyone here, I'd spoken to Fremantle a little bit.

There were three or four clubs I thought I might be going to."

Before the draft he knew there were clubs interested but was still oblivious to where he may end up, if he was drafted at all.

"Going into the draft. I didn't want to build it up too much because I thought there was a good chance I wouldn't get picked up at all," he said.

"Getting picked up by Freo was a good surprise.

"I was watching the draft live with my immediate family, uncles and aunties, grandparents and all that.

"It was a pretty special time.

Pearce said it was a surreal moment when he heard Fremantle general manager of player management Brad Lloyd read out his name.

"Being able to play on Pav at training has been a big help.

"We often have conversations on the track or straight after we've come off the track on what I did well and what I did wrong.

"To have that feedback from one of the best ever is definitely helpful.

"Luke has helped me ever since I walked through the door too.

"Learning defence from him and being able to play alongside him has been a huge help

"I try to take on board as much as I can and learn from both of them."

Coincidentally, it was an injury to McPharlin that opened the door for Pearce to debut in front of a packed home crowd against Essendon in round 6.

His first kick received a rousing cheer from the vocal supporters.

"During the game I tried not to take note of the crowd too much," he said.

"I didn't want to get over-awed by it. "I wanted to be as focused as

I could to do what I had to do. "Once the siren had sounded, I tried to take it in a little bit,

walk around and take in the crowd and the atmosphere."

With Pavlich and McPharlin nearing the end of their careers, Fremantle fans will surely hope they will be cheering this promising talent for years to come. 🐠









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




