

Introducing new CEO, Steve Rosich

I AM VERY excited to accept the responsibility of being only the third Chief Executive Officer in Fremantle's 14-year history.

I am proud of our club and what we have achieved off-field through the support of our members, and I am relishing the challenge of achieving our aim of sustained on-field success.

Important to that aim is reinvigorating our playing list via the National Draft, where we will have six or more selections later this year. This focus has resulted in a significant number of retirements during and at the completion of season 2008.

As you will see elsewhere in this edition of *Docker*, we pay tribute to the seven players who have called an end to their football careers this season. We will also be saluting the retired players at the Doig Medal Presentation Dinner on Saturday 4 October in the Burswood Grand Ballroom.

I would also like to personally acknowledge the significant contribution made to the club in their collective 841 games for Fremantle by Shaun McManus, Peter Bell, Jeff Farmer, Heath Black, Matthew Carr, Luke Webster and Mark Johnson.

Since being appointed CEO on 25 July, I have been working closely with Senior Coach Mark Harvey and Chris Bond, whom I recently appointed as General Manager of Football Operations.

We are striving to ensure that we have the best structures, staff and resources in place to prepare for the influx of new young players and provide the entire playing group with the first class environment required to achieve sustained on-field success.

Unfortunately, we have not been at the required levels in these areas to date.

Our focus will result in a number of changes in staff and resources across several areas, including coaching, player development, sports science, medical operations and player welfare.

Like everyone associated with the club, I share in your disappointment of not meeting expectations for on-field results in 2008. However, I do take some confidence out of securing four wins from our last seven games and we can all take heart from the development of our young players.

The willingness of the coaching staff to give our younger players increased opportunities this season has seen the emergence of Rhys Palmer (20 games in 2008), Garrick Ibbotson (19), Chris Mayne (17), Clayton Hinkley (5) and the continued improvement of players such as Byron Schammer, Paul Duffield and Marcus Drum.



Rhys Palmer's outstanding arrival on the AFL scene saw him cap off his stellar debut season by winning the NAB AFL Rising Star Award and being named the AFL Players Association Best First Year Player.

The continued strength, skill and consistency displayed by our more experienced (but still young) leaders in Matthew Pavlich, Luke McPharlin, Aaron Sandilands, Michael Johnson, Ryan Crowley and Roger Hayden ensures that our younger and developing players will have plenty of support in 2009.

Our focus continues to be on building a club that can support a talented playing group and achieve our aim of sustained on-field success. Of course, such success is not possible without the support of our proud, loyal and passionate members.

Fremantle's home games, which were sold out regularly in 2008, were attended by a vibrant and passionate crowd that created a fantastic environment for our players.

This sets us apart from other clubs in the competition.

In the meantime, I hope you enjoy your football "off-season", while everyone here at the Fremantle Football Club continues to look towards the challenges and opportunities of the 2009 season with great anticipation.

We can't wait!

2008 Member Elections

NOMINATIONS WILL be sought in early October for one of the two member-elected representatives on the Board of Directors of the Fremantle Football Club. Each of the club's two member-elected Board representatives are appointed for a two-year term. David Garic's term expires on 30 November 2008. Ben Allan is the second of the two member-elected representatives, and his term expires in 2009.

The ballot will once again be conducted by an independent body and will be conducted in both on-line and postal format. Eligible club members will receive all information on the election directly from the independent body managing the ballot process. The club will have no other role in the ballot other than to supply the current names and postal addresses of voting club members as at 30 September 2008.

It is therefore important that the club has every member's current postal address. If your postal details have changed during the last twelve months please notify the club in writing before 30 September 2008.

Full details of the election procedures and important dates will be posted on the club's website, www.fremantlefc.com.au.

Voting is only open to eligible club members that are fully paid up as at 30 September 2008. It is important that members retain their 2008 Membership Card as the membership number may be required in order to complete the voting procedures.

The 2008 Members Meeting will be held in late November 2008 and members will be posted a Notice of Meeting. This is the annual meeting

for members at which the results of the 2008 elections will be announced for the member elected representative to the Board of Directors of the Fremantle Football Club. Members are encouraged to visit the club's website where election and Members Meeting details will be regularly updated.

As in any election, members may only vote once, whether members choose to vote through the Internet or by post. All members will be provided with detailed voting instructions for both methods of voting to ensure all votes received are valid.

Please note that a Voting Club Member does not include Associate Members or any member under the age of 18.

They've been dealt a very tough hand but you see the way they go about life and the excitement, happiness and the joy that they show and it is a privilege to be associated with them, as well as an honour to be the recipient of an award like this."


Rhys rated number one

RHYS PALMER claimed his second revered award in as many weeks in September when he was named the AFL Players' Association Best First Year Player.

The award came less than a week after his outstanding debut season was acknowledged by being named the 2008 NAB AFL Rising Star, winning the Ron Evans Medal ahead of Hawthorn's Cyril Rioli, Richmond's Trent Cotchin and Melbourne's Cale Morton.

The always hotly contested AFLPA Best First Year Player award recognises the difficulties that first year players must overcome. Palmer picked up 252 votes to win from Rioli (167) and Cotchin (80).

The AFLPA awards are highly regarded by the players because they are the only awards voted on by the players themselves.

Art for kids sake



Round 18 saw the curtain come down on the career of the 'heart and soul' of the Fremantle Football Club when veteran and inaugural squad member Shaun McManus announced his retirement after 228 AFL matches.

THE DECISION to end his career following Carlton Mid Derby XXVIII, the 22nd Derby he appeared in, brought to a close a career that stretched back 14 seasons to 1995 when he played his first match against Footscray in Round 5 of the club's AFL debut year.

Shaun's opportunity to savour his final match for Fremantle started well before the ball had been bounced on Sunday 3 August. Team mates from years gone by were invited into the changerooms before the match to witness Shaun's last pre-game routine before forming a guard of honour and applauding him as he made his way up the players' race and onto Subiaco Oval where he was met by his partner Meegan and sons Lachlan, Cooper and Oliver as well as an appreciative Fremantle home crowd determined to ensure Shaun's entry to the arena was as rapturous as possible.

Fremantle claimed the four premierships points over West Coast on the day, recording a 17.14 (116) to 12.11 (83) victory and its 10th Carlton Mid Derby win. But the day will forever belong to Fremantle's favourite son, whose 21 possessions each received a rousing ovation from the 42,096 strong home crowd.

FAIRYTALE FINISH

After the match, Shaun said his send off game could not have been scripted any better.

"It was a fairytale. Earlier in the week I asked the boys for a special effort for me and they came through, they really did," Shaun said.

Arguably the most popular player amongst Fremantle's proud, loyal and passionate supporter base, Shaun took an emotional lap of honour after the game, running the Subiaco Oval boundary with his son and teammates.

"It meant the world to me," he said.

"The supporters came out in droves, they have always been behind me through thick and thin and I really appreciated them staying until the end. It was just a great moment.

"I think that I've really, really given my heart and soul to this club and I'm not sure that anyone before me has. I know I've really, really put myself into this club. I've let everybody know

what type of person I am and I've let them into my life."

Shaun's career was one built on courage, passion, commitment, sheer hard work and a steely resolve to overcome adversity.

Two career threatening anterior cruciate ligament injuries and the reconstructive surgery that followed had the gritty midfielder questioning his future in 1997 and 1998, as did his stretch with East Fremantle in the WAFL in 2005.

But when it would have been all too easy to give it away, Shaun put his head down and did what he has always done best, working his way back into Fremantle's starting 22.

He entered 2007 on the back of arguably his best season in the AFL, playing a key role in the club's push to the Preliminary Final in 2006.

Shaun was one of just five players to play in each of Fremantle's 22 matches in 2007, more than justifying the club's offer for him to play on in 2008 to become the club's longest serving player with 14 years service at Fremantle.

FREO THROUGH AND THROUGH

Club Captain Matthew Pavlich said the 32-year-old father of three embodied all that is Fremantle.

"When you think Shaun McManus, you think Fremantle," he said.

"Shaun is a passionate, hard working professional who places enormous value on mateship, loyalty and integrity.

"When I first arrived at the club nine years ago, Shaun was someone who really embraced me and all the Eastern States players as much as the West Australian players."

Acknowledging his return to the game after two knee reconstructions, Matthew said Shaun's leadership, determination and tenacity were inspirational.

"Shaun has always played the game with a ferocity that few other players have matched," he said.

Senior coach Mark Harvey said Shaun's desire to compete, ability to win the contested ball and ferocious tackling always impressed at the selection table.

"On the field, Shaun is one of those guys who never gives up, no matter what the circumstances," he said.

"Off the field he's the type of person who helps build and maintain a football club because he revels in and promotes camaraderie.

"Shaun is probably the most passionate guy I've seen when it comes to the Fremantle Football Club.

"When they write the history of Fremantle, Shaun will be chapter one."

Chief executive officer Steve Rosich said Shaun's courage, determination and commitment to the Fremantle Football Club could not be over stated.

"There isn't a player who has connected with Fremantle members and supporters more so than Shaun McManus," he said.

"We are proud that Shaun has played such an integral part in our first 14 years as an AFL club, and we look forward to maintaining an association with Shaun that goes well beyond his playing career." □

PETER BELL

Peter Bell's brilliant career saw him establish himself as arguably the finest player to wear the club's jumper and one of the greatest players ever produced in WA.

SADLY FOR THE Fremantle faithful, Peter brought down the curtain on a stellar 286-game career after Round 14 this season, his last outing against Essendon and he finished in style with 20 disposals and amassing a career high 11 tackles.

Since his debut for Fremantle in Round 1, 1995 he has gone on to forge a career that has delivered success at both a personal and team level.

A dual premierships player with the Kangaroos in 1996 and 1999, Peter returned to Fremantle in 2001 and captained the club from 2002 to 2006.

During his 13-year career, the 32-year-old twice won All-Australian selection and is a three time winner of Fremantle's best and fairest award the Doig Medal.

A former president of the AFL Players Association, Peter is a life member of both the Fremantle Football Club and the AFL.

A DIFFICULT DECISION

Peter said hanging up the boots was a difficult decision given how much he loves football and the club but would walk away with plenty of fond memories.

"The premierships at the Kangaroos are pretty special as that's what you play footy for, winning our first final here at Fremantle, and I guess just the mateship and the laughs as it's a terrific environment to be a part of for such a long period of time and that's what you remember," Peter said.

A very humble individual, Peter was quite coy about how he'd like to be remembered by the football world.

"Well, I'm not dead (laughs)! I guess I'd like to think people will remember my time in football as someone who gave everything he had and I can honestly say I think I have done that."

Mark Harvey said that Peter had battled hardship to forge an outstanding AFL career.

"Knowing where he has come from and what he has gone through as a footballer, you can't help but be full of admiration for what he has achieved," Mark said.

"He's probably the best player I've seen think through a game and finish up what I call undressing the opposition. He was sensational at that.

"He brought everything to the table. I don't see that in a lot of players."

GREATEST EVER PLAYER

Matthew Pavlich, who took over the captaincy from Peter, said there was no doubt that the triple Doig Medal winner is Fremantle's greatest ever player.

"He's our most decorated player, a fantastic leader and a champion person," Matthew said.

"Peter took over as a captain of the club when it was at its lowest point and took us into a preliminary final."



Describing him as strong willed and strong minded, Matthew said Peter was held in the highest regard by everyone at the club and by Fremantle's loyal and passionate supporters.

"In almost every game I played in it was alongside Peter Bell and that was an enormous privilege and I certainly noticed not having him run out alongside me in the second half of the season," he said.

"You just knew that every week he would perform, no matter what the circumstances."

Born in Korea and adopted by his parents Jo and Kevin and raised in Kojoonup, Peter's career is arguably one of football's greatest ever stories.

He has an abundance of achievements in life both on and off the football field. Peter qualified as a lawyer while playing football at the highest level and is a dual premierships player.

He is hugely popular with supporters and players alike, as he was an inspirational leader of the Fremantle Football Club.

In an indication of the consistent footballer that he was, between 1999 and 2006, along with his three Doig medals, he also finished in the top two in the club's fairest and best award on three occasions and finished third in 2007.

Despite standing only 175cm in stature, Peter made such a big impact in the game. Peter's football and athletic ability were sometimes under-rated but he combined consistency, enormous courage and great leadership to be a genuine champion of the game and of the Fremantle Football Club. 🏆

JEFF FARMER



Jeff "The Wizard" Farmer has called to an end one of the most entertaining and brilliant careers. His record of 483 career goals is the most kicked by an Indigenous player in the history of the VFL/AFL, while his tally of 224 goals for Fremantle ranks him second in the club's all time goal kicking records.

ADORED BY faithful fans as 'the Wiz', Jeff made a name for himself throughout his 14 year career as a dangerous goal sneak capable of executing freakishly accurate displays in front of goal.

Born and bred in Tambellup, Jeff burst onto the AFL scene with Melbourne in 1995 and he played seven games in his debut season before earning a Rising Star nomination the following year when he added a further 19 matches to his tally and was named as one of the finalists for Goal of the Year.

He booted 47 goals in 1998 as the Demons rose from the wooden spoon to a Preliminary Final and took out the Goal of the Year for a length-of-the-field run against Hawthorn.

PRODIGIOUS TALENT

Jeff finished runner-up in Mark of the Year voting for his leap over Garry Lyon in the final round of the season and represented Australia in the inaugural International Rules series later that year.

He gave the AFL world a reminder of his prodigious talent in 2006. His 55 goals were the most he had kicked in a season since coming to Fremantle at the end of 2001, and the most since his All-Australian season of 2000 when he booted 76 for the year.

Jeff's goal kicking exploits were a big factor behind Fremantle's rise to its first ever preliminary final in 2006.

Senior Coach Mark Harvey said it was always

a difficult time for player to call an end to their career.

"Jeff has made a great contribution to the game throughout his career and has been one of those players who people come to watch at the footy," he said.

Chief Executive Officer Steve Rosich also praised Jeff's contribution to Fremantle and the game.

"Jeff has always played an exciting brand of football and been a favourite of members and supporters since he joined Fremantle in 2002."

"The club looks forward to assisting Jeff with his transition from full-time football to the next stage of his career.

"We will work with Jeff and his management to provide an opportunity for Fremantle members and supporters to acknowledge Jeff's career."

CHILDHOOD DREAM

Always the gentleman, Jeff Farmer was gracious in departure, thanking both his former clubs, Fremantle and Melbourne for the opportunity to play at the highest level, his team mates for the camaraderie they provided and the loyalty and support of his many fans.

"I am grateful and feel privileged to have played for so long at the highest level of the game," Jeff said.

"I'd like to thank both the Fremantle and Melbourne football clubs for the opportunities they have given me to fulfil my childhood dream.

HEATH BLACK

Rugged Fremantle defender Heath Black officially announced his retirement from football in August after 192 AFL games.

THE FATHER of two played 138 matches for Fremantle and 54 for St Kilda between 1997 and 2008.

A skilful and damaging left footer, Heath's tenacity and ability to break the lines saw him forge a career as one of Fremantle's most reliable sweeping defenders following his return to the Club in 2005 after three seasons with the Saints.

He officially ended his career after 11 seasons in the game, admitting injuries had finally taken their toll.

"Once I reached the decision, the realisation was quite overwhelming," Heath said.

Heath said one of the things he would miss most in retirement was the camaraderie.

"The camaraderie and those times at training and at the club when you are just hanging with your mates, that's what I'll miss most," he said.

Taken with Fremantle's first selection (no. 12 overall) in the 1996 National Draft, Heath played 15 games in his debut season and earned an AFL Rising Star nomination before injuries kept him to just one game in 1998.

After finishing runner-up to Peter Bell in the 2001 Doig Medal, Heath headed back to Victoria to play with St Kilda. He spent three seasons at Moorabbin, playing finals football in his last year. He sought to be traded back to Fremantle at the end of 2004 and had his wish granted.


He played every game in his first season back at Fremantle, leading the team for most kicks, and in 2006 he played 24 out of a possible 25 games to help steer the club into the finals for the second time, including a Preliminary Final. His ball winning ability that year saw him rank as the club's second leading disposal getter.

Season 2007 had a delayed start due to injury but once he hit the field for Fremantle he picked up where he left off, effectively driving the ball forward from half back with his trade mark, precise left foot kicks. His endeavours around the club and off the field earned him the 2007 Best Clubman Award.

Fremantle chief executive Steve Rosich said knowing when to retire was always a difficult decision for a player.

"It is never an easy decision for any player to reach," he said.

"It is important to acknowledge the contribution that Heath has made to the Fremantle Football Club and the sacrifices he had made as a footballer during his time at the club." ©

Our Rising Star

Dynamic midfielder Rhys Palmer was rewarded for his brilliant debut season, named the 2008 NAB AFL Rising Star.

RHYS' OUTSTANDING arrival onto the AFL scene saw him finish Season 2008 as Fremantle's leading possession getter with 462 touches – four more than the record of 458 Nathan Buckley set in 1993 when he claimed the honour. He was Fremantle's No. 1 for uncontested possessions and No. 2 for contested possessions, clearances and inside-50s. Couple with that his ability to read the play, run all day, good decision making and deal with the close attention of the league's best taggers and you have a clear cut champion in the making.

The on-baller played 20 of a possible 22 matches in 2008 and was quickly thrust to the front line of Fremantle's midfield ranks following the unavailability of Paul Hasleby and Des Headland and the retirements of Matthew Carr, Peter Bell and Shaun McManus.

Fremantle's star recruit was humbled by the recognition with the 19-year-old admitting that he never expected to cap his season off with any accolades.

"Before the season, it wasn't about how many games I was going to play; I just wanted to really learn and develop my game and if I could play five games, I would be really happy."

WORK HARDER

Looking ahead, Rhys said his focus would be to improve his physical presence, which will be high on the agenda come October when he starts his second gruelling pre-season.

"I really want to get bigger and stronger and faster, so I'll work hard over the pre-season and hopefully next year we can really make something happen."

He said focusing on his role and a continued commitment to his preparations and contribution was how he countered tight-checking opponents, but Rhys knows he has to work even harder next year to improve.

"Backing up next year will all happen over summer for me. You've got to work hard, get into the gym and out on the track to get as fit and strong as possible to be prepared for next season," Rhys said.

BARKING ORDERS

Mark Harvey was proud to see Rhys receive the award and has marvelled at the burden he wanted to shoulder all season.

“It’s been a credit to Rhys that he has been able to sustain what he has done all year and to deal with a lot of other things that first year players don’t usually have to,” Mark said.

“He has brought it upon himself in many ways to get involved in the game more than I normally see from first year players. That includes barking orders at stoppages as a first year player and to his credit he backs that up with how he plays. We are very happy with what Rhys has done in his first year and hopefully there’s more to come.”

Taken by Fremantle with its first selection (No. 7 overall) in the 2007 National Draft, Rhys was identified by Fremantle’s recruiting staff as the best player available to be drafted last November – a view shared by many football critics around the country following

his stellar performances in the NAB AFL U18 Championships last year. The East Fremantle product averaged 32 disposals and three goals per game for WA at the U18 Carnival, which ensured his selection in the U18 All-Australian team.

In a season that delivered limited team success, Rhys’ output, work rate and fearlessness gives the Fremantle faithful reason to celebrate and look towards Season 2009 brimming with confidence in the Club’s youth stocks. ☐



Fab five make State side

FREMANTLE HAD five of its players named in the WA State of Origin team for Season 2008.

Michael Johnson and Aaron Sandilands earned their third selection in as many seasons, with Michael being named on a half-back flank and Aaron as the resting ruckman in the forward pocket.

Luke McPharlin became Fremantle's second most successful State of Origin product by earning his fourth selection in five years. The swingman was named at centre-half back. Classy defender Roger Hayden earned his

second selection in as many years, named in a back pocket.

In his debut AFL season, young gun Rhys Palmer was deemed to be amongst WA's finest 22 players, earning a place on the bench.







In 1998...

Docker takes a look back ten years to the 1998 season

After enjoying its most successful season to date in 1997, the club entered the 1998 season full of confidence to end the year in the final eight – a feat they fell just two points and percentage short of achieving in 1997.

IT WASN'T to be though and, in many ways, the 1998 season represented the end of an era at the Fremantle Football Club, all be it a short one.

Three of the key figures in the club's establishment ended their tenures with Fremantle at the end of the 1998 season. Inaugural coach Gerard Neesham's four year posting at the helm ended and inaugural club Chairman Ross Kelly stood down from his position.

Inaugural Club Captain Ben Allen announced his plans to move on from Fremantle after the 1998 season. Allan, who returned to WA from Hawthorn to captain Fremantle, had his playing career cut short at the end of 1997 but he remained with the club for the 1998 season as a valued member of the coaching group.



Mark Johnson may have only been at the Fremantle Football Club for one short year but the positive impact he had on the club, in the final year of his career, will not be quickly forgotten.

EVERYONE WOULD describe Mark Johnson as a first-rate individual who made an immediate impact on all at the club when he arrived late last year. He had a team-first approach and infectious passion for the game that inspired those around him to work harder.

With a career spanning 10 years and 200-plus games, including a premiership, you'd expect nothing less from a champion of his ilk.

Renowned for his fearless attack on the ball and unwavering work ethic, Mark shaped a career as an ardent in and under ball winner, prepared to put his body on the line to gain possession.

Mark Harvey said the former Essendon midfielder found a niche at Fremantle, regardless of where he was required to play.

"Mark has always had an amazing will to win and a great depth of character," he said.

"He's always had the ability to play well in big matches and do big jobs on the best small forwards going round but then be able to go forward and kick goals."

The Senior Coach said the club's younger players had learnt a lot from the veteran of 194 games with Essendon and 14 with Fremantle.

"They've learnt a lot from Mark about how to prepare mentally and physically for a game and how to keep your body in immaculate condition," he said.

"One of the things that struck me about him is his ability to throw himself into a contest, which would then leave you wondering where he had come from or how he had got there."

After a rewarding year at Fremantle, Mark Johnson believes his career now has closure

after a disappointing end at his previous club Essendon.

"At the end of last year it didn't seem quite right to finish my career but at the end of this year I'm very comfortable with it and it seems like the right time," Mark said.

"I've really enjoyed getting over here and becoming part of Fremantle. I've enjoyed meeting Pav (Matthew Pavlich), seeing Spider (Aaron Sandilands) grow over the year, as well as (Rhys) Palmer, Ibbo (Garrick Ibbotson) and Clayton Hinkley, who I came over here with.

"The club is in really good shape and I'm happy to be leaving at this time."

POSITIVE IMPACT

As for his future, Johnson will head back to Melbourne with some intention of coaching at any level.

"Coaching is something I'm definitely looking at," he said.

"I believe coaching is about getting the best out of a person and I love doing that. Not for any real benefit to myself but I love seeing people get the best out of what they have.

"I know I got the most out of myself and I don't think that anyone can doubt that I didn't give the game all that I had to give."

Fremantle Chief Executive Officer Steve Rosich praised Mark for the positive impact right across the Club during his time at Fremantle.

"Mark has been a real asset to the Fremantle Football Club on and off the field during his time with us and we wish him all the very best in his life after football," he said. ☺

In no uncertain terms, Luke Webster's reel of highlights in his 33 game AFL career with Fremantle holds as many memorable moments as players who have reached triple figures in their career games count.

THE 26-YEAR-OLD was amongst Fremantle's best players in its historic first final against Essendon in 2003 as well lining up in the club's semi-final and preliminary final in 2006.

He was also the reason Shaun McManus got to celebrate his 200th AFL match with a win in Round 5, 2007. In a low scoring, rain affected affair at Subiaco Oval against Adelaide, Luke snapped the match winning point late in the game to ensure Fremantle scraped home by the barest of margins to give Shaun a fairytale result in his milestone match.

SELFLESS CLUBMAN

A popular and respected member of the Fremantle playing group, Luke took out the Best Clubman award in 2006. His commitment to the Club is what absolved him of any disappointment associated with stepping away from Fremantle when he announced his intentions in August after six seasons with Fremantle. Ever the selfless clubman, Luke stepped away to allow the club's exciting up and coming young guns the opportunity develop further and reach the highest level quicker to help the club begin its quest for sustained success.

"I've had great times at the club and the Fremantle Football Club has been supportive of me throughout the years, particularly during the various setbacks I've had in my career," he said.

"My journey at the Fremantle footy club has been terrific, I've cherished every moment and I'm very thankful for all the support they have given me over the years."

Luke's run of crippling knee injuries saw him undergo surgery on four different occasions to repair ligament damage over the course of his career. His most recent knee injury came on 5 April this year playing for East Perth in the WAFL when he ruptured his left anterior cruciate ligament. But instead of heading down the tried and tested path of reconstruction surgery to repair the damaged ligament, Luke opted for the road less travelled in a bid to return to the field much sooner than what reconstructive surgery allowed. Luke underwent revolutionary Ligament Augmentation Replacement Surgery (LARS). The surgery involved replacing the damaged ligament with an industrial strength polyester fibre ligament and allowed him to return to the field just 91 days after the operation.

NEXT GENERATION

Luke said his battle with knee injuries had an influence over his plans to step away from Fremantle, but the key reason was to provide the next generation of Fremantle players room to grow.

"It has been a contributing factor in that I haven't been able to get out on the park but it's more that I feel that the club is going in a different direction with the young players

coming through and I don't want to be in their way," Luke said.

But it will not be the injuries that Luke will focus on in years to come, preferring to look back with fondness on the moments that he played in helping shape the history of the Fremantle Football Club.

"Most of those 33 games were pretty important and I feel that in stepping down my time has been productive," he said.

"Although there were a lot of lows, the highs of playing in three of the four finals that the club has played in make up for that and I can say that I've done everything right to get to the high points.





MENTAL TOUGHNESS


Senior Coach Mark Harvey gave a glowing endorsement of Luke's resolve as a player and person.





BUMPER WAFL CROWDS IN 2008

The WAFL experienced its greatest crowds since 1997 this season, with an increase of 4422 on last year's attendances over the course of 23 rounds of the home-and-away season.

A total of 179,452 fans headed to a regular season WAFL game in one of the closest seasons in recent times, with six teams still in the running to make the top four only weeks out from the finals series.

"Crowds were sitting on the edge of their seats in the final rounds of the year with so many teams

in the race for this year's finals," said West Australian Football Commission Director of Football Grant Dorrington.

"This season the WAFL competition was one of the closest in many years and apart from a well-disciplined Subiaco team losing just one game for the year, the rest of the teams were fighting it out for a taste of finals action.

"Our clubs have done a mountain of work trying to connect to their local communities and it has resulted in their community getting behind them."

Back in 1997 184,646 people were treated to a finals series that resulted in South Fremantle beating arch-rivals East Fremantle by just six points in the WAFL grand final.

Over the past five years there has been a steady rise in WAFL crowds as fans continue to get treated to quality football that all of the family can enjoy.

A total of 25,025 people went through the gates during last year's finals and with the preliminary final being held away from Subiaco Oval this year, it was expected that crowd figure would again soar.

The preliminary final was held at Arena Joondalup – only the third venue to host a WAFL preliminary final since the Page System was introduced in 1931. The last time a preliminary final was held away from Subiaco Oval was in 1934 at Perth Oval.

The first and second semi-finals were held at Fremantle Oval and Medibank Stadium with 9918 people attending those games.

Triumph and tragedy in AFL journey

Five young Fremantle players addressed guests at the club's apprentice graduation dinner and revealed how at times the path to cracking the AFL can be a tough road to hoe.

EVERY FOOTBALLER who makes it to the game's elite level has a story about their AFL journey. Without exception the stories include the crucial roles played by their parents along the way.

Overcoming hardships or coping with tragedy invariably arise and there's usually room for a bit of humour, too.

Five young Fremantle players gave insights into their AFL journey at the club's apprentice graduation dinner on Wednesday, 13 August.

The five players – Rhys Palmer, Chris Mayne, Clayton Hinkley, Brent Connelly and Luke Pratt – had just completed a 23-week nationally recognised course.

For successfully completing the course, which is sanctioned by the AFL Players' Association and run by Victoria University, each player was awarded a Level III Certificate in Sport and Recreation.

The course – broken down into weekly two-and-a-half hour sessions which the players attended on their day off – covered a vast array of topics including core values, first aid, defensive driving, media, nutrition, finance, IT skills, public speaking, cross cultural awareness, the AFL's respect and responsibility policy, game development and sport and the law.

IMPACT OF TRAGEDY

But one of the most touching moments of the night came during Brent Connelly's speech.

The rookie ruckman, who was recruited from Gippsland Power and selected by Fremantle with its first selection (No. 6 overall) in the 2007 NAB AFL Rookie Draft, revealed one of the "toughest things" he's had to deal with happened in his last year at school.

At the time, Brent was living in Churchill, about 158kms from Melbourne, and going to school in Traralgon.

"I made a lot of close mates, who I still keep in touch with and love catching up with when I go home," said the 19-year-old.

"One of the toughest things I had to go through occurred in Year 12 when in the space of 12 months I lost two close mates in car accidents.

"What made it tougher was the fact that neither of them was speeding or drink driving... they were both just freak accidents that should never of happened."

Brent said being from the country such tragedies usually impact on everyone in one way or another.

"From then on I always reminded myself how lucky I am and when I do have a bad day or a bad game I think of those two boys and their families and realise the position I'm in isn't that bad," he said.

Brent's father Rod was a policeman in the area for 34 years until recently and now works

for the Gippsland Power Football Club and Football Victoria.

"I would have to say that dad, and my mum Bronwyn have had the biggest influence on my life and football career to date," he said.

"They always put myself and my brother first and did everything they could for me to be happy and succeed at whatever I chose to do.

"Dad played country footy, and he would be the first to admit he was never going to kick 'snaggers' on the MCG .

"But he loved the game and has always offered support and the odd bit of advice to me when he thought I might need it."

FATHER FIGURE

Brent also told a story that brought a smile to the faces of the 2008 coaching staff who just happened to be in the room on graduation night.

It had to do with the fact that Brent's dad is a longstanding member of the MCG.

"I was lucky as a youngster because he would always take me to the football on a Saturday or a Sunday," he said.



"Between the ages of seven and 12, I was lucky enough to watch a lot of AFL games and saw the likes of Mark Harvey, Chris Bond, Dean Wallis, Peter German and Earl Spalding run around in their prime.

"It's funny how things work out."

HARDSHIPS

Chris Mayne, who played 17 games this season and was unlucky not to receive a NAB Rising Star nomination in 2008, spoke of "living the dream that I have had since I was a little boy".

But first the 20-year-old took the graduation dinner audience back to the day he came into the world and how he was born with a cleft lip and palate.

It is a genetic disorder causing a gap in the upper lip and palate, and, according to Chris, "affects more babies than you would think".

For six months Chris wore a special hood and strap which helped pulled the gap together ahead of his first operation.

This was followed by more surgery, speech therapy, dental therapy, dental work and, finally when he was 12-years-old, a bone graft from his hip into his gum to enable adult teeth to emerge followed by more visits to the dentist.

Not that any of the above fazed Chris.

If anything it probably contributed to the young man he is today.

"Although it caused numerous visits to hospital, dentists and doctor, I don't think it affected anything I ever did in life," he said.

"Maybe it was a lesson in life's little hardships that you have to overcome."

Another 'little hardship' emerged in his teenage years when Chris had to make the choice between cricket and football.

As well as being a member of the Belmont Bombers JFC, Chris played cricket for Belmont and later the Perth Cricket Club, including outings with its 'A' grade side.

LIFE'S OBSTACLES

Chris also played U15 and U17 State cricket, where he was vice captain of both sides and later went on to make the U19 State squad, which was about the same time he was starting senior football at Perth.

"This was when it became obvious that I had to choose which sport to follow because I was training and playing seven days a week," Chris said.

"The workload, I think, contributed to my first year of colts football being a non-event. I developed osteitis pubis and could only play three games at the end of the season."



Chris described it as “another of life’s obstacles to overcome”.

“The thing that helped during this time was the extra work in the gym,” he said.

“I never missed a session, so I could get back and play.

“It was hard to watch my team mates playing when I couldn’t but I was still part of the team and my mates kept me involved and my spirits up during that long time out of the game.”

After talking it over with his parents, Chris decided to give cricket away and devote all his attention to football.

“It was hard to do but it was the right choice,” he said.

SPORTING DREAM

Chris also recalled the drama of draft day when he initially thought he was going to South Australia, until a phone call from his manager came through and reassured him that he would be “staying home”.

“But more importantly going to Fremantle,” Chris said.

“I was stoked... it also stopped any tears from mum. It was also a realisation that I would be training, and hopefully, playing with one of my childhood idols in Peter Bell.

“He and Wayne Carey were who I tried to play like, and I even had one of Belly’s jumpers from his days at North Melbourne.”

Chris also recalled the day that the club’s Player Welfare Manager Lee Walker accompanied by Josh Carr and Luke Webster dropped in for a chat with Chris and his family.

“I couldn’t stop smiling,” he said.

“The first step in my sporting dream had happened.”

Not long after that, Chris’ dad “had a few quiet words” with his son.

“He always has a chat about things and has been a massive impact on my life and a great role model,” Chris said.

“He is someone I need to talk to about footy and life and helps and supports me with everything I do in my life.”

Chris has set and achieved many goals in his sporting career and continues to make and reassess them.

Being drafted by Fremantle was a ‘major’ goal, he said.

“I have achieved another by playing an AFL game and kicking a few goals,” Chris said.

With his trademark humility, Chris told his fellow development squad members and other guests at the apprentice graduation dinner that it was time to evaluate and reassess where he’s at and what his future goals will be.

“Most of them will involve my football club... it is my second family,” he said.

“The amount that I have learnt in one season from the coaches, staff and players has been amazing and I am sure this will continue for the years to come.”

RISING STAR

Like his fellow development course graduates, Rhys Palmer, whose outstanding debut season saw him win the 2008 NAB AFL Rising Star award and be named the AFL Players Association Best First Year Player, also paid tribute to the role of his parents.

“They have done everything for me and sacrificed a lot to help me become an AFL footballer,” he said.

Rhys, who represented the State as a junior in three sports, including baseball, karate and footy, said his “toughest moment” in life so far was on the eve of the State U16 football carnival.

“Being such an important carnival for young boys looking to be drafted (in the AFL), I was training way to much,” he said.

Rhys found himself in the same boat as Chris Mayne – struck down by the footballer’s curse osteitis pubis, or as it is better known OP.

“My body broke down with OP,” Rhys said.

“I tried to play through the carnival but only managed two games and a total of five possessions.”

Convinced that no one would “rate” him, Rhys thought his “AFL dream was over”.

“But I used this carnival to drive me because I felt I had a point to prove that I could play footy.

“Even today looking back on that carnival it taught me so much... from how to look after my body, plus it gave me a real passion to succeed and get to the top level.”


Away from football, Rhys has a bunch of school mates whose ongoing friendship he values enormously.



will be smashed... and an announcement is expected in the next four weeks!






Subway Challenge 2008
