Pavlich wins Player of the Year

AFTER ANOTHER outstanding season and on the back of his fourth All Australian selection, Matthew Pavlich has been awarded the Coca-Cola Zero Player of the Year, voted by Fremantle's members and supporters via the club's web site.

Pavlich received top votes in nine games during the home and away season, including five best-onground honours as voted by the fans.

The Coca-Cola Zero Player

of the week competition has been running on **fremantlefc.com.au** all season with fans entering their votes after each round.

Other players to receive the 'Coca-Cola Zero Player of the Week' award multiple times were Jeff Farmer, Shaun McManus and Josh Carr (three times each) and Ryan Crowley and Michael Johnson receiving top votes on two occasions.

Matthew was presented with his award by Tanya McCracken, Sports Sponsorship and Venue Manager for Coca-Cola Amatil (WA) prior to the first semi final. Congratulations Matthew and thank you to Gold Level Sponsor Coca-Cola for their support of this award in 2006.

Matthew finished first with 23 votes ahead of captain Peter Bell on 19 followed by Michael Johnson (13), Josh Carr (12), Shaun McManus (12), Jeff Farmer (13) and Ryan Crowley (9).

History Making Member Elections in 2006

IN A GROUND-BREAKING advancement in voting, Fremantle Football Club members are set to make Western Australian electoral history, when for the first time in any election in WA, members will be able to vote through the Internet for their new member-elected Board member. Postal voting will again be available for those who prefer this method.

The exciting new initiative is being used by the Western Australian Electoral Commission in November's member-elected Director election as an alternative to postal voting. Many months of hard work have gone in to making Internet voting a possibility, giving members the convenience of casting their vote from their own computer.

With current member-elected Board member Les Everett's two year term expiring on 30 November this year, members will be asked to vote for a member-elected Board member for a two year term from 1 December 2006 to 30 November 2008.

Voting is only open to voting club members who are fully paid up as at 20 October 2006. It is important that members retain their 2006 Membership Card as the membership number is essential in order to complete the on-line voting procedures.

Voting club members will receive all information on the election directly from the Electoral Commission. The club will have no other role in the election other than to supply the Commission with the current names and postal addresses of voting club members as at 20 October 2006. It is therefore important that the club has every member's current postal address. If your postal details have changed during the last twelve months please notify the club in writing before 20 October 2006.

The 2006 Members Meeting will be held on 30 November 2006 and members will be posted a Notice of Meeting. This is the annual meeting for members at which the results of the 2006 elections will be announced for the member elected representative to the Board of Directors of the Fremantle Football Club. Members are encouraged to visit the club's web site where election and Members Meeting details will be regularly updated.

Acting Western Australian Electoral Commissioner Warwick Gately said he was delighted with the development of Internet voting and the cooperation between the club and the Commission which has made this revolutionary concept a reality.

"Internet voting is a safe, secure and convenient way for Fremantle members to have their say in electing a new appointment to the Board of Directors," Mr Gately said.

"Hard work and collaboration between the Commission and club management has given members the chance to contribute to the very first election of this kind in the State.

"With confidentiality a guarantee, we expect that many members will take advantage of the convenience and ease of voting over the Internet."

The Electoral Commission will use the experience and outcomes of the November election process to look at further developing the Internet voting concept in other elections.

As in any election, members may only vote once, whether they choose to vote through the Internet or by post. All members will be provided with detailed voting instructions from the Electoral Commission for both methods of voting to ensure all votes received are valid.

Any queries on the election process should be directed to the Commission's free phone help line on 13 63 06 and selecting the Fremantle Football Club Election Helpdesk.

A Voting Club Member does not include Associate Members or any member under the age of 18.



TROY COOK has joined together with eighteen other high profile Western Australians to become a 'be active' WA Ambassador, championing the urgency and importance of getting Western Australians to be more active, more often.

- "The aim of the Taskforce is to try and get the community as a whole to change their habits and actually make an effort to exercise, even find 30 minutes a day for a walk with family or friends."

Evidence is now overwhelming that declining levels of physical activity is a problem for the whole community and requires everyone's effort to lead more active and healthier lives.

Research by the task force has revealed that nearly half of Western Australian adults are not physically active for good health, and it also shows that 60 per cent of men, 40 per cent of women and a quarter of Western Australian children are overweight or obese.

The 'be active' WA Ambassadors provide a tremendously strong support base to help champion this increasingly urgent issue to the community.

"It's important that the changes start today and I am looking forward to playing my part as one of the Ambassadors," said Cook. ●

FREMANTLE officially launched an Aligned Club partnership with the Balmain AFL Football Club in Sydney in July to assist with the development of senior and junior AFL teams in the Sydney district.

Matthew Pavlich and Paul Hasleby were on hand to officially welcome Balmain as an affiliate club to Fremantle, that will see the Balmain Tigers become the Balmain Dockers next year.

As part of Fremantle's Aligned Club programme, the Balmain AFL Football Club will wear the Fremantle playing uniform from season 2007 onwards, proudly supplied to the club by Fremantle. Balmain, one of nine teams in the Sydney league, are coached by former Melbourne player Andrew Leoncelli.

"I've been wearing a Tigers jumper, which has been hard enough to deal with, so I'm looking forward to the change to Fremantle gear next season," Leoncelli said.

- "It is projected that more than 19,000 people in Western Australia will have been diagnosed with dementia by the end of this year."

Players Push Prevention Campaign

FIRST TIME dads, Peter Bell and Roger Hayden, got right behind Ngala to promote the Shaken Baby Syndrome Prevention Campaign as part of Child Protection Week, which ran from 3-9 September 2006. Peter, with eleven-month old daughter Poppy, and Roger, with one-and-a-half year old son Isaiah, were pleased to be able to lend a hand in educating the community and raising awareness of Shaken Baby Syndrome.

Shaken Baby Syndrome is a term used to describe the damage caused when a baby is shaken, which can occur when a parent or carer feels frustrated and distressed from trying to settle a crying baby.

Of course all babies cry and this is normal, but constant crying can be very frustrating and confusing. This can lead to the baby being shaken to try and stop the crying, which can cause permanent brain damage and even death.

A baby's brain is more fragile than an egg so shaking a baby, even for a few seconds, can be life threatening. Therefore, through education, Ngala offers parents advice on how to calm babies down and look for causes that maybe unsettling the baby.

"This syndrome is 100 per cent preventable and I am pleased to be behind this campaign to help get the message out there that you should never shake your baby," said Hayden.

"If we can educate the community and promote the services of Ngala, hopefully we can prevent deaths and injuries to infants and younger children from the effects of shaking. It is a valuable message," he said.

Wheelie Challenge creates awareness

JEFF FARMER and Antoni Grover took part in a 'Wheelie Challenge' at Fremantle Oval in August to help raise awareness of Cerebral Palsy (CP).

The theme of the fun challenge was 'wheel a mile in my shoes' and saw both players switching their footy boots for a power wheelchair and developing a different set of tactics for their fierce competitors!

The challenge began with Jeff and Antoni racing one another around a number of strategically placed obstacles at Fremantle Oval leading up to the big race against CP sufferers, with young Sebastian taking home the trophy in a close final against 'The Wiz'.

Cerebral Palsy Association of WA (CPAWA) Chief Executive John Knowles said that there was nothing like a challenge to know what its like to have physical limitations.

- "People living with CP face serious obstacles and setbacks in their everyday lives," Mr Knowles said.
- "It is through activities such as this challenge that CPAWA endeavours to generate awareness and acceptance of CP in the broader community," he said.

Jeff and Antoni undertook the challenge as Ambassadors for

CPAWA as part of Fremantle Football Club's charity partnership with CPAWA in 2006.

This year CPAWA, celebrates 55 years of creating opportunities to people living with CP. This is a tremendous achievement for the organisation and the milestone was officially celebrated during CP Awareness Week which was held nationally from 6 to 13 August.

With the average career of an AFL player only 3.2 years, the hard work continues every day. There will be others coming along behind them that will challenge for their spots on the team. In the ultra competitive and demanding environment that is AFL, the hard work and commitment to training, learning and developing as players and individuals will not stop.

Each has played a part in a season that has set many records and resulted in Fremantle finishing third and playing in a finals campaign for only the second time in its history. But they can take the time to look back and reflect on what has been accomplished so far. STEVEN DODD

Moving to a new high school is a daunting experience for anyone but when you're a budding footballer faced with the prospect of heading to a school that doesn't even have a footy oval it can be overwhelming.

Even though that was the situation thrust in front of a young Steven Dodd, the tenacious teenager didn't let it affect his dream of playing at the highest level. The determination that's evident when he's in action each week for Fremantle helped him overcome this early hurdle.

"It probably wasn't the ideal move for someone wanting to be an AFL footballer but I was still able to play with my local club on the weekends," Dodd said.

"I was lucky that my junior club was in the East Fremantle recruiting zone and they invited me down to train with them at Colts level when I was 16."

He'd make the 45 minute bus trip to East Fremantle Oval three times a week after school and his efforts didn't go unnoticed with Fremantle's recruiting staff adding him to the rookie list in 2003.

"The rookie list was an excellent opportunity to be a part of an AFL club and train with some of the players that you look up to. It really helped my development and from then on in it was up to me to prove I could perform at the top level," he said.

"To be part of an AFL club was something I really wanted since I was in year seven. I was an Eagles supporter in those days but when Fremantle joined the AFL I switched to support them and to have an opportunity to play for the team you support is fantastic."

His introduction to the game came at an early age with his passionate football parents supporting him every step of the way.

"Dad has only missed one game since I started playing football, even as a junior. It's obviously now pretty difficult to be at all our away games in the eastern states so he's always camped in front of the TV to watch. I think the game he missed was an under 13's game – he is pretty passionate!" Dodd said with a laugh.

The family connection to Fremantle goes back to 1998 when Steven's cousin Brad made his AFL debut at the club. Brad played 50 games in six years but was delisted the same year that his younger relative arrived at Fremantle.

"Unfortunately I didn't get a chance to play an AFL game with him but we did play in the same team at East Fremantle and we went head to head when he was at Claremont."

"I always followed his footy pretty closely and watched how he went about it and tried to follow in his footsteps. That gave me added incentive knowing that someone in my family had achieved at the highest level."

Part way through his second year on the club's rookie list Dodd was elevated to the senior squad



and given the opportunity he had dreamed about for so long. Torrential rain and a freak cold snap greeted the team at Skilled Stadium and set the scene for an unforgettable debut.

"I flew over as an emergency with the team to play the Cats but never really thought I was going to play after only being elevated from the rookie list a few weeks earlier.

"One of the guys had to pull out just before the team ran out for the game so I quickly suited up and didn't even have a chance to ring anyone back home to let them know I was playing. The first that Mum and Dad knew about me playing was when they saw me run through the banner.

"It was disappointing that we lost the game but I still remember the coach saying to me as we boarded the bus that I was an AFL player now and no one can ever take that from me.

"From there I was determined to continue to push for selection and put everything I had into pre-season and managed to play 16 games in 2005 which exceeded my own expectations. For me it had a snowball effect, the more I played the more I felt I could contribute to the team. It has been an amazing ride and I don't want it to end."

That ride was interrupted last season when a lapse in judgement cost Dodd his place after disobeying team rules. It was a harsh lesson but much was learned.

"I've had my ups and downs and made the poor decisions off the field but I think I have used that as a learning experience. Part of being a young person growing up is the challenge of achieving a balance in your life and being able to get the best out of yourself no matter what you do."

"You have to take the inevitable public focus you get as an AFL player in your stride. We choose to be a part of this industry and have to accept some degree of pressure from the media and public.

"As long as you get a good balance in your life then it doesn't have an impact on your ability to perform at your best for the club. That's the most important thing."

BRETT PEAKE

From fixing leaky taps to booting miraculous goals in front of tens of thousands of fans, you'd be hard pressed to find a player on Fremantle's list that has experienced such a life changing few years than dynamic midfielder Brett Peake.

"Three years ago I was wandering around with a spanner in my back pocket, a tape measure and PVC pipe in either hand. I wouldn't have even dreamt about playing in an AFL finals campaign. It's surreal but a fantastic experience," Peake said.

You might think that with a champion footballer as a father (Brian Peake played 402 games of VFL and WAFL football) it would be a natural progression for the youngster to follow in his footsteps but that's not how he saw it. A love of the game was put aside as he pursued his passion of sun and surf. A plumbing apprenticeship filled his days while surfing absorbed his spare time. Football didn't have a chance to take hold.

"When I was little I wanted to follow in his footsteps and as I started getting older and found other avenues in life it became something I thought of less and less. I was at the beach every chance I got."

It was a casual game or two for the Willetton amateurs that whet his appetite for footy and the remarkable rise to being an AFL player began.

"I really came into the AFL in such a funny way that it still confuses me.

"One year I was playing F Grade Amateurs, the next year league footy at East Fremantle and then onto an AFL list, I don't think it has really sunk in yet."

Peake admits that being drafted as Fremantle's



first father-son selection he did feel added pressure from those who expected results on the field sooner rather than later.

"I guess there was an external expectation for me to consolidate a place in the team and when that didn't happen straight away you start to get a bit distracted. But that's just part of being an AFL footballer. It helped me to understand that you just need to work as hard as you possibly can and the rest will take care of itself."

He sought advice from his Dad and, importantly, the leaders at Fremantle. With their help he formulated an approach to the game that has ultimately brought success and hasn't compromised his happy-go-lucky nature.

"I haven't changed anything about myself but understand that there is a time when you need to be serious and approach things with a mature and clear mindset.

"At this level of footy there is so much at stake but I try not to let that get into my head because for me it's probably better to just play my natural game and not think about the consequences of messing up a kick. At the same time I'm constantly striving to be the best player I can for Fremantle and contribute to the team in a positive way.

"There are definitely times around the club when you can have a laugh and the group we have here is fantastic and know when the time is right to have some fun. Belly is a perfect example of that, he can laugh and play tricks, yet he is the first one to switch on and know when the tasks ahead need to be addressed. He is the perfect leader, you couldn't ask for anything more. I have learnt a lot from him as do the other guys here who hold him in really high regard."

While the physical demands of top level footy are on show each week there is a component that

is less obvious. Mentally preparing for life in the AFL is a challenge that the best have mastered and something Peake quickly came to understand is a necessity to ensure optimum performance.

"Being able to bounce back if you've had a disappointing game is important, particularly when you're just starting out. I think most of the young guys put pressure on themselves to perform well because you want to be able to retain your spot in the side.

"There are 44 players on the list and only 22 get the opportunity to play in the seniors each week, which leaves a lot of guys watching from the sidelines. You know that there are players who are desperate to take your spot. That's not being callous, they just want what everyone on the list does and that's to play at the highest level.

"We're all aiming for the same thing here and that's to have success for the Fremantle Football Club. We know that each of us can play a role in achieving that whether we're on the field or not."

Peake describes himself as an Energiser Bunny, which is an apt description considering his ranking at the top of the club's beep test and endurance ratings.

He takes nothing for granted and understands there's still much he has to learn but he is genuinely excited about what the future holds and isn't about to take a backward step as he continues to live the dream.

"You're always learning, from your first game to your last and that's the way I've approached playing at this level. I enjoy the new experiences each time I step onto the field. My motto has always been 'live each day like it's your last' because you never know when your situation might change and I love to give things a shot and do my best."

DAVID MUNDY

Finding time and space to execute skills under pressure are vital components in any modern footballer's arsenal. For Fremantle defender David Mundy they're natural gifts which he's putting to good use in the heat of battle, but just don't ask him how he does it.

"To be honest I don't notice it on the field," he said.

"I only really see it and give it any thought when we review the game tapes during the week. I've had people ask me how I go about it since under 15's and I don't really know how to answer them — I guess I'm just lucky."

He found out early that luck can turn when least expected, an injury at the start of 2005 delayed a possible debut in round one and served as a reminder that nothing can be taken for granted.

"I was playing in the pre-season and from all reports the coaches were pretty happy with how I was going but then I hurt my knee and that kept me out for about a month and it made me think how quickly your luck can change in this game.

"It was my first injury niggle since arriving in WA and was frustrating because I thought I was pretty close to getting my first game. At the start of the season everyone wants to put their best foot forward

"I was disappointed initially but that's just another aspect of the mental toughness that is needed in this game. There have been so many players that haven't ever really had the opportunity to play because of injuries and I try to use that to put my own situation into perspective."

His chance came six weeks later at the 'home of football' when Fremantle defeated Melbourne in a classic shoot out at the MCG in round six, 2005. He went on to play the remainder of the season,

finish third in the AFL Rising Star Award and win Fremantle's Beacon Award as best young talent at the club.

He has continued that winning start and grown in stature this season, playing every game and cementing his place in the club's exciting young backline.

"You look at someone like Matthew Pavlich who holds the record at Fremantle for consecutive games and see the effort he makes to be able to get up for every round and perform like he does. The example he sets is one I'd like to follow."

The privilege of playing finals football so early in his career isn't lost on Mundy.

"We play this game to win grand finals. Obviously being new to the competition and not being in a finals series before it's something that was really exciting and after getting a taste of finals football I can't wait to play in as many as I can and one day reach the ultimate goal of a premiership.

"To be part of finals at Fremantle alongside guys like Shaun McManus and Shane Parker who have been here from day one and have done so much hard work to get the club to this point is very special."

While most young men his age can let their hair down on a regular basis it's a luxury that isn't afforded to AFL players and the 21 year old takes a philosophical approach to the sacrifices needed to achieve at the highest level.

"There are definitely sacrifices you have to make but at the same time you gain so much from being in this environment. The club gives you a lot of support not just only to improve your football ability but also with life in general.

"It's what we want to do and we love doing it. In the end the sacrifices aren't that great compared with the rewards of doing something you have dreamed about doing for so long."

Away from the field Mundy is learning to play the guitar and is regularly testing the patience of team mates Luke McPharlin and Paul Duffield who



have taken it upon themselves to show him the basics. At this stage he can manage to strum out a couple of tunes but admits it's a work in progress!

He has also found another interest that has blossomed from one of the more mundane duties as a footballer based in the west. Travelling every second week has inspired him to find a hobby to fill the hours spent crossing the nation.

"I didn't read many books at school but since I've been flying backwards and forwards across the country it has motivated me to give it a shot and I really enjoy it.

"I started one on a flight during the season and got so engrossed in it that I managed to read almost the entire 600 pages on the one weekend," he laughed.

Ryan Crowley's wake up call felt like a sledgehammer. Delisted after two years at Fremantle the youngster admits his football dream quickly turned into a nightmare on that fateful day.

"I thought I'd blown my chance," he said.

"I remember turning the key to start the car and the next thing I knew I was home. There were so many things just running through my head. I had always thought that my life was going to turn out a certain way and right at that moment it was looking like it was going to veer off.

"After I was delisted I had doubts if I was good enough and I had to do some soul searching.

"It was a tough time but I had some great support and I made my mind up that I still wanted to achieve my dream of playing at the highest level and I set about doing that. Playing in the AFL is





"I knew coming into the team that there were several guys that played the same sort of position as me and so I'd have to change my game a little bit. I started my first few games forward but the coach said to me that there is a chance for me to establish myself if I could take on the tagging role. I've tried to be more than just a stopper and if the opportunity is there I like to be a bit more offensive and put pressure back on my opponent.

"The jobs I've been given have seen me up against some of the game's great players and I can learn from them and the way they go about trying to win the ball.

"The boys have said to me that those first 30 to 40 games are where you learn the most. I've been given different roles so far and I've been learning different ways to play on blokes. We've got great role models at the club, you can't get a better role model than Peter Bell. I have learnt so much from him and also Josh Carr, who gives me tips and advice out on the field which is great."

Crowley said establishing a routine at home was an important step in his on-field success and the player welfare programs at Fremantle have helped in achieving that balance. He has also just completed a small business course and will now undertake a Sports Science degree at Notre Dame University.

"After I came to terms with what I had to do away from football, and it became second nature, that was when my football started to take off.

"I didn't think I was immature when I first arrived at the club but I guess there were a lot of things in life that I hadn't done."

Not even a couple of injury stints this season has changed his positive outlook on life and football and for the sake of his family and friends they hope it's not too often he's forced to watch the team in action from the sidelines.

"I'm not the best person to watch football with – especially in public. I'm pretty jumpy and find myself commentating and everyone around me just

looks and laughs," he joked.

"I remember in round 19 Paul Hasleby and I went to the Seaview Hotel to watch the boys play Adelaide at AAMI Stadium and it was a fantastic win. There was a big crowd at the pub and everyone sung the song afterwards and I couldn't help but sing a few bars myself!"

Such is the unforgiving nature of life in the AFL that just when you find your feet the grass can be pulled from underneath you. That's what faced young forward Ryan Murphy late this season when an untimely injury ruled him out of Fremantle's remaining games of the home and away season.

"Perhaps the toughest part of AFL footy is the highs and lows," he said.

"The highs are amazing and the lows are pretty tough. Some injuries really knock you about and the timing of them can be frustrating especially when you're just getting that opportunity as a young player to establish yourself in the team.

"I have always wanted to portray a positive attitude. I pride myself on being happy around the club and if I miss out on selection or suffer an injury then I'll set about doing everything I can to get myself back where I want to be and to lend support to my team mates when they need it.

"What the timing of the injury did highlight is that you can't take the game for granted and you have to be prepared to deal with disappointments. It really makes you appreciate the opportunities that come your way and to be living the dream of playing football at the highest level is amazing."

It's almost three years since Murphy first set foot in Fremantle and he now considers himself a

what I've wanted to do my entire life and I know I would have felt like there was something missing if I didn't give it my best shot."

In a rare second chance at the top level Fremantle threw the talented utility player a football lifeline on the Rookie List.

"I guess when I first came to the club I would only do the bare minimum of what was required at training and in the gym and then I'd leave.

"Part of the realisation I came to was that I was coming from the back of the line so I'd have to be doing the extra stuff to give me an edge. We have some great role models in that area around the club and you can see what they have been able to accomplish so I pushed myself as hard as possible and knew that any let up in my intensity could see me tumble backwards."

Starting 2005 on the rookie list there was still plenty of work that Crowley needed to do to realise his childhood dream. A tough pre-season paying dividends, and after some outstanding performances for Subiaco he was given his chance on the senior list as a long term injury upgrade. The long awaited debut came at Skilled Stadium against the Cats, and for Crowley and Fremantle it was definitely worth the wait. The club won for the first time in Geelong and the new boy booted three goals to equal the club record for goals scored on debut.

"The game was such a blur. It went so quickly and all of a sudden it was over and the boys were congratulating me. I remember thinking how good is this!

"It was the first time in my mind that I thought I belonged at this level and at Fremantle. The guys had always treated me well and I liked being around the club but, for me, until I played I didn't feel as though I was in the inner sanctum and it was like a weight had been lifted off my back."

Now he had a taste for AFL action the immediate challenge was to maintain his spot and develop versatility in his game.





local, despite admitting he knew very little about his new home when plucked from country Victoria in the 2003 AFL National Draft.

"To tell you the truth I didn't have much of a clue about WA and I always thought Freo was in the top half of the state," he laughed.

"Coming from the country where you know all the back streets, to a city that you knew nothing about certainly made getting around interesting to say the least. But it didn't worry me at all because I was just excited about going to training and being a part of the club. I would wake up two or three hours before I'd have to leave and arrive 45 minutes before everyone else and just be sitting in the car waiting to get stuck into it," he said with a smile.

The transition was also made easier with several mates arriving in Fremantle courtesy of the same draft. Ryley Dunn, David Mundy and Adam Campbell all played country footy for Victoria and had spent time together over a couple of years.

"I was really happy when I heard their names being called and it was like a bunch of mates were all going to the same place."

"We have all formed a strong bond and can talk about anything. It's like we're brothers."

A tall skinny kid with few expectations about pulling on a Fremantle jumper in his first year, Murphy's form in front of goal for WAFL club South Fremantle couldn't be ignored. His debut was an unforgettable moment, and had added significance as the club recorded its first victory against Adelaide at AAMI Stadium and Matthew Pavlich celebrated his 100th game.

"My locker is right next to Pav's and he is like my mentor at the moment. I hope he doesn't read this because he'll get a big head," he laughed.

"I watch how he goes about his preparation and I try to follow in his footsteps. If I can achieve half as much as he has then I'll be going OK because he is such a fantastic player and a great person to be around."

Off the field Murphy gladly takes times to lend his support to the club's community projects and this season was an Ambassador for the Starlight Purple Haze game.

"The whole club prides themselves on putting back into the community and it's terrific to be a part of that. Bringing a smile to someone's face is such a rewarding experience and I think I get as much out of it as the kids do.

"I learnt a lot about the Starlight Foundation and the fantastic work that they are doing. Knowing that I have had a hand in helping raise awareness and much needed funds for this great organisation is reward enough."

It's with that attitude that Murphy looks to the future. With 24 games already under his belt he has set a platform to springboard into another solid preseason and reclaim a place in Fremantle's attack.

"Everything I have experienced at Fremantle has come together to make the past three years of my life the best so far and I'm sure there will be many more great times ahead. The future is really bright for us."

They say persistence pays off and Fremantle defender Michael Johnson is a classic example. Being overlooked in two National Drafts is enough for many young footballers to question their future but for some it's a challenge they meet head on.

"In 2002 I was asked to go to the draft camp in WA and went OK there. When draft day came around I was overlooked and that was pretty disappointing. As a young footballer you want to play at the highest level but I didn't get that chance, so I went back to the WAFL and really took it upon myself to have a good season in the seniors.

"I cemented a spot at centre-half back in Perth's league squad and played every game and at the end of that year I was invited to the AFL Draft Camp in Canberra, but was overlooked again that year.

"I tried not to let the disappointment of being overlooked in two drafts get me down and focused on what I could do to prove I was good enough."

He received his chance as Fremantle's only selection in the 2004 Pre-season Draft and spent the year developing his game in the WAFL, and his body shape under the watchful eye of the club's conditioning staff.

The chance to showcase his wares on the national stage came with an invitation to play in the 2005 Indigenous All-Stars game against the Western Bulldogs in Darwin. Alongside Fremantle team mates Troy Cook, Jeff Farmer, Dion Woods and Des Headland he immersed himself in the experience.

"I'm really proud of my Indigenous heritage and playing football has given a lot of joy to my family and relatives. It's fantastic that clubs are recruiting so many Indigenous players and we have seen again this season the excitement that aboriginal players bring into the league.

"When we go on camps and head out to the remote communities and see all of those families and kids with such big smiles you know they really appreciate the time you take to spend with them. Giving something back to Indigenous people is something that is important to me as an AFL footballer."

A solid performance in that game thrust his name in front of Fremantle's match committee and it was only four games into the season when he was called upon for his first match. Much like his entry into the AFL system it was hardly a conventional debut. Travelling as an emergency he was given the news of his inclusion in the team after Matthew Carr was ruled out with illness on the morning of the game.



Such is the calibre of Johnson that he has used the challenges thrown at him to take his football to the next level and this season has played every game, taken part in a finals campaign and received his first WA State of Origin honour.

"Everything has been terrific. I'm doing something I love and playing the greatest sport in the world."

"I supported Fremantle when I was growing up and being able to play for the club you support is great. I went to all the games with my Dad and now to be running onto the field knowing that he is watching from the stands is a dream come true."

Johnson will have another fan watching from the outer after he and partner Dayna welcomed the arrival of their first child, daughter Amelia, prior to the round 21 Carlton Mid Derby.

"She surprised us all by arriving earlier than expected but it has been a fantastic experience. We have a lot of family support and the footy club has been really helpful as well."

He says he's learning on the job when it comes to changing nappies and other baby related duties, but he's already shown a real knack for helping kids, albeit a little older than Amelia, as part of an AFL traineeship.

"I worked at my high school in Belmont and helped out in the phys ed department. I took the year eight and nine boys in their sports classes and I really enjoyed it.

"Whenever I'm down at the local shopping centre I see the kids there and have a chat to them. They all know I play for Fremantle and love talking about the footy which I'm more than happy to do and it's like we're back on the school oval kicking the footy."

While teaching is an option for life after footy, he still has a long career on the field ahead of him and there's little doubt he's up for the challenges ahead

After twelve years in the competition Fremantle is seeing the first batch of players who supported the club as kids finding their way into the senior squad. While it's a difficult prospect at AFL level to play at the club you supported, with the draft seeing players spread across the country, for those that do it's a special motivation to leave your mark in history.

It's something that's close to the heart of hardworking utility Daniel Gilmore. His grandfather is written into the history books at the Western Bulldogs as a member of their first (and only) premiership winning team in 1954. As a passionate Fremantle supporter growing up Gilmore has a chance to emulate that at the port.

"The team my grandfather was part of is held in such high regard by everyone at that club. At Fremantle we have a unique opportunity to leave a legacy as well," he said.

"The first Fremantle team that tastes ultimate success will be remembered forever. There is a really good mix at the club and as long as we gel together and don't get ahead of ourselves we can achieve success together."

Gilmore graduated from Fremantle's rookie list and has endured the ups and downs of AFL life. Good form at South Fremantle kept him in the selection mix last season but he played just two games and was named as an emergency nine times.

"That certainly was tough but it comes with the territory of playing at this level. I took the positives out of it, thrived on the journey back into selection and saw it as a great challenge of my character.

"There are plenty of people that have lent their support throughout my football career from inside and outside the footy club and in some ways I'm pleased for the experience because I cherish every moment that I spend at the club."

"Last year I didn't really know what to expect or what was around the corner, but all I could do was work my way through it and luckily enough I've taken a step forward this season and hope to continue to take more steps in the future."

His efforts in 2005 were rewarded with a WAFL premiership medallion plus first hand experience of playing in a finals-type environment.

"The best thing about playing in a flag with South Fremantle was learning about what kind of chemistry a team needs to have to achieve success. We had so many guys driving towards that goal you knew nothing was going to stand in our way.

"If you play D grade amateurs, WAFL or AFL, the chemistry in the group needs to be there and I can feel that at Fremantle."

His duties at the club expanded this season as a member of 'Team Freo', a group of nine young players who help to deliver part of Fremantle's Community Development Programme into schools across Western Australia.

"Its really rewarding going into a classroom to see the kids faces. If we've had a win or not on the weekend doesn't matter to them, they're happy that we have taken the time to visit. It gives you the motivation to make that experience the best it can be for them"

The tag of role model is one that sits comfortably with Gilmore who says he looked up to many people as inspiration during his childhood including footballers and family members.

"Whether the kids we talk to have the dream of playing in the AFL or not I just try to show them that by working hard you can achieve anything you set your mind to."

With a football career on the rise and life experiences to back it up there's plenty of wisdom in this young player's words.

The number of Fremantle players represented in this year's State of Origin team is a reflection of the club's outstanding 2006 season.



The Pre-Season Draft brought Craig Nettlebeck to Fremantle from Melbourne and sent Peter Bell to North Melbourne. Tony Godden joined Fremantle as an uncontracted player selection from West Coast.

The new season was the AFL's Centenary Year and would see 21 year old Michael Voss tie for the Brownlow Medal with Essendon's James Hird, Tony Lockett take the Coleman Medal after kicking 114 goals, Ben Cousins win the Rising Star Award, Corey McKernan voted as

the MVP by the AFL Players Association, Jeremy Wasley win the Sandover Medal as the Best and Fairest in the WAFL. 
On Sacred Ground Winner!
