We have seen them experience what they have dreamt about as boys while former Kangaroo Dylan Smith showed us what he can do. We look forward to their development in the future.

We remain a club with an exciting future and we are continuing to forge ahead. As we both know, the rollercoaster we rode this year will probably be there for us to ride again in the future. And, like you, I don't always enjoy that ride, but then again that is the nature of AFL. It always has been and always will be.

For most 17 year olds, the thought of moving away from home to establish themselves in a completely different state and a totally foreign environment is daunting. It takes self confidence and courage to actually make the move and a real passion to chase their dreams.

Player

AN AFL CAREER involves many sacrifices, home life, social life and even for some education. But to make the transition a positive experience the club has put into place a strong support network, that works hard to ensure the player can eventually call Perth home.

Lee Walker is the Fremantle Football Club's Development Manager. He, together with Player Liaison Officer Steph Neesham and Team Manager Brent Dawkins, is responsible for maintaining a communication network between the player, the player's family interstate and the player's host family here in WA.


Lee believes Fremantle has a fantastic circle of people who go above and beyond for their players, including the coaching staff.

"You just couldn't go to a club with a more supportive network of people who really care for individuals," he said.

A former AFL player himself, Lee said he thinks his own experiences as a player has improved his understanding of what is needed for the players of today.

 $\mbox{``I}$ usually just put myself in their shoes," he said.

"I mean right down to how they feel about moving to Perth and how their families would feel in the situation. It's a fine balance because you want the player to learn for themselves but we have to provide a



professional support network to make sure the individual is being looked after and that simply comes down to communication.

"It's our responsibility to ensure they find a suitable host family and to then maintain the communication link between the family and the club.

"I try to speak to the host family once every fortnight and the family interstate once a month. That way I know that everyone is happy. It is amazing what issues arise. You never know what the day ahead is going to throw at you. It's a combination of being a teacher as well as a counsellor".

There are many issues a player can face in his time at an AFL Club, the disappointment of being dropped, the heartache of being injured, the distress of homesickness, or the fear of underachieving. It is at these times that Lee's role becomes crucial to the future success of the club.

"When a player is injured in a game I make it straight to the rooms to see him. We then automatically establish a direct line of communication with the player's family, whether they are here or in the Eastern States.

"Again you just need to understand that if the player were my son, I would want to know what was going on, and if I was the player I would want my family to stop worrying.

"For the guys from here, their family or mum and dad at least, are taken straight down to the rooms if required."

Along with being the prime communicator for the players at Fremantle, Lee also assumes the role of co-ordinating the various education programmes for the players.

"After their first year the players move into the Developing Leaders group. They participate in various seminars covering defensive driving, public speaking, financial planning, family planning, law, healthy living and they even take cooking classes run by Alex and Simon Eastaugh."

"At the end of the 14 week program each player presents back to the board and WA Police Commissioners their own thoughts on leadership and hopes for their football career.

"We do as much as we can to really develop our players and bring out the best in them.

"It's the little things that we do as a club to help a player make WA become home."

It's not just the weather, the friendly people or the success of the team. It's the behind the scenes efforts of so many people that help make a football club.


The club's 2005 "Clash" playing strip made


C - PURPLE HAZE PLAYING STRIP

D - CLASH PLAYING STRIP






Chris takes Fremantle to far north

Their First Year...

Being an AFL club's first round selection at the National AFL Draft is undoubtedly a big responsibility. There is that underlying pressure to succeed and for Fremantle's first selection at the 2003 National AFL Draft (number 10 overall) Ryley Dunn, the rules were no different.

originally from Shepparton in country Victoria, Ryley was selected in the team to travel to Darwin to take on Essendon in Round one of the Wizard Cup after only two months of pre-season training.

He then went on to make his AFL debut in the Round one game against Carlton at Subiaco Oval.

"I never thought I would play my first game this year," he said.

"Everyone was telling me not to expect to play so I came with the attitude of just trying my best all the time.

"But when I found out that I was going to be playing in round one it was amazing. The club brought my family over as their special guests, which was really great, and I just tried to focus on the game.

"I managed to get some sleep the night before and because the game was in the afternoon I had to sit around all morning just waiting.

"But once I got to the ground the whole thing went pretty quickly... and I took a lot out of the experience."

Ryley was again selected in the Round 2, game against Sydney and in Round 3 he made his debut with East Fremantle, his allocated WAFL club. His good form in the WAFL continued until Round 11 when he broke his collarbone.

- "I found it really hard to cope in the first month, I was pretty down about not being able to do anything," he said.
- "I couldn't train at all so all I could do was some cycling and a bit of swimming... I even went home for a week to see family and to get through it, but it was hard.
- "After that initial month you cope better because you come to terms with it, and you start to get back to normal, doing your training.
- "This was my first ever real long term injury... but I have learnt that it's a mental thing and you have to get stronger so you realise that you have another year next year.
- "If I ever get injured again I think I will be better able to cope with it."

Even with a year of mixed emotions, Ryley is adamant he has benefited from his first year at the club.

"I have taken such a lot out of the year just being able to play my first game, the training, the team meetings and learning the structures... it all helps," he said.

- "I haven't had as much game time as I would have liked but I have learnt heaps and am honestly not disappointed about my year.
- "I have had limited opportunities and I think I did well with the time that I did have... so I am pretty happy."

Now with his injury out of the way, Ryley is looking forward to his pre-season.

"I am focusing on the pre-season, I want to get through it without any trouble and try and get as fit as I can.

"Really all I want to do is do exactly what I did this year, minus the injury, all over again."

Originally from Traralgon in Victoria, Ryan Murphy made the trip to Fremantle after being selected at number 12 overall in the 2003 National AFL Draft.

ON ARRIVAL HE was a tall, lean teenager with an almighty kick. Since then he has had an exciting year at Fremantle, first being in outstanding form for South Fremantle in the WAFL and then making his AFL debut in the latter part of the year.

"I have settled into life in Perth very easily," he laughed.

Ryan knew one of his primary objectives for 2004 would be to bulk up and gain physical strength to assist his game. He coped well with his first pre-season

and absorbed the information necessary to become a successful AFL player.

His excellent attitude was rewarded in the Wizard Regional Challenge series when Ryan was told he would line up alongside one of football's all time greats, Wayne Carey.

"I hadn't even been here two months," he said.

"When I first found out I I was petrified actually.

"When he started to walk over to me he spoke to me and asked how I was going and how I had found the pre-season, it was totally awesome."

Ryan then went on to become one of the leading goal kickers in the WAFL competition for South Fremantle and the ultimate reward for his hard work came in Round 16 when he was told he would travel with the team to Adelaide and make his AFL debut.

"I can remember that day was really cold," he joked.

"I only played about 20 minutes so I sat on the bench for most of it and it was freezing.

"I must say though that I will never, ever forget, running through the banner with Matthew Pavlich on his 100th game, it was a great moment, but it all went so quick.

"I tried to approach it as a normal game of football but when I ran out onto the ground I was thinking 'gee this is what I have wanted all my life, this is what it is all about.'"

However his AFL debut was one of a unique nature, which led to his team mates

establishing an affectionate nickname for their first year friend.

"I didn't get a touch so I was a bit disappointed, and Paul Medhurst came up with the nickname Donut for me, Duncan Donut... it's gone now because thankfully I got a touch in my second game," he said.

"I will never, ever forget, running through the banner with Matthew Pavlich on his 100th game, it was a great moment, but it all went, so quick..." "The first touch was unbelievable, taking the mark and hearing the crowd, when I actually marked it I felt a big weight lift off my shoulders.

"Once I had the ball all I could think was 'where is snake, where is snake' (Troy Simmonds).

"I moved the ball on and we got a goal, which made the whole thing even better."

Ryan's family back in Traralgon, Victoria, have also found themselves having to adjust to the idea of their son, and brother becoming an AFL player.

"My sister said it looks weird watching me on the television," he said.

"I think that none of us probably ever thought it would happen so it has been a real shock but definitely a good one..."

Now almost twelve months down the track and happy to stand aside as a first year player for the 2004 draftees, Ryan's advice to them was fairly simple.

"It is absolutely mind blowing," he said.

"It has been everything I ever wanted and more.

"Don't have any expectations, absorb as much as you can and make your first year a learning year.

"It honestly takes a year to really learn exactly what it takes."



News that David Mundy had been drafted to Fremantle was met with mixed reactions. He was understandably nervous and excited, while his parents were over the moon for their son, with only mum feeling the distress of David moving as far away as Western Australia.

IN TWELVE MONTHS, life for David is considerably different. He has now established himself in WA, making new friends. living with a new family and becoming part of two new football clubs.

"It's very different to being back home, "he said.

"But it has the same atmosphere because your host family is where you are taken care of... it's great to be a part of that environment and Ron and Lorraine my host parents are great."

Originally from Seymour in country Victoria, David said his introduction to the AFL during the 2004 pre-season was more of a surprise than he had expected.

"I found it all pretty tough because the work load was extreme when you compare it to what I was used to back in Seymour, but your body just deals with it and adapts... you get through it OK," he said.

Along with the weather being the obvious difference between WA and Victoria, David found the style of football here vastly different to that of the Victorian competition.

"Football here is a lot cleaner," he said.

"Because it is not as wet the games are a lot quicker so your skills need to be a lot better.

"When I arrived at Fremantle my pace was the main thing I knew I would have to work on. It was a personal goal of mine to get faster and also improve my skills."

Now spending almost every day of the week working on various components of his game David plays his WAFL football for Subiaco, and is happy with his current form.

"That was probably one of the hardest things about coming to Fremantle was that you have to play for a WAFL club and you don't see WAFL games in Victoria so you don't know anyone's name or anything at all really.

"Then you only train with them on a Thursday night so you don't really get to know them for a while but Subiaco have made me feel like part of the club which has been great.

"I started off slow but I have hit some form and am happy with the way things are going."

"I didn't have any expectations before I came here and to be honest I take every day as it comes," he said.

"I try not to get too far ahead, I tend to stay in the present but the whole experience is positive.

"Every new experience I have had has been fantastic and I am much more confident in my own abilities now than when I arrived.

"Every one of us dreams of making our AFL debut and if I can achieve that in the some time near future it would be great, but right now I am concentrating on playing good WAFL football for Subiaco and fingers crossed we can win a flag this year.

Brett Peake was the first ever player to be drafted to Fremantle under the father-son rule.

HIS FATHER BRIAN was an East Fremantle legend and was inducted into the Fremantle Football Club Hall of Legends on October 5, 1996.

A plumber by trade, Brett arrived at Fremantle in 2003 and can't help but look back at twelve months ago and acknowledge the difference in the direction of his life.

with him basking in the chance to learn from the coaches' one on one.

"I really do learn heaps when I have one on one time," he said.

"But I have found that in a group I also learn a lot from the other players.

"This year I have been very focused on sitting back and just trying to take in all the information because I believe that if you are a first year player and you are out there and talk

> too much, people see a different person.

"But if you sit back and just take everything in, by watching what the senior players do, you learn how to do the right thing.

"And if you are doing

the right thing, I think you gain more respect coming into your second year."

Brett said his guidance from the senior player group had also played a big factor in him developing a very responsible outlook on his opportunity to play AFL football.

"The guys are all great and Matthew Carr in particular for me has been fantastic," he said.

"My father has been the biggest influence on my football career, but he is great because he always reminds me that I can only do the best

For now, Brett is content to continue to develop his football skills while also making the most of his opportunity to expand his knowledge of the game.


"Just sitting in the team meetings is a great way to learn," he said.

"For me this year I just want to finish the year off well for East Fremantle and support the guys here.

"I am really looking forward to what might be and once my season has finished I will be going straight into working on my strength and keeping my mind motivated.

"I am stronger mentally now than I have ever been," he said.

"It's really great to see what goes on here in every way you can imagine.

"Even down to seeing how the other players handle themselves in front of the media, it's all a real learning experience."

Working closely with AFL coaches has been a highlight of 2003 for Brett For Western Australia's Michael Johnson, arriving at Fremantle after being the club's selection in the 2004 pre-season draft has created a lot of hard work.

In the view of some, he was lucky enough to miss the AFL pre-season, described by many a player as the most gruelling part of any year, but to 20 year old Michael his late selection meant extra work and extra hours.

"I was quite behind the eight ball when I arrived," he said.

"I wasn't nearly as fit as everyone when I got here and I knew it would take me a while.

A native New Zealander, at age 14 Adam Campbell had never played a game of Aussie Rules football and was enthralled with rugby.

ARRIVING IN AUSTRALIA in 1999, Adam decided to join an amateur football club, mostly for social reasons, but partly because he was intrigued by the Australian game.

His social stint at football was short lived. Four years later he was drafted to an AFL Club.



Experience Grows

FROM THE BEGINNING of the 2002 season, the club set out clear plans for the rebuilding of the club and establishing credibility and respect within the AFL competition. It has often been referred to as a journey. Call it what you will. The name is not important but it is the process of building experience in all facets of the club, and most particularly on the field that has as its prize the success everyone wants.

But it does take time. It is a journey that would not only set about rebuilding the club on and off the field but one that would ensure that what is achieved could be sustained. Short term thinking would not compromise the longer term plans and objectives for the club.

The competition has marvelled at the might of the Brisbane Lions over the last three seasons as they have continued to take all before them. Yet in 1998 they finished last. Three years later they started their amazing run of premiership victories.

Their success was built on many factors, including the continuing experience of individuals and the team.

Heading into the 2002 season, Brisbane's playing list averaged 91 AFL games. They had 12 players with over 100 games experience, with four of those 12 having played over 200 games, and had a collective experience of 227 finals games.

Their average age heading into the 2002 season was 23.5 years. At the same time Fremantle's average age was 23.4 years. Fremantle's

average AFL games experience was only 61 games with only 50 finals games experience. There were seven players in the 2002 season who had played 100 games or more.

At the start of the 2004 season, the Brisbane experience had continued to grow. The all-conquering team then had reached an average of 131 AFL games each with 18 players having played over 100 games including six players who had played over 200 games. The Lions finals experience had then grown to a total of 338 finals games.

In comparison, the 2004 Fremantle player group had an average games experience of 64 AFL games with five players having played over 100 games. The total finals experience amounted to 53 finals games with Peter Bell, Jeff Farmer, Des Headland and Troy Simmonds accounting for 33 of those finals games. The average age was 22.4 years as the season started.

As the 2004 home and away season closed, the Fremantle playing group had an average of 73 AFL games but now there are 12 players with over 100 games experience, including Peter Bell with over 200 games.

Keeping the core of our playing group together for a long period of time is important. They are young and are, in AFL terms, still to reach their peak. As they remain together, the critical experience needed to achieve success will come within reach.

AFL games experience, and playing together longer, will continue to deliver the on-field improvements. This is not simply about wins and losses, though that ratio is what will always be the easiest measure of performance.

In 2002, the team had a winning average of 31 points per game. However, the gap between winning and losing was dramatic. The average losing margin in 2002 was 36 points with the largest loss suffered in round 14 of that year against Port Adelaide where the team went down by 84 points. In fact, in 2002 the team suffered six losses by greater than 50 points. The team did not achieve one win away from Subiaco.

Signs of improvement appeared in 2003, though the dramatic gap between wins and losses remained at times. The average winning margin was 28 points but the average losing margin had increased to 42 points with the largest loss occurring against Essendon in round 21 when the team went down by 60 points. However, there were only two losses over the year by greater than 50 points. The team won on two occasions away from Perth.

This year, the average winning margin was 29 points and the average losing margin fell to only 28 points. The worse loss during the season was by 50 points in atrocious conditions at Skilled Stadium in Round 20. Away from Perth the team won five games including first time victories against Richmond at the MCG, Adelaide at AAMI Stadium and Carlton at Optus Oval.

The team was inside the eight for 20 of the 22 rounds, its best ever season performance. The increasing experience of the player group, that will continue to be injected with talent each year, is what is needed to achieve sustainable success in the AFL.





PM's Recognition

BEN MARKS WAS employed as a Recruitment Assistant by the club four years ago. Confined to a wheelchair with neuromuscular disorder, he lives with his family in Willetton and is one of four brothers.

"I have never let my disability stand in the way of the things I want to do," he said.

Ben registered with an employment agency called South Metropolitan Personnel, who assist people with disabilities to gain employment.

It was through them and in particular Systems Development Manager Aileen Ward, that Ben began his work at Fremantle.

"My coordinator, Aileen Ward got in touch with Barry Cable who provided contacts and paved the way for Aileen to talk with the decisionmakers of the club. I had met Barry before so we thought he would be really approachable and happy to help us out, which he was," he said.

Four years later Ben and Aileen have remained great friends and it was Ben's enthusiasm and success in his position at the Club that sparked Aileen's idea to nominate the Fremantle Football Club for a Prime Minister's Employer of the Year Award.

The Prime Ministers Employer of the Year Award has existed for the past 12 years and recognises employers who have provided meaningful employment to someone who has a disability.

Primer Minister John Howard described the awards as important not only because they

acknowledge good practice in employing and recognising the potential of people with disabilities as employees, they also signal that businesses have an important role to play in the communities in which they operate. He said they recognise the responsibility of putting something back into the community where they make their profits.

The Awards are open to employers nationally. They can either nominate themselves or a service like South Metro Personnel can nominate a particular organisation. Aileen's nomination resulted in the club receiving a Certificate of Merit, which recognises that, although only a small number of employers can be successful in winning the Prime Minister's Employer of the Year Award, many nominations of a high standard deserve particular recognition for sustained commitment to employing someone with a disability.

All employers who receive a Certificate of Merit were short listed for consideration by the judging panel and Fremantle have been encouraged to renominate in 2004.

Now thoroughly enjoying his role as a recruitment officer, Ben's primary responsibility is to assist Recruiting Manager Phil Smart and Recruiting Officer Brent Dawkins with the recruitment of new players at the national and pre-season draft.

"I am so lucky and grateful that I get to spend hours at work doing what I love which is watching football," he said.



"Brent and Phil often get me to keep an eye on particular players on video or sometimes they get me to attend games.

"Basically I just have to have a good understanding of each of the football leagues around Australia and how the pre-season and national draft systems work.

"Football is my job, so I couldn't do it without having a real passion about the club and the game itself.

"I love being here with everybody at the club, staff, players, coaches, they are all great and let's face it, I am doing what I have always loved doing."
