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ROOKIE REALITY

The AFL rookie system is becoming increasingly important for clubs with new rules allowing more mature-agers like Greg Broughton to be drafted. In 2010, new recruits Michael Barlow and Alex Silvagni are two mature-age players taking their chances on the AFL rookie system. Story: Costa Kastanis

OLLOWING ON from the success of Greg Broughton, Matt de Boer, Clancee Pearce and Jay van Berlo last year, Fremantle has again dipped into the mature-age talent pool in 2010 and drafted Victorians Michael Barlow and Alex Silvagni.

In the past few seasons, older rookies have surfaced in the AFL with more regularity than in previous years.

The success of the rookies in 2009 has inspired Barlow and Silvagni to follow in their footsteps.

Barlow, 22, said that watching Broughton perform so well last season made him believe he, too, could make it as a mature-age rookie.

"Greg Broughton came through the back door into the system," Barlow said. "If I can have half the success Greg had last year, I'd be absolutely rapt.

"He is a player I can draw experience from. He didn't take a backwards step in his first season which is encouraging for me."

OVERLOOKED

The disappointment of being overlooked by recruiters in 2007 and 2008 fuelled Barlow's hunger to make it to the top level.

"Those were two of the most heartbreaking days of my life," Barlow said. "Realising I wasn't going to be on a list again meant it was back to the drawing board.

"But that disappointment made me

step it up and want it even more."

With pick eight at the 2009 Rookie Draft, the club gave Barlow the opportunity he had worked so hard to attain.

"To see my name come up that day was one of the best moments of my life," Barlow said. "I still think about it now and it brings a smile to my face."

Barlow is now determined to make a name for himself at Fremantle.

"I know I have hard work ahead to prove myself to the coaching staff and the players," he said. "I really want to contribute to the club's success."

It has been a similar story for 22-year-old Alex Silvagni, who was taken by Fremantle with the 24th pick in the Rookie Draft.

The key defender had played the past three seasons with VFL side Casey Scorpions, but his draft dreams had amounted to nothing until Fremantle took a punt on him.

"I played VFL with the intention of being picked up in the back of my mind," Silvagni said. "It didn't happen for a couple of years but eventually I did the right things and it happened."

"I was very excited. I just want to get the best out of myself now."

Silvagni said the level of professionalism required to be an AFL footballer was incredible.

"Coming here and training six days a week and going to meetings all the time – it's a busy schedule compared to the VFL," he said. Silvagni and Barlow will both be aiming to gain promotion to the senior list, with competition set to be fierce among all the rookies.

And with the recent retirement of Dean Solomon, a spot is there for the taking.

"Whether it's me or one of the other guys, it's a great opportunity," Barlow said. "The ball's in our court."

PATHWAYS

Barlow said competition between the rookies would help strengthen the team as a whole.

"At the end of the day, it's all about the Fremantle Football Club and where we can go forward together," he said. "Whoever the club picks for the senior list, we will accept the decision.

"If it's not me, I have to recognise there will be an opportunity down the track."

Silvagni also has some advice for footballers who have not been drafted on the first or second go.

"Just keep playing at the highest level you can," he said. "Leagues like the VFL or WAFL are good pathways.

"Keep trying and eventually, if you do the right thing, good things can happen."



Captain Matthew Pavlich said the club understood the importance of its role in the community.

SO LONG, SOLLY

After 209 AFL games, the curtain has come down on Dean Solomon's career, but not by choice. The boy from Broken Hill was forced into retirement after a debilitating knee injury forced the brave warrior to hang up the boots before a ball had even been bounced for the 2010 season. ROWING UP IN the outback NSW town of Broken Hill, Dean Solomon would sit in his backyard and listen to football on the radio for hours.

Without any coverage on the television, it was the only way he could follow the game he loved.

He dreamed of watching a game live.

Solomon would realise his dream. However, the side of the fence he would be on was way beyond the wildest expectations of the boy from Broken Hill.

In February, Solomon announced his retirement from the AFL, leaving behind him a glittering 13-year AFL career that included the ultimate success – winning the 2000 premiership with Essendon.

A Fremantle player for the past three seasons, the sacrifices Solomon made for his teammates over the years have finally caught up with the brave warrior.

A deteriorating knee-injury meant Solomon's career would finish on 209 games, 51 for Fremantle and 158 for the Bombers.

"Thirteen years of running around playing football – your body is slowly going to deteriorate," Solomon said.

Drafted by Essendon in 1997, Solomon quickly made a name for himself as a tough and uncompromising competitor.

The heartbreak of losing the 1999 Preliminary Final by a point to Carlton was replaced by euphoria a year later when Solomon's Bombers climbed the AFL's mountain to win the 2000 flag.

"We worked harder than any other side at that stage," he said. "We had a belief in each other and we knew there were no weak links.

"Looking back now, I can sit back and appreciate how good that side was. I'll cherish it forever."

SEA CHANGE

Solomon arrived at Fremantle in 2006 – a move that would reunite him with his best mate, Chris Tarrant.

The pair played together at Bendigo in the U18s before Solomon was drafted by Essendon and Tarrant to their bitter rivals Collingwood.

As fate would have it, Fremantle brought both players into the club in the same draft.

"To get the opportunity to play with Taz was a dream come true," Solomon said. "We always spoke about playing together but with me being at Essendon and him being at Collingwood, we never thought there would be a chance.

"As it turns out, one simple trade week turned our careers inside out and we ended up at the same club together."

Solomon has some advice for his Fremantle teammates that a former coach once gave him.

"Kevin Sheedy used to tell me 'your career goes like that'," Solomon said, clicking his fingers. "You have to enjoy the time you have at a football club because it goes so fast.

"My advice to the youngsters would be: take your opportunity, work as hard as you can and do whatever it takes to get the best out of yourself.

"It does come and go and you don't want to sit there at the end and ask yourself should I have done that better.

"Enjoy the ride." Fremantle

"Today, the opposition would be happy that he is retiring, and his teammates would be unhappy because of the way he played the game," Harvey said. "He's got the respect of all of his teammates."


INSPIRATION

A player that earned Solomon's respect at Fremantle is 2009 revelation, Greg Broughton.

So much so that Solomon, prior to retiring, reclaimed the number seven that he wore at Essendon, and offered Broughton the number six – Solomon's number at Fremantle for the past three seasons.

"I enjoyed watching Greg come into the side last year," Solomon said. "I didn't know much about him and then to see him play, I drew inspiration from a young kid like that."



Q&A: MARKHARVEY PREVIEWS THE SEASON

What have been the main areas of focus in the preseason?

To develop and fast track our first, second and third year players and ensure our senior players fully understand where they are at in their careers and what they want out of it. We've also been working on the physical nature of the group and making sure everyone understands the game plan. What's your outlook at this very early stage of the year? Following on from our first NAB Cup game there were areas that we needed to work on. There were times when it got away from us a little bit, and that might be indicative of some of our first year players coming to grips with the tempo of the game. We had a really good look at our pressure skills and how players combine in different areas of the ground. What else did you take out of the pre-season?

Our pressure, intensity and tackling were highlights. For the majority of the preseason we've been working on the chemistry between the players in different areas of the ground and how that evolves. With a young team you must instil from an early stage that pressure and intensity are always at the forefront, no matter whether you win or lose. Are you satisfied with the playing structures you have in place?

It's a work in progress. We had a good look at it in round 1 of the NAB Cup, which left us with

a few weeks to tighten everything up and make sure everything is ready to go for round 1 of the home and away season. There are some things that we are doing differently because the game is changing all the time. So you devise different mechanisms and ramp them up over the pre-season to make sure they work for you. Overall our focus has been making sure everybody is ready for round 1 of the season proper.

What differences can supporters expect to see in Fremantle's game style in 2010 from last year? We've been working to ensure that our scoring ability is first rate and that we put pressure on the opposition all the time through efficiency, physical contact and ensuring that

our structures are always

working effectively.

We are finding now with all the experience of the past two years of players having to play in different positions they can now play multiple roles, which allows us to be a lot more stable in our selection.

A lot has been made of how tough the early part of the draw is... you're not daunted by that?

No. Not at all. We think it's a really good challenge for the group to be playing the top sides early on. Our home ground has got to be a fortress but having said that we've been concentrating on different methods for when we go on the road that we have more success.


You've also spoken about being a lot more competitive and getting closer to the top four sides?

Closing the gap on the top four sides in terms of competitiveness was how I described it in a radio interview. Because of our recruiting and because of our fast tracking of our younger players, we are closing that gap. We've got some really good rookies on our list who will put pressure on our senior players. Then there's the progress of second year players like Stephen Hill, Nick Suban and Greg Broughton and the return of third year players Rhys Palmer and Chris Mayne. From what I've seen over the pre-season is that a number of our younger guys have become better players but it's crucial that it translates in games.

How is the elevation of rookies likely to play out? It's putting pressure on everyone to compete for their place in the team and we've needed that. There are a number of rookies, including Matt de Boer, Michael Barlow, Clancee Pearce, Alex Silvagni and Jay van Berlo pressing for spots at the moment. But it is by no means a fait accompli as to who will be elevated. What are you looking

forward to from a coaching perspective in 2010?

To seeing how much improvement we've made... how far we've progressed



in the off-season. We've also given the group a lot of experience over the past two years, so I'm looking forward to the enhancement of that. How far that takes us remains to be seen. Realistically, we are 12 months away from the top sides but in terms of competitiveness, we are closing the gap.

If some of the rookies evolve and hold down regular spots, our second and third year players step up and the senior guys bring them along – plus improve as players themselves – they will be the interesting signs to look out for. \$\Psi\$

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An AFL debut is a daunting prospect for any young man. But for Stephen Hill and Nick Suban, it was made easier by the fact that they would share the experience together. It was a day that would set the tone for their debut season and saw many parallels for the future stars of the club. Story: Kate Murphy

ICK SUBAN AND Stephen Hill were two of 11 debutants for Fremantle in season 2009. For two players from opposite sides of the country, following their footy dream has left both with far more than a promising AFL career.

In their first AFL season, training together, playing together, rooming together, Suban and Hill have lived inside of each other's pockets and have become close friends.

Drafted from Bacchus Marsh, 50km west of Melbourne, Suban had to make a quick transition into WA life.

"I had to come straight over here; I was on the flight the next day. It all happened pretty quickly," Suban said.

"It was the first time I'd been to Perth when I moved over here.

It's a lot different to Melbourne, the weather's much nicer."

HOST FAMILY

Living with fellow teammate Ryan Murphy when he first arrived in Perth, it wasn't until after Christmas that Suban settled into his new home with his host family. He said it took a little while to get used to.

"It's pretty scary to start off with. There's different rules, different culture, different everything really, so you've got to get used to new living arrangements. Now I've been here a year I'm used to it, I love it."

For local boy Hill, getting drafted to a WA AFL club was a different scenario all together with his biggest adjustment being the hour-long trip from home in the northern suburbs to Fremantle Oval.

But in a week full of introductions, media commitments, meeting their football heroes and getting their first look at life as AFL footballers, Hill said it didn't take long for the new draftees to get to know each other.

"We bonded pretty well and became close fairly quickly. We always trained together, had meetings together and stuff, mainly because we weren't really with the main group to start with," Hill said.

After their first pre-season learning the ropes of an AFL club and adjusting to the tempo, Suban and Hill were selected to make their debuts in round 1 and never looked back, playing all 22 games together.

"It was good to have another guy in

the same situation as you, first game, first year, so it was reassuring that I wasn't the only one out there. I knew that Hilly was out there too and in the same boat as me, so we could help each other out," Suban said.

ROOM MATES

Both players said going through the rigors of an AFL pre-season and rooming together on trips was what forged their friendship.

"We roomed together all year and I reckon that's how we got a bit closer," Suban said.


Hill admitted that the most annoying habit in the friendship came from him, Suban all too happy to share Hills snoring habits.

"Hilly snores. I got used to it in the end, but at the start it was really annoying," Suban quipped.

All jokes aside, having helped each other out through their first AFL season, Hill and Suban were also both rewarded for their standout debut seasons with NAB Rising Star nominations, something which neither of them expected.

"I didn't expect to play any games at the start of the year, I just wanted to come over, try my best and train as hard as I could," Suban said.

"I don't think I had the best year going around, I was still learning,



so I think that this year if I keep learning and developing I can hopefully play better footy."

Having debut seasons that almost mirrored each other, Hill said he had definitely learnt a lot from Suban in the way he goes about his football.

"It's his leadership around the club. It gets all the young guys and the older boys going during training and games," Hill said of Suban.

"In his first year that's just awesome to see it happening out on the field,



the older guys get a lift and really appreciate it," he said.

And the accolades also flow from Suban who says it is Hill's approach to the game that he admires most.


"He has a great attitude towards footy, he's a quiet guy and doesn't say a lot but he gets the job done and does everything he can to prepare well for the weekend," Suban said.

Suban also alluded that it has been the strong friendships developed amongst all the 2008 draftees that has helped his transition from Bacchus Marsh into his new home at Fremantle.

"The WA guys have been really good introducing me to their friends, now I have a lot of friends outside of the club too," Suban said.

"As long as I don't hear him snoring, it would be OK," Suban joked. ↓

WOODSIDE VISITA GAS



On top of a heli-deck about 50m above the ocean, in searing heat and with 27kmh winds — this was no ordinary kick-to-kick for Matthew Pavlich and Aaron Sandilands. Story: Luke Morfesse



N THE 14 YEARS it has been in operation, Woodside's Goodwyn-A gas platform has received a range of visitors.

While former Prime Minister John Howard once made the 45-minute helicopter trip out to the massive platform, 135km off the coast from Karratha, Goodwyn has never played host to any AFL footballers.

That all changed in December when senior coach Mark Harvey, captain Matthew Pavlich and vice captain Aaron Sandilands followed the former PM's flight path out to Goodwyn, which stands 291m tall and sits in 131m of water.

Keen to test out the footy skills of some of the 80-plus staff on Goodwyn, Harvey, Pavlich and Sandilands broke out the Sherrins for some kicking and handball drills on the helicopter landing deck.

Easier said the done.

Along with the flies, searing heat and 27kmh winds sweeping across the platform, the heli-deck is only 20m wide but about 50m metres above the ocean.

The only guard against a very long drop into the deep blue sea below, which is home to some menacing tiger sharks, is a one metre-wide safety net.

"The conditions made it pretty interesting... plus there was a bit of a breeze blowing," Sandilands said.

"At one stage I got pretty close to the edge and the legs started to shake a bit, so I thought it was best to switch ends with 'Pav' and stick towards the middle of the heli-deck.

"But it was great to have a kick with the all the boys from Goodwyn. I've kicked a footy in a lot places in my time but nothing like this. It was a pretty special experience."

Speaking after the impromptu skill session and a tour of the facility, Pavlich said he was "blown away" by Goodwyn, which is currently producing \$10 million worth of gas and associated products every day for a consortium – including Woodside, one of Fremantle's major sponsors.

"I had no real concept or expectations heading out here, but after having a really good look over the facility, you get an understanding of what a great resource it is for the Western Australian community," he said.

Pavlich also received a valuable insight into the demands of living and working two-weeks on and two-weeks off as fly-in, fly-out worker.

Consequently, he's pretty happy

with his lot as an AFL footballer.

Before they departed the facility, Harvey presented a signed jumper to Goodwyn offshore installation manager James Carter and thanked the staff for making them feel so welcome.

"They are a great bunch of people and it was a fascinating experience to see how they go about the work in fairly trying conditions," Harvey said.

Calum Hamilton, Goodywn's HSC, or health safety co-ordinator, who hosted the visitors for much of the day, described it as a "really special occasion."

"We've never had any AFL players on board before and never had the opportunity to get on the helideck and have a kick-to-kick," said Hamilton, a 15-year veteran with Woodside who alternates two-weeks on and two-weeks off between the Goodwyn and Rankin platforms.

"There was a lot of great energy on the heli-deck and a lot of the crew who are Dockers' supporters had an opportunity to meet their footy heroes in the dining room.

"The crew on Goodwyn and staff right across Woodside are looking forward to seeing the Dockers perform well in 2010." \$\Phi\$

NEW RECRUITS TACKLE HIGH SEAS

An overnight sail aboard *Leeuwin II* turned out to be a demanding test of character for our new boys. Costa Kastanis was on deck to see how they fared on their maiden voyage.





HE CLUB'S FIRST year players set sail from Fremantle Port aboard the *Leeuwin II* on a beautiful, still summer's day.

What they didn't know was that they were about to be put through a severe mental and physical challenge during the 24 hour adventure.

As darkness fell, the wind picked up and the ocean turned against the *Leeuwin II* and her crew. The boat swayed relentlessly from side to side leaving some players and staff to face the harsh realities of sea-sickness.

The Leeuwin II's crew manifest included rookies Nathan Fyfe, Joel Houghton, Justin Bollenhagen, Jesse Crichton, Dylan Roberton, Alex Silvagni and Michael Barlow.

Joined on deck by coaching staff members including Justin Longmuir, Michael Prior and Luke Webster, the Fremantle contingent were not just passengers on this journey.

They participated in everything from hauling lines, night watches, cleaning the ship, taking turns at the helm and even climbing to 33m above sea level.

The unlucky ones were given night watch shifts at 1.00am and 4.00am. The freezing wind, rough seas, and limited visibility made for an interesting but unforgettable experience.

Recruit Joel Houghton said his time on deck was one of the most harrowing experiences of his life.

"It was tough," he said. "It was a good experience but being sea-sick was average. I didn't like that one bit."

DIFFICULT CONDITIONS

The task was made even tougher during the night watch shifts when the captain ordered the boat to be turned around at 4.30am.

The skeleton crew battled manfully and eventually swung the *Leeuwin II* back towards shore.

"It was shocking," Houghton said. "I didn't get any sleep."

The Leeuwin Ocean Adventure Foundation is well known for the youth development program which it has been running for 23 years.

The program is both physically and emotionally challenging, but is designed to help young people reach their potential through the development of social confidence and relationship skills.

Fremantle sent its youngsters out to sea to find out how they would work together, and who would be prepared to take on a leadership role to overcome the difficult conditions that were presented to them.

Player Development Coach Michael

Prior said he was pleased with how the boys handled what was thrown at them during the voyage.

"The main aim was them working together because without each other the ship would not sail," he said. "We want them to realise that those same qualities are required on the football field."

Mature-age recruit Michael Barlow said the Leeuwin experience had tested all the players' resolves.

"It was a tough night and some of the things we had to do were very challenging," he said. "We were climbing up 30m poles, the sea was pretty rough and the boys were over the side a bit."

Despite its hardships, Barlow said the adventure proved to be a great learning curve for Fremantle's new boys.

"Every challenge that you are faced with in life, be it football or general life, you should give it your best shot, and I think the boys gave it their best shot and succeeded out here."

Despite the positive outcomes of the experience, Joel Houghton had his own thoughts about the possibility of sailing out to sea on a boat again.

"I think I'll stick to football for now," he said.↓
