



n Wednesday

The RAP acknowledges
Fremantle's proud Indigenous
history and demonstrates the
club's commitment to reconciliation,
which the Australian Government
defines as being about unity
and respect between Aboriginal
and Torres Strait Islanders and
non-Indigenous Australians.

To coincide with the launch, the club also released a one-off designed jumper that the team wore in its Indigenous Round clash against Melbourne at Patersons Stadium on Sunday 26 May.

CEO Steve Rosich said that, as an AFL club, Freo recognised that with its profile came responsibility.

He added that the club embraced this duty and saw the RAP as a vehicle to underpin the club's efforts to promote reconciliation both within the organisation and the broader community.

"We see the Reconciliation Action Plan as an extension of our club behaviours, particularly those of

respect, inclusion and a commitment to do as we say," he said.

"Football is a great vehicle for strengthening relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians both on and off the field.

"The club's Reconciliation Action Plan allows us to formally acknowledge our Indigenous links and provides us with the opportunity to honour the many Indigenous players who have represented this proud football club."

One of Freo's major sponsors, Woodside, has prepared two RAPs dating back to 2010.

Executive director Rob Cole, who was present at the launch, called Freo's RAP a "first-class product".

"We've had positive feedback from Reconciliation Australia, and that's a tribute to the quality of the commitments in the documents," he said.

Cole said a key driver of Woodside's sponsorship with Fremantle was to bring the combined force of the respective but different organisations together to contribute to positive outcomes in the community, including the Indigenous community.

He said his company had implemented a number of programs to advance reconciliation, but added Fremantle was in a rare position, given the scope of the AFL competition.

"The Fremantle Dockers have the capacity to touch hundreds of thousands of people through their broader supporter base, and indeed through their participation in the AFL to touch millions," Cole said.

"We're very proud to support the launch of this RAP and we look forward to working with Fremantle throughout the period of the RAP and beyond."

There have been 30 Indigenous players on Freo's list since its inception, 25 of whom have gone on to play at the elite level.

The club is one of just three in VFL/ AFL history to have had an Indigenous player on its list in every season of its existence. The other two are Gold Coast and Greater Western Sydney. One of those players is Michael Johnson, who has been a driver of Indigenous recognition for a number of years.

He was incredibly proud of the RAP and the Indigenous jumper.

"It's very special to be part of this club and see those players that fought their heart out be recognised," Johnson said.

"Older players that have retired like, Jeff Farmer, Des Headland, Troy Cook, Antoni Grover and Roger Hayden. Players such as Dale Kickett, Winston Abraham and Gary Dhurrkay, who went out there and tried their hardest to get this club going in the right direction.

"We've always wanted to celebrate something like this, and to have it done this year is very exciting, not only for me and the players, but the whole club, the supporters and the community."

Johnson was a big fan of the Indigenous jumper, which current development coach Hayden worked with Richard Walley, one of Australia's leading Aboriginal performers, artists, musicians and writers, to create for the club.

"To play in it in Indigenous Round was something special," Johnson said.

Hayden echoed Johnson's sentiments on the RAP and the jumper.

"The AFL is the leading sport in Australia and to have the focus on our culture during Indigenous Round means a great deal, not just for myself, but for our players, past players, supporters and the Indigenous community in general," Hayden said.

The former Fremantle halfback flanker said the jumper was representative of location.

"Fremantle is near the ocean, there are four waves on the jumper that represent water in the ocean and also the four quarters of a football game," he said.

"They begin on the bottom right corner of the jumper, where inner strength is represented.

"As it builds out through the jumper, each quarter becomes gradually larger, which in football terms means you will finish the game strongly."

Three Boomerangs replaced the chevrons that normally appear on Freo's jumper.

Each represents a different application – as a weapon, a musical instrument and the strength of

coming back home, and all can be used in football terminology.

"The weapon depicts the combative and attacking nature of the game," Hayden said.

"A musical instrument can be played, just as footballers play the game. The third boomerang is symbolic of a strong home base."

Other features on the jumper also depict Fremantle as an area and its importance to Indigenous people.

The dots that form the shape of an arch symbolise shelter, while the dots that slope symbolise the nourishment of the ocean, which has been a source of food for Indigenous people for thousands of years.

Johnson added that he saw himself as a leader at Freo,

particularly for the younger Indigenous players.

He said the RAP would also be significant for the development of young Indigenous players like Josh Simpson, who came from a 100-person outpost in WA's north-east called Yalgoo.

"A lot of the players have been brought up with a lot of Indigenous people around them and come from traditional backgrounds and beliefs, and I think it's good for the club and the players to learn more about them," Johnson said.

"I'm really pleased with the way the club has handled it and, hopefully, over the next couple of years, the other players can learn a lot about the culture of the Indigenous players."

DERBY CLUB HELP MOLLER REACH

n 2009, a 14-year-old
Craig Moller commenced a
NSW Scholarship with the
Fremantle Dockers.
He spent the next three
years developing under the
club's guidance. This included regular
trips to Fremantle HQ to meet
coaching staff, players, and to see
how an AFL club worked.

None of this could have been possible without the support of the Derby Club, a Fremantle Dockers' coterie group.

The Derby Club provided financial assistance to enable Moller and the club to continue his scholarship.

Freo selected Moller with the 46th pick in the AFL Rookie Draft last season.

The young ruckman was ecstatic to have his dream realised, but he was well aware of the significant contribution the Derby Club made to help him get there.

"I'm so grateful to the Derby Club for helping me out while I was a NSW Scholarship holder," he said.

From Barden
Ridge, 30km south of Sydney, Moller was New South Wales' best player at the under-16 national titles a few

years ago. He was also considered one of the best basketball

talents in the country.
The AFL (NSW / ACT)
Scholarship Program was
established in April, 2006, to
attract quality athletes

from the NSW/ACT area to our code by providing a direct path to the elite AFL competition.

Despite a mid-season injury that kept him out of action for a month, Moller has been performing solidly at league level for Peel Thunder in the WAFL this year.

He's also learning a lot about ruck work from one of the best to have played the position – Aaron Sandilands.

"He's a great player to practice against and get some experience," Moller said about the three-time All Australian.

Now 18, Moller is a great example of the benefits that an AFL club can gain through programs such as the NSW Scholarship.









ast year, Danyle Pearce left Port Adelaide, where he had spent eight seasons, and joined Fremantle. While he made the move for his football career, Pearce's first duty was to ensure his young family would cope with the sudden transition to a new life.

Seven months in, Danyle, wife Tara, daughter Kyla, 4, and son Jordan, 3, haven't had too many problems adjusting to purple and are now well settled into Freo life.

They've moved into a house in Aubin Grove, where the local school's uniform is fitting.

"Kyla has started kindy there and she loves it because they have a purple uniform, so the first thing she thought was Fremantle," Pearce says.

Kyla took a liking to her dad's new team, and team song, from the moment the family arrived.

"She knows the Fremantle song off by heart, so she sings it at school and she puts on her Fremantle uniform," Pearce says.

"She loves it."

The family has also grown quite fond of another Freo tradition at Patersons Stadium on match days.

"They really love the 'Freo' chant that goes up towards the end of the games," Pearce says.

"My daughter gets into it and she loves it, it's one of her best things about going to the games."

As long as his family is happy, he is happy, and the Fremantle area has offered a variety of activities to keep the Pearce's occupied.

"Every time I take the kids into Freo they see the ferris wheel and the stuff going on at the park, so as soon as they see that, I've got to take them in there," he says.

"They have their choice. The ferris wheel, the little playgrounds and the little maze house.

Jordan has his father's cheeky smile. Pearce says he and Kyla sometimes miss what they left behind in South Australia. Pearce has already struck up a few close friendships with his new teammates.

He gets along very well with Michael Walters, Hayden Ballantyne and Jesse Crichton, but Pearce likes to think of the entire Fremantle organisation as a friend. celebrated goals against West Coast in the first round of the home and away season.

While admitting it was probably a little "excessive", Pearce says it was also his way of showing his new fans what those goals meant to him.

"With everything that went on in the off-season, and every player goes through a big pre-season, it was kind of just letting that all out," he says.

Kyla let her dad know she approved of his celebration.

"She did see me kick the goal and she did let me know that she was clapping and that she was happy," Pearce says.

Much like his new senior coach, Ross Lyon, what you see is what you get with Danyle Pearce.

"I wear my heart on my sleeve," he savs.

"If I'm going to enjoy something, I'll enjoy it, and if something's getting on my nerves, I'll let it be noticed.

"You can look at me and see how I'm feeling."

Seeing Pearce with his wife and two children, he's feeling really good right now."







LUKE MCPHARLIN **200 FREO GAMES**

ootball can be a cruel game. In a perfect world, Luke McPharlin would have been carried off the field on his teammates' shoulders in his 200th match for the Fremantle Dockers against Essendon in round 3. Instead, he made his way off Patersons Stadium in the hands of the medical staff after a high hit from Bomber Patrick Ryder just minutes into the game. Freo didn't get the win, but nothing should be taken away from a man who has been a warrior on the field and an exemplary citizen off it for more than a decade now.

When asked in the lead-up to his 200th Freo match, whether 200 club or 200 AFL games were more important to him, McPharlin was emphatic in his response.

"Fremantle," he said, without any pause for thought.

"I like the fact that I've effectively become a one-club player.

"I like the fact that I've managed to play 200 games for this club.

"It puts me in a fairly elite bracket with Paul Hasleby, Shaun McManus, Shane Parker, Antoni Grover and Matthew Pavlich and I'm very happy and honoured to be among that company."

ZAC DAWSON 100 AFL GAMES

t's taken Zac Dawson 10 seasons at three clubs to reach the 100-game milestone, which he celebrated with a one-point win over Richmond at Patersons Stadium in round 5. That's testament to the perseverance he has displayed since joining Hawthorn back in 2003, where he played 14 games before being delisted. He spent 2007 and 2008 on what he described as the "football scrapheap" before Ross Lyon gave him another go at St Kilda. Dawson played in three Grand Finals at the Saints before re-joining Lyon at Freo for the 2012 season. He credited Lyon for helping him achieve what he has so far in his football career.

"I could say 'I could've done it without him' but I probably couldn't have, because he's obviously seen something in me and we have a pretty good relationship and that's something you've got to try and hold on to when you get into this caper. So it's probably a lot to do with him," Dawson said



membership at the club, joining the likes of Matthew Pavlich, Luke McPharlin and fellow Indigenous player Antoni Grover, whose record of 202 for most games at Freo by an Indigenous player is within Johnson's reach. As is his nature, Johnson was humble when asked about reaching 200 and beyond.

"To play one game was something special in my heart. To play 200 would mean the world to me," he said.

"If I do pass (Antoni's record), I don't think I'll hold it for too long. Stephen Hill will go straight pass that."

And he hasn't lost his ability to be a swingman, turning the drawn game against Sydney when he was moved forward late in the match.

A knee injury may have ended Jonathon Griffin's season, but something that will never die is his love for the Fremantle Dockers, a club he has given his heart to since day one.

hen Ross Lyon was asked about Jonathon Griffin during a media conference before Fremantle's round 7 clash with Collingwood, the senior coach replied bluntly and honestly.

"He could have left."
Lyon was referring to the
opportunities on offer for Griffin
to depart Freo at the end of 2012
and pursue a contract with a club
desperate for a quality ruckman to

lead its on-ball division.

Aaron Sandilands was a clear first choice at Freo, but it was opportunity that made Griffin's decision to stay an easy one.

"We've got a great opportunity over the next couple of years," Griffin said.

"I think we're really building something pretty special here and I want to be a part of that. I'm rapt to be here."

Sadly, Griffin won't get that opportunity this year after he suffered a season-ending knee injury against the Magpies.

Not on the field, anyway.

He'll be in the stands supporting his Fremantle Dockers. In that regard, not much has changed from before he was an AFL player.

Griffin and his family have been passionate supporters of the club since day one.

He spent the first 10 years of his life living in the south-west WA town of Bunbury before moving to Booragoon in Perth's southern suburbs.

He attended Booragoon Primary and Applecross High and played his junior football for Booragoon, or Karoonda, as the club was known at the time.

"I used to jog to training and get there half an hour early just to have a kick with some mates," Griffin said.

"I've got some good memories with my mates down there."

Griffin barracked for East Fremantle in the WAFL – his first ever football jumper was a blue and white Sharks' jersey.

He followed the West Coast Eagles, because he was West Australian, but when the option to convert to a club closer to home popped up in 1995, he took it.

His family bought Freo memberships when they arrived in Perth and Griffin's love for the club took him to Subiaco Oval every second week of the football season.

It was there that his favourite Freo football memory took place on Friday, 19 August 2005.

Griffin and his brother, Brendon, were sitting at the bottom of the three-tier stand at the Subiaco end of the ground. They were just to the left of the left behind post, a perfect spot to see his favourite player, Justin Longmuir, blast through an after-the-siren set-shot

to defeat St Kilda and send the entire stadium into delirium.

"I used to love watching Justin Longmuir, so the kick after the siren when he kicked the goal is a hard one to beat," Griffin said.

"I remember being there and I was jumping around. I think I hugged my brother because it was a very exciting time."

The realisation that he could be Longmuir's teammate hit Griffin iust a few months later.

"I was at a mate's place and I got a phone call from a Freo representative saying they were very keen on me," he said.

"I was pretty shocked. I was that excited I ended up running home to tell my mum."

In the 2005 Rookie Draft, Griffin's dream became a reality, but it wasn't his beloved Freo that selected him.

The Adelaide Crows jumped in at selection 21 to nab the ruckman.

While his perfect situation hadn't eventuated, Griffin was still thrilled to become an AFL player.

"Most 18-year-olds have to come to terms that they might have to move to pursue their dreams," he said.

"I was rapt when I heard my name called out by Adelaide."

Limited opportunities saw Griffin play just 41 games in four seasons at the Crows, so at the end of 2010 a family illness and homesickness saw him look to head back home.

He packed his bags and drove west to reunite with his heart in Fremantle.

Griffin's shattering knee injury in round 7 came at a time when he'd reaffirmed himself as quality AFL ruckman.

Freo was without long-term injury casualty Sandilands, but Griffin's start to the year helped the club get off to a flyer.

Now, from the sidelines, he'll still get his opportunity to make a difference by mentoring young South Australian ruckman Jack Hannath and future prospect Craig Moller.

Griffin and Hannath have history through a Central Districts' link in the SANFL, from Griffin's time in Adelaide.

"It's a great opportunity for me to build on my relationship with them and mentor them more, like Aaron has done for me." Griffin said.

Griffin has begun the long road back from knee surgery, which he underwent in Melbourne on Tuesday 21 May.

"The surgeon said it went smoothly and I should have a good recovery and be back in nine or 10 months," he said.

"I've already begun upper body work and I'll hopefully jump on a bike in about a month's time."

Opportunity wasn't the sole reason Griffin chose to remain at Fremantle.

"This is the club that I barracked for as a kid. I grew up around here," he said.

"I wanted to stay."

You can be certain he'll still be at Patersons Stadium cheering on his team.

What are your thoughts on how the team are travelling at the moment?






for the children in the
