

FREMANTLE HAS welcomed new Number One Ticket Holders this season... award-winning Australian rock band Eskimo Joe.



MICHAEL BARLOW - ROUND 1 v ADELAIDE

WHEN MICHAEL BARLOW walked out into to the middle of Subiaco Oval in round 3 against Geelong, he knew he had arrived in the big league when Cat captain Cameron Ling went and stood next to him before the first bounce.

To have the reigning premiers send their master tagger to mind a third-gamer spoke volumes about the impact Barlow had made on the AFL in his first two games.

"It was a bit of an eye opener," Barlow said. "In fact, it was a privilege to be on the same field as some of the greatest

players to have played the game, like Ablett, Bartel, Selwood and Chapman. To play against them was amazing. It's always good to test yourself against the best."

The following week, against St Kilda at Etihad Stadium, Barlow was manned by Saint Clinton Jones, who is as mean as it gets when it comes to letting his opponent get the ball. With Jones constantly on his hammer, Barlow struggled to wield an influence on the game, but he learnt a valuable lesson.

"I found out that he was a bit like a glove," Barlow said. "It was a good experience and if I get a player like that again I'll look to use alternative tactics to try and find a bit more space against him."

Playing on the likes of Jones and Ling has helped Barlow to improve on his own defensive mechanisms.

"It's a very accountable game these days, especially at AFL level, so you have to have that defensive side to your game or you are not going to make it at that level," he said.

Barlow said playing AFL was only just starting to sink in, but he still pinched himself every day.

"It's starting to become reality, the day-to-day process of being a professional athlete," he said. "It's becoming routine. Still, running out and playing in front of so many people on the big stage is a bit of an eye opener, but I'm gradually getting used to it."

And he has no regrets at not being picked up by an AFL club at an earlier age.

"Everything happens for a reason," he said. "I suppose starting at a younger age might have been a more spoon-fed way to get into the AFL. The way it's worked out for me, it's given me a good perspective to realise how lucky I am."

ALEX SILVAGNI – ROUND 1 v ADELAIDE

IF ONE YEAR AGO, someone had told Alex Silvagni that he would be playing AFL in 2010, he would have told them they were crazy.

"I wouldn't have believed them," the 22-year-old said.

Silvagni was plying his trade in the VFL for the Casey Scorpions last year, but after being picked up as a rookie by Freo, he has become a key component of the club's defensive structure this season.

He rated Geelong premiership forward Tom Hawkins as his toughest opponent to date.

"Geelong are well drilled and they have a great midfield, so the ball is always coming into the forward line with quality delivery, which makes it tough for the defenders," he said.

Silvagni said he had learnt a great deal by playing on some of the AFL's best forwards. "I'm playing on guys who are capable of doing a lot of damage," he said. "You have to adjust for different types of players. You have to learn how different guys employ different tactics and positioning during games."

Silvagni said being an older recruit had made his introduction to AFL level a bit easier to handle.

"Having played VFL before, I wasn't intimidated," he said. "You play against AFL guys in the VFL, and I'm 22, so it's not as tough as it might be for an 18-year-old."

But he knows that, as a rookielisted player, he will have to fight tooth and nail to keep his dream alive.

"There's a bit of uncertainty as a rookie, not knowing what's going to happen," he said. "You know you have to work hard. You can't just sit back and get comfortable with your spot. You have to keep working. It's challenging, but it's rewarding as well."

ANTHONY MORABITO -ROUND 1 v ADELAIDE

ANTHONY MORABITO was Fremantle's top pick in last year's AFL Draft, and the boy from Harvey in WA's South-West hasn't disappointed with his introduction to top level football.

Tall, quick and strong, the 18-yearold said he was now getting used to life as an AFL footballer.

"You're playing games all the time, just trying to keep your spot in the team," Morabito said. "You get more and more focused on just trying to play good football."

Morabito said that after playing on a few quality opponents in his brief career, one in particular stood out as a player he wanted to model his game on: St Kilda midfielder Nick Dal Santo.

"He knows where to run and uses the ball well," Morabito said. "Those are aspects I'd like to improve in my game."

Morabito said he was excited at the prospect of growing as a team with the other young players Fremantle has introduced in the past two years.

"The way all the young boys have come in and made a difference is just great," he said. "I want to contribute every week, get a few more wins on the board, and help the team achieve our goal of sustained success."





NATHAN FYFE -ROUND 5 v RICHMOND

NATHAN FYFE has already been coined the new 'Birdman' of the AFL, and he announced his arrival during his first AFL game in round 5 when he took a soaring pack mark against Richmond.

But the spring-heeled youngster said that mark wasn't anything out of the ordinary.

"It was just like I was back at home playing footy," Fyfe said. "I didn't think of anything other than jumping up and marking it just like any other time and, luckily, it stuck."

To confirm he wasn't afraid of performing on the big stage, the following week the 18-year-old kicked a stunning goal in the Derby, which was nominated for the AFL's Goal of the Week.

A NAB Rising Star nomination after his 23-possession effort in the round 9 win against Sydney capped off the young forward's dream start to his AFL career.

Fyfe has excited Freo fans with his athletic capacity and freakish talent playing in the forward line, but he realises that to become a more complete footballer he still needs to improve on the defensive aspects of his game.

Fyfe said the round 8 match against Collingwood, in which he played on Magpies' running defenders Heath Shaw and Harry O'Brien, highlighted to him just how important it was for forwards to be defensive-minded on backmen.

"They were very clever, experienced players that utilised their body and space very well," Fyfe said. "You become a lot more conscious of what your opponent is doing. As a forward, when you have to play on such attacking defenders, you have to have a defensive mindset."

DYLAN ROBERTON -ROUND 6 v WEST COAST

DYLAN ROBERTON made his AFL debut under the spotlight of a Derby, and his opponents did all they could to try and allow the occasion to overwhelm the 18-year-old.

"There was a bit of 'who are you', 'what are you doing out here' and 'you're just a kid'," Roberton said. "It didn't bother me at all."

The Victorian recruit showed great composure, gathering 13 kicks as Fremantle beat its cross-town rivals in a stadium packed predominately with West Coast fans.

"It was a very one-sided crowd, so it was a different experience at Subiaco," Roberton said. "But it was good to hear the crowd quieten down once we got on top of them."

Roberton's second game involved the tricky journey to play at the Gabba in Brisbane, and it was another valuable learning curve for him.

"That's the longest flight I've ever been on," he said. "It was good to go over with the boys and good to get a win. I learnt that you have to be very professional for away trips, like keeping hydrated and getting on top of your sleep."

Whilst Roberton has very good endurance he has been impressed by the fitness levels that AFL players are at, and is now motivated to improve his own.

"The amount of repeat efforts, how often players can go at a contest and do it really fast, over and over again is incredible at an AFL level," he said. "I have good overall fitness but I want to be able to improve my match fitness to match it with the best in the AFL." \$


WHEN STEVEN DODD RAN OUT ONTO AAMI STADIUM IN round 11 for his 100th game of AFL football, it was the culmination of hard work and perseverance from a very dedicated Fremantle player.

Steven, who was recruited in the 2002 Rookie Draft, reached his milestone after having made his debut in 2004. He was a mainstay in the Freo team in 2009, playing all 22 games, mainly as a tagger, and finishing 10th in the best and fairest. Standing 191cm and possessing great endurance, he has been able to play effective shut-down roles on opposition tall forwards as well as key midfielders.



PAUL PLAYED HIS 50TH GAME IN THE ANNUAL LEN HALL ANZAC Game against Richmond at Subiaco Oval back in round 5. It was a fitting occasion for one of Fremantle's most skilful and well-liked players to reach his milestone.

Paul debuted in 2006 and, after a few lean seasons, has stamped himself as a star of the Fremantle team, playing mainly across half-back and in the midfield.



GARRICK REACHED HIS 50-GAME MILESTONE IN ROUND 13 against Carlton at Etihad Stadium, although it would have been much earlier had he not injured his shoulder in round 2.

The 22-year-old, who debuted in 2007, played every game in 2009, at times in a run-with role, and finished ninth in the best and fairest.

HAZE HITS 200

Loyal Fremantle servant, Paul Hasleby, reflects on his eleven years in football as he reaches a remarkable 200 games for the Fremantle Football Club. Story: Costa Kastanis

N ROUND 1 of 2000, an 18-yearold by the name of Paul Hasleby announced his arrival on the AFL scene with a record 30-possession effort on debut.

Eleven seasons after being taken by Fremantle as a priority selection in the 1999 AFL National Draft, the boy from the small town of Northampton, 50km north of Geraldton, played his 200th game for the club in round 13 against Carlton at Etihad Stadium.

And what a ride it has been for the now 29-year-old Freo champion.

Along his journey he has racked up an AFL Rising Star award in 2000, All Australian and International Rules selection in 2003 and four Ross Glendinning medals for best-on-ground in the Carlton Mid Derbies.

DEVASTATING

But for all the highs, Hasleby has also lived through some lows at the club, seeing off three coaches and suffering a devastating knee reconstruction in the 2008 pre-season.

Despite the injury, the midfielder never questioned his ability to reach the milestone and join club greats Shane Parker, Shaun McManus and Matthew Pavlich as the only players to play 200 games for the Fremantle Football Club.


"I was always confident in our medical staff that I would get back to full fitness and playing my best footy," Hasleby said.

The highlight of his time in footy has been the five minutes spent with his teammates after a win.

"We all get together, look each other in the eye, and there's a real sense of achievement," he said. "That feeling keeps you coming back to the well, and you want to get more of it. That's why I'm still here playing. That feeling, while it's been few and far between throughout my career, that's what brings me back."

Hasleby said it had been a privilege to play alongside such stars as Adrian Fletcher, Tony Modra, Peter Bell and Matthew Pavlich, while Troy Cook and Shaun McManus were the two hardest players he had played with.

Although Hasleby has had numerous personal achievements, he has not tasted much team success during his Fremantle career.



He even missed the club's first ever preliminary final appearance in 2006 because of injury, but these disappointments are driving a determined Hasleby to stick it out a bit longer and improve on his own game this season.

"I've played a bit of a different role," he said. "Gone are the days where I'd just play as a midfielder, I've added a few more strings to my bow.

"I can go and play on someone and shut them down, I can also go down forward and have a bit of an impact. I've been quietly happy with the way I'm tracking."

Fremantle skipper Matthew Pavlich arrived at the club in the same draft as Hasleby and he said they had got to know each other very well over the journey. "We've spent a lot of time together both professionally and socially," Pavlich said. "There's a huge amount of memories between Paul and I."

CONSISTENCY

Pavlich said Hasleby's milestone was a great feat for a man who was never gifted in terms of his pace or aerobic capacity.

"Paul has admitted himself, that he's never been athletically of a Stephen Hilltype capability, but he's someone who

> is a natural footballer and works extremely hard to get the best out of himself," he said. "It's testament to his consistency, and his ability to play the way he has over the journey has been impressive."

Hasleby credits the higher number of interchange rotations coaches utilise in modern football for helping to prolong his career, despite his shortcomings in the speed department.

"It's really helped me over the past couple of years," he said.

"I can still run games out provided I've had a little bit of a rest, which I've been getting.

"As the game gets quicker, the more experienced guys find another way and they start to use their smarts. Hopefully I can keep reinventing myself over the next couple of years to keep playing football at Fremantle."

Coach Mark Harvey said Hasleby was a valued and respected member of the club.

"He's got a good football brain and knows what it's all about," Harvey said. "His knowledge is always accepted among discussions at the club."

Harvey said that not many players who have had a knee reconstruction have managed to play 200 games.

"Paul has had the desire and mental toughness to get back from his injury and play a number of quality games, which has been great," he said. "He's a natural ball-winning, inside midfielder who, as an All Australian and a Rising Star winner, has acquitted himself in the best possible way for the team."

The coach also said that the best way to put the icing on Hasleby's career would be if the veteran finally achieved the ultimate team success at the club.

"He's had a lot of individual awards, but what he needs for when he retires is success," he said. "However long he plays, that's got to be his ultimate goal."

Pavlich said Hasleby would be remembered as a loyal servant of the club long after his career was finished.

"He has been around and persevered through the difficult times," Pavlich said. "He's a natural ball-winning, inside midfielder who, as an All Australian and a Rising Star winner, has acquitted himself in the best possible way for the team."

Hasleby's teammates made sure the champion midfielder's milestone game was one to remember, defeating Carlton at Etihad Stadium in round 13 and, in doing so, honouring one of the club's greatest warriors in a style he truly deserved. Integrated

Whet the dedicated group of development coaches who are working behind the

scenes to implement Fremantle's Elite Performance Program and ensure the progress of the club's young stocks doesn't miss a beat. Story: Costa Kastanis

REMANTLE coach Mark Harvey and his experienced band of assistants, Chris Scott, Dean Wallis, Barry Mitchell and Todd Curley are the men charged with the weekly task of steering the team to victory. Images of them in the coaching box during matches are streamed all over the country. To the outsider, it may appear that this group of men are wholly responsible for the performances of the 22 players who run out onto the ground every weekend and for the manmanagement of the rest of the squad who are striving to force their way in to the team. However, if you look closer into the mechanics of how Fremantle's football department

operates, you will find that the club's coaching team runs much deeper than that. Beneath the senior coach and his assistants is the club's Elite

Michael Prior

Performance Program, which is headed by Simon Lloyd. Having previously worked in key development, leadership and coaching roles at Hawthorn and Collingwood, Lloyd is in charge of the five-man team which is responsible for overseeing the development of the club's 25 first to third year players.

This team consists of former Fremantle players Justin Longmuir, Shaun McManus, Dean Solomon and Luke Webster, and former Essendon and West Coast player Michael Prior.

PSYCHOLOGY

Lloyd, who also has a background in psychology, said all five members of his team had brought something of their own to the group.

He had high praise for part-time development coach McManus, one of the most popular players to have ever worn the Fremantle jumper.

"Shaun's work ethic and professionalism as a footballer was tremendous," Lloyd said. "He works with his group of players on their technical and tactical development and he pushes that key message and dedication to the younger players."

Webster is the club's Player Development Manager and looks after the players off the field in terms of career and education, helping them to put together a plan to acquire the skills to be able to do something away from footy once their careers are over.

The induction of new recruits into the club is also an important part of his role.

"A lot of guys that get drafted from interstate have never lived away from home before, so it's part of my role to make that transition as comfortable as possible," Webster said. "I help those guys fit in and make sure they're looked after."

BETTER PLAYERS

Prior is tasked with fast-tracking the development of the club's youngsters, helping them become AFL footballers by ensuring they live elite lifestyles.

"Everything they do away from the footy club has to be based around becoming better players and trainers," Prior said. "Things like eating the right foods and what studies they are doing. We have to make sure when they get to the club they are not feeling slack or low on energy."

Justin Longmuir works as a development coach as well as a mentor for Fremantle's ruck brigade. He said he enjoyed his job because it was easier to watch footy from the

sidelines than it was to play.

BENEATH

"My role is to give the young guys an insight into my experiences from my time in the game and work closely to try and improve their game," he said.

One Freo ruckman that has improved his game has been Aaron Sandilands, but Longmuir is reluctant to take any credit for the ruckman's rise to elite status in the AFL.

"He looks after himself," Longmuir said. "There's not much I can teach him. I just fine tune him on some things that he may not have done too well on the weekends."

RIGOURS

Dean Solomon retired shortly before the season-proper began, after his knee could no longer handle the rigours of AFL football.

Following retirement as a player, he became a member of the coaching team and works closely with Lloyd and the development group, passing on the knowledge he has gained from a career that has included tutelage from legendary coach Kevin Sheedy and a premiership in 2000 with Essendon.

On match days he sits in the coaching box, helping Harvey oversee opposition tactics and find ways to nullify them. Lloyd said that having Dean Solomon on board as a development coach this season was a bonus for the club.

"The way Solly played the game was hard and honest and he demanded a lot from his teammates and that's the way he coaches," he said. "He drives a lot of our mechanisms in terms of defensive pressure."

HELPFUL

And Solomon said working with Lloyd has been extremely helpful for him in his first year in coaching.

"He communicates very well with the young guys," Solomon said of Lloyd. "His work ethic is second to none. His attention to detail is very good and the young guys draw a lot of confidence from him."

Prior said he had nothing but respect for Lloyd, who he said had brought a new level to the development side of the club.

"Lloydy is very thorough and professional in what he does," Prior said. "I've learned a hell of a lot from him.

"It's a work in progress but over the next few years it will be one of the best if not the best development program in the AFL."↓


WHERE ARE THEY NOW: PETER MANN

In this new feature, *Docker* catches up with past Freo players to see what they have been up to since finishing their playing days. In this first instalment, we speak to Peter Mann, who was a member of the inaugural team and the first ever Doig Medallist in 1995. Mann was club captain from 1997-98 before retiring in 1999 after 103 games of league football, including 77 for Fremantle.

What did you do after you finished playing football?

I moved to Melbourne and worked at a bank for a year. I then got approached by the playing group to work at the Australian Football League Players Association (AFLPA). That was when Andrew Demetriou moved over to the AFL. I had been the president when I was playing. My core focus was to continue to develop the Player Development program. I also studied an MBA during my time at the AFLPA. For the past two years I've primarily been working for myself and I'm currently involved in something called Text A Star. What do you miss most about playing football?

I miss the game. There's nothing like the feeling you get pre-game and the competitive nature of the game, with the camaraderie that you get whether you win or lose. You are in a unique situation of being involved with a group of people with a focused common goal and objective. That environment is very difficult to recreate in the outside world. I miss the complete focus that footy required.



What is your most cherished memory from your playing days?

I've got a few. Playing finals with North Melbourne would be right up there. I played in a finals series where we came a draw and played extra time against Hawthorn. We then unfortunately lost a preliminary final when Gary Ablett kicked a goal after the siren. Being a part of the creation of the Fremantle Football Club was a wonderful experience, too. That's something that, when I look back on, I always cherish.

Do you still see any of your old teammates?

I live in Melbourne now so I still catch up with a few of my old North Melbourne teammates. Fremantlewise, I'm very close with the current Fremantle football operations manager Chris Bond. I see Matthew Burton, Jason Norrish and Brad Wira from time to time. As you grow older, get families and move geographies, it gets harder to catch-up, but when we do, it's like we haven't been apart for long.

Do you watch much footy these days?

I do watch quite a bit of football. I really enjoy it. I follow Freo extremely closely and support them. It's been great watching them go through an evolution over the past two years, creating a young list and getting to where they are today. There's a lot of potential but there's still a lot of work to do. *How has football changed today compared to when you played?*

The pace of the game and the number of contests players engage in these days I find quite phenomenal. Especially in comparison to how we played footy in the 90s. We were nowhere near the level that it is at today. I actually like today's game more, as a spectator anyway.



Do you like watching any of the current Fremantle players?

Matthew Pavlich. I think within football circles he would be rated up there as one of the very best in the competition. I love the fact that he can play forward, back and midfield. There's very few who can do that. I'm also very impressed by the way Chris Tarrant goes about his football. He's made himself into one of the elite defenders in the competition and I hope he continues playing as long as possible because he is very important to the structure of our side. Young (Stephen) Hill is a very exciting footballer to watch, and little (Paul) Hasleby, I think what he's done to get himself back playing footy is a wonderful representation of how hard he's worked to get back after his knee injury. It's really good to see him playing at the level he is at right now. What do like to do in your spare time

these days? I have an 18-month-old daughter Amelia and my wife is 22 weeks pregnant. So besides work, I hang out with them and enjoy the activities that I do with them. Ψ




