




CEO To Harvard

FOR THE opening eight rounds of the season, Chief Executive Officer Cameron Schwab will be a notable absentee from home and away games for the first time since taking the helm in September 2001 as he attends the Advanced Management Program at Harvard University in Boston, USA.

AFL Chief Executive Officer, Andrew Demetriou welcomed the decision of the Fremantle Football Club to have Cameron Schwab undertake the Harvard Advanced Management Program.



"Running an AFL Club requires a high level of management expertise and the Harvard program is one of the best of its type in the world," Mr Demetriou said.

"I am sure Cameron and the Fremantle Football Club will gain a great deal from his participation".

The program is the same as the one undertaken by Fremantle Board member and Wesfarmers Managing Director Richard Goyder who completed the course in 1998 as part of his executive development with Wesfarmers.

Purple to Blue

AFTER FIVE years at Fremantle, Steven Icke, General Manager Player Personnel and List Management, swapped the purple for the navy blue of the Carlton Football Club mid-March accepting the role as General Manager of Football Operations.



"Steven joined the club in late 2001 as Football Manager at a challenging time in our history and has played a significant role in helping turn the club around," Mr Schwab said.

"Together with Chris Connolly, Steven set about restructuring and reinvigorating our football team," Mr Schwab said.

"In his more recent role as General Manager Player Personnel and List Management, Steven has overseen player contract management and, in conjunction with our Recruiting Manager Phil Smart, has further developed our national recruiting operations.

"On behalf of the Board and everyone at the club, I would like to extend our thanks for the tremendous job that Steven has done.

"As a result of Steven Icke's departure from the club, Steve Rosich, currently General Manager – Marketing will now assume the position of General Manager – Commercial Operations.

"He will now be responsible for player contract management component of Steven Icke's current position as well as retaining his present operational responsibilities for the club's marketing function.

"The national recruitment operations led by our Recruiting Manager Phil Smart will now report to Robert Shaw, General Manager – Football Operations.

"The club's List management protocols remain unchanged with Steve Rosich replacing Steven Icke on the List Management Committee, chaired by Tony Buhagiar," Mr Schwab said.

Luke Backs Rogue Traders

Luke McPharlin added another string to his musical bow when he performed alongside the Rogue Traders at the inaugural Hearing Aid family concert in Perth's Supreme Court Gardens on 25 March.

Teaming up with Courtney Murphy and Murphy's Lore, McPharlin gave up his free time to perform to help raise awareness for the serious issue of hearing loss in the community.

A passionate musician, McPharlin looked at home on stage with Murphy's Lore and was excited to be performing on the same bill as the Rogue Traders, Ross Wilson, Dave Mann, The Flairz and the Hooley Dooleys!

Hearing loss is an international epidemic and of major concern to health professionals. In Australia it currently costs the economy over \$12 billion per year, with over 160,000 people unable to work because they cannot hear well.

Of greatest concern are issues primarily affecting youth. These include dangerously high sound levels in music venues, the proliferation of personal music players and a correlation to noise induced hearing loss plus an apparent lack of awareness when it comes to 'safe' sound exposure and hearing preservation.

Hearing Aid was presented by the Ear Science Institute Australia and all monies raised will benefit medical research into ear and hearing disorders.



On ya Bike!

Antoni Grover was the official Ambassador for the third annual Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma on 18 March.

An asthmatic himself, Grover gave his support to the community event by encouraging all West Australian's to get on their bikes to help raise vital funds for asthma education and research.

He said as an asthmatic he appreciated the breathing difficulties that people with the condition faced.

"Anything we can do to help raise funds and awareness to support medical research into asthma is invaluable," he said.

The event was a great success, attracting more than 6000 participants.

Out of Africa

THE TOURING South African U/18s football team paid a recent visit to club headquarters to complete their recovery session following their game at Subiaco Oval the previous night and to tour the facilities, and to meet with key football department staff to gain a greater understanding of the life of an AFL player.

After recovery, the players watched the team train and then gave the players, coaches, and staff a taste of unique native South African song and dance.

It was a fantastic opportunity for both the club to extend and strengthen its relationship with the development of the AFL in South Africa.

Senior Coach Chris Connolly said that Fremantle hopes to spend between \$50,000-\$100,000 to recruit exclusively in South Africa and to help support the development of AFL in South Africa.

"We think there is exceptional talent in South Africa that can be nurtured," Connolly said.

Twenty full-time staff will be employed to help grow the AFL in South Africa. One of those already

involved is July, the Head of AFL Development South Africa, who described the visit as a once in a lifetime opportunity.

"It is amazing how our players were treated," July said, "They learnt a lot about football skills and making themselves better players, and also off the field they learn from cultural exchanges like this."

South Africa currently has about 3,000 young men playing football and in five years time the AFL hope that number increases to nearly 30,000.

Club Supports Enough is Enough Message

THE FREMANTLE Football Club has kicked off the 2007 football season with a message to West Australians to keep alcohol under control. The message is the foundation of a new partnership announced between the club and the Drug and Alcohol Office. It is part of the Enough is Enough campaign to reduce drunkenness and change the drinking culture in Western Australia.

Fremantle President Rick Hart said the club would use its profile in the community to help spread the Enough is Enough message.

"The effects of excessive drinking are significant and everyone in the community should be concerned," he said.

"We will use our presence within the community to support the Enough is Enough campaign."

Mr Hart said the Enough is Enough message was not about stopping anyone from enjoying a drink of alcohol; rather about keeping alcohol under control and being responsible.

"Our players are high profile young people who, as most young people do, enjoy a drink from time to time," he said.

"They are focused, full-time athletes who train hard and monitor their diets, sleeping habits and exercise regimes every hour for 10 months a year.

"We also encourage them to ensure that their lives are well-rounded. After all, they are young people who should be enjoying every part of life's learning experiences.

"The club's education programs for the players cover a wide range of subject matter, and especially being responsible when they consume alcohol.

"We all know that from time to time there will be individuals who will lapse and it is our role as a club to educate those individuals."

The partnership between the Fremantle Football Club and the Drug and Alcohol Office is a sponsorship arrangement involving Healthway that will build awareness of the Enough is Enough campaign over the next three years.

"It is estimated that alcohol misuse costs the West Australian community about \$750 million each year," he said.


"Eight thousand West Australians end up in hospital every year because of alcohol-fuelled assaults and injuries, and more than 30,000 attend emergency departments. About 325 people die every year from excessive alcohol use.

"It also makes significant contributions to crime, social disruption, family breakdown and violence, injury, lost labour and productivity, property damage, road crashes and health costs.

"Turning around drunkenness and associated problems needs the support of the community and the creation of safer drinking places. It needs families, friends and servers of alcohol to say enough is enough.

"With the support of the Fremantle Football Club we can change the way West Australians think about drinking; we can create safer environments to socialise in with family and friends; and we can teach our young people how to keep alcohol under control."☺





Mates

Chris Tarrant and Dean Solomon, close friends for over 15 years, now have the chance to fulfil a childhood dream and play AFL footy together.

Collingwood coach Mick Malthouse said recently that there is only one person from the football world who is close to Chris Tarrant and that is Dean Solomon. How did the two become so close?

Both are from regional Australia though they are from different states.

Solomon was born and raised in the hard mining town of Broken Hill, Tarrant in Numurkah about 30 kilometres north of Shepparton in country Victoria.

Anyone will tell you they raise them tough in Broken Hill. The harsh mining town in far-flung New South Wales, the birthplace of the Big Australian, was built and survives today because of the mines that sit themselves in the centre of town.

Growing up with his younger sister, life was like that in any other regional town. You went to school and kept yourself busy playing sport. For Solomon that was footy with North Broken Hill in the four team competition in which, according to Solomon, "the Northies were always the top team". There was never any temptation to rugby league as is the custom in that part of the country, though one could imagine that he would have adapted well to

that code as well. Throw in regular basketball, and a "bit of tennis when I was younger" and that was pretty much the good life.

Tarrant spent the early years growing up in Numurkah attending Numurkah Primary School before the family moved to Mildura and fruit growing country alongside the Murray River. With three brothers and one sister, family life was close knit and fun.

Like Solomon, Tarrant was a footy boy through and through and also played basketball competitively until he was drafted to Collingwood.

Both grew up following Geelong with Solomon a big fan of Bill Brownless and John Barnes and Tarrant, not surprisingly, a fan of the great Gary Ablett.

The two country boys met for the first time when they were 11 years of age playing junior representative footy, Tarrant for Sunraysia and Solomon for Broken Hill. Each team would take its turn to make the long journey every year to play the other. It was a real adventure, and a taste of things to come, for the two.

It was after one game at Broken Hill when the

two first met. "We sat opposite each other at the table at a pie night," Solomon recalls. "I remember this skinny kid sitting down and we just started talking."

"He went back to Mildura and caught up when we played each other.

"I watched him develop into a very good footy player over the next couple of years," Solomon says.

Both were awarded scholarships to the Bendigo Pioneers in the Victorian Under 18s competition, though not starting there at the same time. Tarrant moved to Bendigo the year before Solomon who remembers walking into the Pioneers offices with his mum and dad and seeing Tarrant sitting there.

"We shook hands and pretty much went straight out and had a game of golf. We have been good mates ever since," says Solomon.

"At Bendigo we went to school together at the Bendigo Senior Secondary School and played footy together," Tarrant says.

"We both had a dream to play AFL footy but we knew that the chance to play together would not happen.

"At that time, the AFL rules only allowed clubs to draft one 17 year old player so we knew we

would end up at different clubs," Tarrant said. "But that's the way AFL footy is and you have to accept it even though we really wanted to play in the same team."

Both Solomon and Tarrant knew that to fulfil their dream of playing in the AFL, there was also another big step needed, to make the change from the country to the city. Solomon had already moved from Broken Hill with a population of around 15,000 to the "big smoke" of Bendigo with over 70,000 residents. Tarrant from tiny Numurkah to Mildura and on to Bendigo.

The next step was far bigger.

"I left Broken Hill when I was 16 to go to Bendigo and spent a year there living with a host family and going to school and playing footy," Solomon says. "So I guess I had some early grounding for the next move that was coming."

"When I got drafted to Essendon the move was pretty easy really and I didn't take long to settle in to living in Melbourne.

"The people at Essendon were great and they made sure that I settled in well.

"My first year at Essendon was all about learning the game, learning what it was all about, tactics and the like which I had never really been exposed to before.

"I just worked hard and took it all in – it was a great learning experience," says Solomon.

Tarrant was happy to move from Mildura to Bendigo. "To be honest the move was good, I was pretty happy to get out of Mildura, as a young person there wasn't much to do," Tarrant says. "But I knew the next move would be bigger and the change of environment even greater."

"When I got to Collingwood in 1998 they were still based at Victoria Park and that was a great experience to arrive at that ground and with all the history of the club there, my first day at the Pies was a memorable one, that's for sure.

"And I got to play in the last home and away game at Victoria Park and that was a great moment as well.

"Getting used to the big city life was a bit difficult at first and it took me a while to adapt to the faster pace and lifestyle that comes with big city living," says Tarrant.

But neither Solomon nor Tarrant had any second thoughts about the move. For them it was about fulfilling their dream to play AFL footy.

"That's all I wanted to do," says Solomon. "You sacrifice a bit moving away from family and friends to chase that dream but I was lucky enough to have the chance to make it happen, so it was worth it."

"It seems like such a long time ago now. I struggled with my first year of footy moving to the city and leaving family and friends," says Tarrant.

"So it took a while to adjust but it has definitely been worth it."

Their persistence and commitment to their dream has paid off as both have gone on to forge long careers in the AFL. Tarrant played 161 games for Collingwood, debuting in round 3 in 1998 against the Western Bulldogs. Solomon played 158 games for Essendon after making his debut in round 5 in 1998 against Collingwood, playing against his good mate in the ANZAC Day blockbuster in front of 81,542 fans at the MCG. For the record, Collingwood won by 20 points.

During their careers, both have played in many



big games with 19 finals games between them and each playing in two Grand Finals. Solomon tasted Grand Final success in 2000 as Essendon completed an amazing season, winning the pre-season competition and then going on to claim the 2000 Premiership. It was a season that saw them lose only one game, against the Western Bulldogs in round 21.

Solomon backed up again in 2001 for the Grand Final against Brisbane, though this time it was the bitter taste of a loss as the powerful Brisbane side exerted itself onto the competition.

Tarrant was to experience that Brisbane power also as he lined up for Collingwood in the 2002 and 2003 Grand Finals.

Despite what the experts predicted, Collingwood fell agonisingly close in 2002, going down by nine points after being close all day. In 2003 however the margin would be 50 points as Brisbane claimed the Premiership for the third consecutive year.

"At just 20 years of age and to be a part of that side was awesome," says Solomon.

"I remember being very nervous leading up to the game but you love playing finals footy, the fast tempo and the pressure.

"I just remember the final siren and the release of all that pressure and the emotion at the time, it was just a great moment."

For Tarrant the memories are not so sweet, though the build up and the excitement of Grand Final week as well as the whole atmosphere of the day was a great experience.

The end of the 2006 season would signal big changes for both Solomon and Tarrant after long and established careers at Essendon and Collingwood.

After nine years, both faced a difficult decision. "It was pretty hard obviously," said Solomon.

"You've been there for nine years, made a lot of good friends, and you have an established life outside footy with friends, contacts and business interests.

"The footy club gave me the opportunity as a 17 year old to play AFL footy and you never forget that.

"I have made a lot of great friendships with the people at Essendon.

"It was very hard but I didn't have a choice really in the end, and when I knew that I wasn't going to be staying and had the chance to come to Fremantle that was very exciting for me.

"The team showed last year that they were on the way up and were going to be playing strong, consistent football and be part of a finals campaign not only this year but for a few more years to come.

"You see the young guys here who are up and running and determined to play consistent footy

and finals footy, I want to be a part of that.

"I am absolutely rapt to be here at Fremantle. "One thing about AFL footy is that nothing is forever, so when it comes time to move on, that is just the way it is," Solomon says.

It was an equally difficult decision for Tarrant. "It is such a good club and I had made some friendships there, but I am very happy the way it has turned out for me".

Both players made their way to Fremantle through the AFL's annual Player Trade Week, and both had very different experiences over those five days.

Tarrant was holidaying in northern New South Wales with his girlfriend, Solomon on a six-week surfing holiday in Europe.

"I was on a surfing holiday with a couple of mates cruising around Europe in a pretty average Combi van moving from camp site to camp site," says Solomon.

"Everywhere we went we struggled to get mobile phone reception.

"I remember one day at the start of trade week having to walk about an hour and a half to a small town in France just to get reception and find out what was happening. I couldn't use the van because the other two were asleep in it.

"Once I knew that I was going to be traded I went

straight on to London so that I could be in contact with my manager and get a feel for what was happening.

"I wanted to have a chat to Essendon and also to Fremantle to see how interested they were, and they were very interested.

"There was a nine-hour time difference, so on the last day of trade week as the deadline was getting closer I was out walking around London in the early hours of the morning.

"To be honest, I was very worried about what my future held. Footy is your career and when you are about to be traded it was a big decision and a big move, moving cities and all that stuff.

"It was a stressful week that's for sure," says Solomon.

For Tarrant, the desired move was always going to be interstate and despite talking to a couple of clubs, a meeting with Chief Executive Officer Cameron Schwab, Senior Coach Chris Connolly and Assistant Coach Mark Harvey in Melbourne convinced Tarrant that Fremantle was where he wanted to be.

"The last day of trade week was definitely a nervous day for me," says Tarrant.

"I had made my mind up I wanted to come to Fremantle and it was just a matter of waiting until things could be sorted out on the day.

"As it turned out it was all done with a couple of





hours to go before the deadline," Tarrant said.

Once the paperwork was submitted to complete the move of Tarrant to Fremantle, the remaining trade deal had not progressed far at all, that of securing Solomon from Essendon.

With the deadline rapidly closing, Essendon and Fremantle officials still could not find the deal to finalise the Solomon move.

With the minutes passing, the two mates were on the phone. Tarrant at AFL trade headquarters at Telstra Dome and Solomon pacing the streets of London in the early hours of the morning waiting for the news he wanted.

With five minutes left until the 2pm deadline to close the trade period, agreement was reached and the paperwork rapidly lodged with the AFL.

With Tarrant counting down the clock, Solomon could only wait. It was fitting that his good mate gave him the news that the deal was all done and that childhood dream of playing footy together in the AFL could become reality.

Both were now heading west to join their new club, to make new homes and new friends.

"Taz and I came across to Fremantle about three weeks before the guys were due back for pre-season training and I was really impressed with the club and the people," says Solomon.

"The professional way they go about things and we went in to the boardroom and met all the staff, everyone just made us feel welcome, they were so friendly.

"It's a very balanced club, very level-headed place – they have set goals that they want to achieve and they are just very focused on those."

Tarrant had similar impressions, saying that "it's a real football club and you get a sense of that when you walk into the place, into the gym and change rooms".

"They are really professional, very friendly and very welcoming," Tarrant said.

And the two long time mates can make the transition together, something both see as an added bonus.

"Having a mate here with you who is going through the same things is great," Solomon says.

"But it's not just Taz, it's also Robert Shaw and Mark Harvey who have also had to make the same move and they have helped as well.

"It is good to have a mate here when you are settling in.

"I played with Robbie Hadrill in 2004 on the Ireland tour and got to know him so he has been great as well," Solomon said.

Tarrant agrees, adding "just being able to play AFL footy with Solly will be fantastic".

"We used to always talk about it even when we were back at school but knew it couldn't happen with the rules of the draft at the time.

"So to be able to have that chance now is great and I am really looking forward to the first game together.

"And having him here going through the same changes that I am going through is a big help," says Tarrant.

Settled and living near the beach, both have completed their pre-seasons and have notched valuable game time with their new team mates. Their pre-seasons though have taken vastly different tracks.

Tarrant underwent surgery in October to relieve calf tension, an injury with which he played the majority of the 2006 season, playing most matches with constant pain in his calves that impacted his performances. His pre-season has been one of rehabilitation, spending most of the summer in the gym and only resuming running and team training sessions in mid-February. The fitness staff gradually building his training to his target of round one of the 2007 season.

Solomon on the other hand has completed his pre-season programme uninterrupted and says he is probably the fittest he has been and now just wants to transfer that into some good football.

"It's a new footy side that I am playing in so I have to fast track my learning about the players I am playing with, their strengths, team rules and team structures," says Solomon.

Tarrant remains impressed with the club and the passion of the Fremantle supporters.

"To have the number of members that Fremantle has puts us up there with the top clubs.

"I am really looking forward to playing when the real season starts in front of the home crowd at Subiaco Oval.

"Sitting in the crowd watching the opening NAB Cup game against West Coast, the members are fantastic and the atmosphere was sensational.

"I can't wait," Tarrant says.

Now that the two are at the same AFL club and their dream of playing AFL footy together is here, what does each expect from 2007?

For both it is about establishing their places in the team and consistency.

"This is a strong squad at this club with a great mix of senior players and younger players who are very driven," Solomon says.

"There are a lot of players pushing for a place each week in the senior squad and that is a great position for the club to be in.

"My first priority is to consolidate a consistent spot in the team each week and be a part of the side in whatever way I can," said Solomon.

The goal for Tarrant is a simple one, "to settle in to the team and the club and just enjoy my footy a lot more."

The experienced campaigners know about hard work and know that you can take nothing for granted in footy.

What they now get to experience is something that neither ever thought would happen, the chance to play AFL footy together in the same team. ☺






He also reminisced about his playing days and his experience as a Premiership Captain for North Melbourne.





Technology Boost

The off-season has seen the club invest heavily in the resources available to the football department. As it did leading into the 2006 season when over \$250,000 was invested in new gym and conditioning equipment and player performance monitoring technology, the club has resourced its back office technology with a similar investment in 2007.

WITHIN THE highly competitive AFL environment, advantages that can be gained in any facet of the football operations, no matter how small, can have an impact. The technology investment for 2007 aims to give the club gains in opposition analysis, game and player preparation, and individual player performance analysis.

Fremantle Chief Executive Officer Cameron Schwab says although there was great success last season with the new conditioning technology, including the use of GPS and heart-rate monitors, there was a need to improve the club's use of technology.

"It was an area that we saw as a weakness in our club," Mr Schwab said. "We probably rank ourselves in the bottom four or five clubs in the area of football information and IT, and we're now very keen to get ourselves in the very top group of clubs."

"There's an enormous amount of resources that are required for the development and education of players. Whether it be educating a player to play on a particular opponent, or trading and scouting at the end of the year when we may be looking at a player that we are seeking to bring into our football club."

To make that technology gain, the cutting edge SportsCode technology was acquired by the club. The implementation of SportsCode also coincided with some significant changes also in the Football Department staffing. The first of these changes arose from the club's annual end-of-season review in 2006 where it was identified that more coaching resources were required to the midfield area, particularly with a greater focus on rotations and set-plays.

As a result, dual Subiaco Premiership coach Peter German joined the club as Assistant Coach responsible for the midfield and ball transition while Assistant Coach Michael Broadbridge took on the role of implementation of the advanced hardware and software applications for the players and coaching staff

while also retaining coaching responsibility for clearances both in the centre and around the ground.

Broadbridge says his role will be to ensure that the new SportsCode system is implemented and applied within the football department to maximise its value to the players and coaches.

"It's not so much having the technology but how it's utilised," Broadbridge said. "It's about making our football department a leader in the use of technology."

"Our objective is to improve the quality of coaching and player education systems at Fremantle.

"The SportsCode editing system is regarded as the best vision editing system in sport and is used extensively throughout the world," Broadbridge said.

Developed by local company Sportstec, and used across a range of motion sports around the globe and by some of the world's elite sporting organisations, the SportsCode system converts TV and video footage into digital data that can be easily searched.

This gives the club's match committee the ability to analyse specific criteria and then present edited clips to individual players.

The coaches are also able to segment different moves and plays to in-depth levels by describing an individual event, such as inside 50s.

The second of the staff changes has seen Jeremy Davy join the club as Football Technology Manager. Davy spent six years with Hockey Australia's Men's Program, where he fulfilled a similar role.

"He is highly regarded, and has done a fantastic job in getting the infrastructure set up," Broadbridge said.

"Jeremy's experience has already shown how much an advantage the SportsCode system will be and the tremendous capabilities that the technology has for Fremantle."

The new technology has seen a players' learning centre established with five iMac workstations, each with access to all the football statistical information and vision necessary.

"The idea of the learning centre is to have an informal environment in which the players and coaches can work with the system," Broadbridge said.

"At each workstation, the players can either educate themselves or get a coach to walk and talk them through the statistics and vision available.

"It will eventually be set-up like a library where the players have access to a range of information and they are starting to become proficient at using the iMacs."

Broadbridge says the analysis of game data, training services, and forward scouting is constantly evolving, and it is imperative that Fremantle is in touch with the latest developments with the aim to be the leader.

"The only limit of the use of technology is your imagination – you can do anything you want if you have the vision.

"It is amazing what can be done from a coaching point of view in terms of tracking individual players, match-up tracking, ball-movement, the list is endless," he said.

Going hand-in-hand with the SportsCode technology, each coach has been allocated a "Coda" – a palm-sized tablet where vision can be time coded immediately as instances occur during a game that they want to review later.📍





Peter German joined the club at the end of last season as Assistant Coach from WAFL club Subiaco where in his four years at the helm, guided the Lions to the minor premiership in every year, achieving premiership success in 2004 and 2006. Peter's coaching experience includes coach of the Peel Thunder Football Club in 2002, Assistant Coach at West Coast 2000 and 2001, Assistant Coach/Reserves Coach at the Hawthorn Football Club in 1998 and 1999, and Senior Coach of the Burnie Dockers Football Club in the Tasmanian Football League from 1995 to 1997. Peter is a Life Member of the North Melbourne Football Club where he played 185 senior games from 1984 to 1994 as well as 55 games in the Under 19s from 1981 to 1984. Peter represented Victoria on two occasions in 1991 and Tasmania on three occasions in 1995, 1996 and 1997 when he was captain of the Tasmanian side that took on WA. In 2006 Peter was the WAFL State Coach.

How would you describe your first pre-season at Fremantle?

Eye-opening. I've been out of AFL football for five years, and as much as you watch the games, it has evolved massively in that time. The environment that's been created in the last few years at Fremantle has made it really enjoyable, and I think that the playing group are even more responsive than I thought they'd be.

You've been very successful as a coach across three States. How much do you enjoy it?

Well you enjoy it when you win premierships and when you're winning 8 out of 10 games, but it can really take a lot of the energy out of you at times. It's demanding whether you're an assistant coach at AFL level or a senior coach at WAFL level. But it's what I know best... well, that and being a curator at cricket and football grounds.

Does it beat being a curator, which was something you did in your younger years?

It does monetary-wise! But I wouldn't change my nine years that I was curator at Windy Hill and then Arden Street. It was fantastic times, being outdoors, and it kept you fit. I never tore any muscles in my whole career and I put that down to always being active as a curator.

Were you as passionate about preparing a pitch for district cricket as you are preparing a football team?

Oh definitely! I was a bowler so I used to like to leave a bit of green in the wicket, but by the same token you didn't want a team bowled out for 120. It's all pride in your work, and if you wanted to have good wickets and the oval in tip top shape you had to do the work and not take short-cuts. So that was a great learning experience for the rest of my life because it's the same in coaching – you can't take short-cuts, you have to go the extra yard.

Arden Street would have special memories for you then, not just as a curator but as a player with North Melbourne too?

Yeah I was there for 14 years and about 300 games all up in the Under 19s, Reserves & Seniors. I first went down there at 15 years of age, and for three years I caught the train down to the ground. One reason why I got my drivers' license so fast was because I was sick of that walk from the train station! I remember one night I stayed back after training and the grandstand caught on fire. I ended up getting a hose out and helping to put it out! I can still remember our last game at Arden Street – it was against Richmond, I played on Maurice Rioli, I was the last North Melbourne player to kick a goal at the ground, and I got the three votes in the Brownlow that day too!

You played under some great coaches, including John Kennedy and Denis Pagan. How much of an influence did they have on your coaching today?

Yeah Denis was a major influence on me. He was a tough coach, but I've modelled myself a fair bit on him. When I played under him in the Under 19s he showed me the work ethic and mental toughness you needed to be a better player at senior level. And as a senior coach his record speaks for itself. I had Barry Cable only for a couple of games in the seniors, but John Kennedy was my coach for about five years, and he was terrific – a great motivator and a great orator. The game probably caught up with him (during his time at North), but having said that we won our fair share of games. I often found myself later in life saying a lot of things that I remember John saying to me.

So after you retired from AFL football in 1994 how did you end up at Burnie in Tasmania?

I was only 29 at the time, and when I realised that my playing days at the top level were over I definitely wanted to coach. I had a lot of clubs ring me up, but I thought Burnie presented me with the best opportunity to cut my teeth in coaching. And I had the best of both worlds as a playing-coach – I was too young to retire from playing. The Tasmanian Football League, as it was back then, was a really good competition, and Burnie had kept finishing fourth or fifth over the previous five years. I made some really great friends down there, and after my second year the President got moved aside and I was made a full-time employee of the club. I had to do the lot – marketing, sponsorship, etc. The club turned around to be a real strong identity in the north-west of the State, and has won five of the last seven premierships in the NTFL, so I'm very proud of being a part of the transition from underachievers to a club that would only expect real success.

You then moved to Hawthorn as Reserves Coach for two years, where one of your colleagues was Chris Connolly. Was it apparent back then that he was a senior coach in waiting?

I always knew that Chris was going to be a very capable senior coach. I often say that Denis Pagan and Chris were the two people that had the biggest impact on my coaching. Chris opened up my mind to expand my coaching thoughts, with regards to training drills, preparation and so on. Most people only see Chris Connolly the coach, but there's a lot more to him than just that, and coaching with him at Hawthorn I got to see all of those qualities of him.

When you moved to Perth at the end of 1999 to join West Coast, did you imagine you and your family would still be here over seven years later?

Well to end up at Subiaco was the blessing of coming over here. I went to a club that had been starved of premiership success, but were really driven to achieve that goal, and to me that made it all worthwhile. And now to be here at Fremantle, that's really the icing on the cake.



After two premierships and an 80% winning record at Subiaco was it hard to leave the Lions?

I'd been there for four years, so I had probably come to the crossroads in my coaching. I had to see if I was going to get another opportunity at AFL level, and if that wasn't forthcoming I would have to either continue coaching in the second tier or move into another stream of work. Fortunately the opportunity came up at Fremantle, and despite loving every minute of my time at Subiaco, I'm excited about the change and the move.

How happy are you to be back in the AFL system?

Well football wasn't much of a priority after 2001. The last year at West Coast was a pretty low time in my life, but the Subiaco job was the catalyst for me to set my goal on getting back into the AFL. And fortunately that's how it all panned out.

Most Assistant Coaches have senior coaching aspirations – is it something you hope to achieve in the future?

Yes. This is my 14th year of coaching, and I've experienced a lot of areas and coached over 200 games of footy. So I like to think that with a couple of good years at Fremantle, if an opportunity came up I'd be ready for it. But it's all about timing. Timing is everything in football, and it's very important when it comes to coaching positions. But my main focus is to play my part and do my role at Fremantle, and hopefully the better Fremantle does will help all the Assistant Coaches here to put their name up for senior jobs.

What are your thoughts on the season ahead?

It's a big season for the club, and everyone around here is looking forward to it more so than any other season in Fremantle's history. From a personal point of view, I don't think too far ahead – it's all about getting the processes in place. But it's just a great environment to be in as an Assistant Coach because of how everything's structured around the club.

And finally, is it true that you now rival Chris Connolly and Cameron Schwab as the biggest fan of '70s rock at the club?

We're probably on a par. Cameron and I are fairly similar, and Chris is a little bit more hard core. But it's comforting to know that you can put on an AC/DC song and there are people around the club that will appreciate it!☺

Important Notice ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION AT SUBIACO OVAL

OVER PAST seasons the Police at Subiaco Oval have reviewed the trading conditions of the Subiaco Oval Liquor License. Stemming from increased club memberships and game attendances there is the inevitable few that do not respect the neighbouring properties and become untidy and irresponsible whilst consuming alcohol, mostly prior to entering Subiaco Oval or leaving the stadium. As a result restrictions have been imposed on the Liquor License in the areas that have caused some concern to Police.

The concerns raised by the Police are:

- Alcohol being smuggled into Subiaco Oval
- Patrons entering licensed premises from other neighbouring premises possibly intoxicated
- Patrons urinating in neighbouring properties

- Patrons removing beverages from the Stadium and street drinking

The following details some of the specific changes to the Subiaco Oval liquor license conditions:

Bill Walker Room and Doig Room when used as a Members Bar

1. These rooms will be available one hour prior to the main match
2. Alcohol service limits will apply. A maximum of 4 alcoholic beverages may be purchased at any time, comprising of no more than 2 wines or 2 spirits
3. Increased security presence in these rooms
4. No patrons will be permitted to leave these rooms with any alcohol
5. The bar will close one hour post match with the rooms to be vacated by patrons within 30 minutes thereafter

PUBLIC RETAIL BARS

1. Alcohol service limits will apply. A maximum of 4 alcoholic beverages may be purchased at any time, comprising of no more than 2 wines or 2 spirits
2. No cola mixed full strength spirits will be available. These will be replaced by mid strength spirit and cola products. Some alternative full strength spirits will be available. All beer will be mid strength as in past seasons
3. Bars will open only one hour prior to the main game, but no earlier than 11:00am. Bars will strictly close by 10 minutes into the last term. Some bars will close 5 minutes into third quarter
4. Heightened Security and Police presence will be evident in all retail bar areas, seating stands and especially on entry and exit points to the stadium. Bags will be searched on entry

5. No Alcohol is to be brought onto licensed premises and no alcohol to be taken off licensed premises. Infringements will be issued for these offences
6. A maximum number of 30 Public Bars are available
7. No anti-social behaviour or intoxication will be tolerated. Patrons will be evicted and infringements will be issued by police. Membership bans could also be imposed
8. No Alcohol is to be consumed by juveniles on licensed premises. Infringements will be issued to persons supplying juveniles with alcohol
9. Designated smoking areas will be established outside the stadium in secured areas
10. Pass outs will be restricted during the match to discourage patrons visiting nearby licensed premises during the breaks.

With the mercury hitting 36 degrees it was no surprise that the crowds wanted to escape the heat and hit the speed slides, waterslides and the pools in droves.


Scattered throughout the park, the player group were quick to get in amongst it all with the Aqua Super 6 Racer the most popular attraction.


Plenty of members and supporters were keen to take on the players in races down the speed slides and certainly gave them a run for



Fremantle's Wheatbelt Adventure

As Fremantle's pre-season training program reached its climax in early-February, the players, coaches and support staff headed to the Wheatbelt for the 2007 Telstra AFL Community Camp for three days from 6 February.

The Camp commenced on Tuesday 6 February, with the team setting off bright and early from Fremantle Oval for their camp base at the El Caballo Resort. No sooner were the bags unloaded than the players and coaches were off to visit 15 schools from Northam to Merredin and Toodyay to Goomalling.

For some of the team it was a return to their old schools and to reminisce about their early school days. Justin Longmuir returned to visit Cunderdin Agricultural School, Josh and Matthew Carr returned to their old primary school Sacred Heart at Goomalling and Robert Haddrill caught up with his old teachers at St Joseph's Primary School in his home town of Northam.

The first day concluded with a Civic Reception at the Northam Memorial Hall and the official welcome by Town of Northam Mayor Ray Head and Shire of Northam President Burt Llewellyn.

Day two began with a school leaders' breakfast at the Northam Recreation Centre, where over 200 students and teachers enjoyed breakfast with the players and the opportunity to get that treasured photograph or autograph.

The players, coaches and staff were treated by El Caballo Resort after lunch to a special display by the famous Andalusian dancing horses and Spanish master-horseman Ramon Guerrero.

The highlight of the three day camp came later that afternoon with an Auskick Super Clinic at Jubilee Oval attended by more than 400 local children followed by a team training session in front of the local supporters where the players put on a sharp display for the crowd despite the 40-plus temperature. While the team trained, a fantastic community BBQ was in full swing supported by Fonterra with giveaways for the local supporters while Telstra - Regional WA gave \$500 towards the running of the BBQ, with all proceeds going to the Northam Junior Football Association.

Following training, Chief Executive Officer Cameron Schwab, Senior Coach Chris Connolly, General Manager Football Operations Robert Shaw, Assistant Coach Michael Broadbridge, together with Paul Hasleby and Dean Solomon featured in a Sportsman's Night at the Northam Town Hall. Funds raised from the evening went towards the development of womens football in the region.

The final day of the Camp saw the players visit


a further 12 schools in the region ranging from Wundowie to Koorda deep in the heart of the Wheatbelt region, and from Calingiri to Beverley. Over 1,850 km were covered on day three taking the tally for the entire trip to just over 4,500 km.

Fortunately for the players and staff, they covered the great distances between destinations in the Wheatbelt in the air-conditioned comfort of Mazda vehicles and were well-fed throughout the camp while on the road by Subway, that did a sterling job to supply over 200 footlong sandwiches to hungry players and staff throughout the camp. Thirsts in the hot conditions were quenched by almost 400 bottles of Pump water and Powerade, generously supplied by Coca-Cola Amatil (WA). And back at the resort, there was an endless supply of snacks, including yoghurts and choc milks provided by Fonterra.

The annual Community Camp is a fantastic opportunity for the club to meet it's supporters in regional WA and despite the massive logistical undertaking is one that the club, and especially the players, look forward to each year. The club has visited Bunbury, Geraldton, Pilbara and the Peel regions in previous years. ☐

There are also major additional expenses related to such things as travel and accommodation near treatment centres, keeping family members in contact with one another when they are separated, and finding additional childcare for siblings. Redkite is available to help with essential household expenses, emergency payments and child specific costs such as wigs and special needs items.

Educational services...

Compensating for lost education

Long periods away from school and the effects of cancer and its treatment can have a very disruptive effect on a child's education, development, friendships, self-esteem and confidence. Redkite tutoring grants assists children and young people to reconnect with school and friends, rebuild confidence and self-esteem and catch-up with their studies or their special interests. Redkite scholarships are also available to encourage young people to achieve their educational aspirations.

Music therapy...

Helping to manage the pain and stress of cancer treatment

Redkite music therapists work in children's cancer units providing the children with an enjoyable, supportive and creative environment in which they can express themselves, regain a sense of choice and control and have important areas of growth and development stimulated. Music therapy also provides relief from pain and aims to strengthen

a child's ability to cope with the stress of cancer and its treatment. Sir Malcolm Sargent, by whose name Redkite was formerly known, inspired our original development of this popular service.

Family support and activity days... Sharing experiences and tackling the feelings of isolation

Dealing with the stress and complications of helping a child through cancer treatment can become a difficult and lonely experience. Redkite's special 'Family Fun Days' take place throughout the year allowing the children and their families to get together and enjoy some relief from the enormous pressure they are under.

Bereavement support... Helping families through bereavement

Losing a child to cancer is one of the most devastating things that can happen to a parent and indeed, the whole family. Redkite provides grants for bereavement counselling to help families who have suffered this loss, as well as assisting with funeral expenses in times of financial need.

Welcome to the AFL

WELCOME TO THE AFL is the newest addition to the Community Development Programme (CDP), in partnership with Alinta.

It is designed to attract and engage new participants to Australian Rules football, and introduce the game to those who may not have had exposure to, or have a limited understanding of, the game.

The specific objectives of the Welcome To The AFL programme are:

- To introduce culturally and linguistically diverse populations to Australian culture through Australian Football, the Fremantle Football Club, and the AFL;
- To engage culturally and linguistically diverse populations with Fremantle's CDP;
- To introduce female participants to the Fremantle Football Club and the AFL;
- To engage female participants with Fremantle's CDP.

Fremantle's Community Development Coordinator Raff Guadagnino says the response has been overwhelming since the CDP team began sending information out to primary and secondary schools.

"We've had 48 schools expressing their interest in doing the programme, and we only have spots for 20 schools, so we are having to focus more on schools that contain Intensive English Centres," Guadagnino said.

And it's not just ethnic groups that are targeted by the programme, with female participation also greatly encouraged.

"Most of the schools have been surprised that we are looking to get girls involved in this programme as well," Guadagnino said.

"This programme is designed to show that AFL is for everyone to play, and it's great to let them have the experience.

"The excitement and passion that many women have for the game is just as much, if not better, than a lot of guys."

The Welcome to the AFL programme is conducted over a five-week period. The first week is the introduction to the game, where topics covered include the history of the game and of the Fremantle Football Club, how the AFL operates, and key aspects of the programme. Week two is a practical and fun skills-based session designed to introduce participants to the skills of the game using synthetic footballs. The third week is an introduction to umpiring and the rules of the game. Week four expands and develops on skills learned in week two and also includes an introduction to modified game play, and the fifth and final week continues with modified game play.

"Each session involves a bit of theory followed by a bit of practical," Guadagnino said.

"The participants are also given a Fremantle activity booklet. It's an interactive book that the participants work through as we go through the weeks."

At the conclusion of the programme, each participant is presented with a certificate by a Fremantle player, with the assistance of club mascot Johnny 'The Doc' Docker, at a graduation ceremony. The school class is then invited to attend a Fremantle home game at Subiaco Oval, along with other schools that have completed the programme.

The five-week program will run on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with 20 selected schools from 1 May to 12 September.
