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


LONGLEY'S LESSONS

odhi Derrick was diagnosed with Autism at the age of five. Bodhi's parents found it difficult to find a team environment where their son fitted in. That was until they were introduced to Starkick, a football program for children with special needs.

The program, run by the Coolbinia Junior Football Club, has allowed Bodhi to be part of a team and play the game he loves... Aussie rules.

Like many Starkick participants, Bodhi eats, breathes and sleeps footy. His mother Tam is very grateful for the program and believes it has made the transition into mainstream sports easier for her son.

Here she shares her experience, the challenges that came with it and what the historic match means for women's football.

here was a moment in the game where everything stood still. It sounds clichéd but when you're a part of something so historic it's important to let it sink in, even just for two seconds until the umpire throws the ball up again.

To be able to take a look around Domain Stadium during the first ever women's derby between Fremantle and West Coast on Saturday 9 April, and be able to quietly think "How good is this?" is a moment that will remain with me, not only as a football player, but as a person.

I didn't see the game as a reflection of how far women's footy has come, but rather a celebration of what the future holds.

That's not to say I wasn't nervous. After all, it wasn't too long ago that I called Geraldton home, my main focus was soccer and what seemed like large responsibilities now paled in comparison to those that lay ahead as the captain of the Freo team in the first ever women's derby.

Some of the responsibilities were confronting, but they were welcomed.

Whether it was establishing camaraderie between teammates who had only recently played against each other in the State competition, or adjusting to the bright lights of the media scene that accompanied such a significant event.

Each possessed its own difficulty, but that's exactly what playing football is about, confronting and overcoming challenges and I believe every player that took part did just that.

Many of us did not have football available to us at a younger age. We came from different sporting backgrounds and converged on a national game that can be difficult to learn, but it showed the importance of resolve and surrounding yourself with people who allow you to grow.

The extent of the quality of people I was surrounded by dawned on me on a crisp Thursday night at Fremantle Oval on 7 April.

We had converged at Freo HQ to receive our match guernseys and hold a training session. To look around and see the enthusiasm my teammates had for the game was outstanding.

To hear our names called out by Lee Spurr and be presented with our playing jumpers really drove home the fact we were contributing to something special, not just for us, for the betterment of Australian sport.

For young girls to be able to watch women's football on TV and know there will be a competition available for them at the highest level is an incredibly powerful thing.

As for the game itself, words sometimes fail to truly explain the feeling out on the ground that day.

Walking down the race, shoulderto-shoulder in the Freo colours and being able to stare out and see thousands of like-minded fans who came to appreciate and help grow women's footy was remarkable.

The game itself didn't go the way we would've liked. We weren't composed when we needed to be, and as a whole we probably didn't adjust to the big stage of Domain Stadium quickly enough on the day. But that's not to say there weren't positives.

After the game we spoke about making the most of the experience, enjoying the memories and remembering the feeling of the leather in your hands, what it felt like leaving your boot and the roar of the crowd after a big tackle.

I saw the passion for women's football first hand and that's exactly what we want... the chance to be included and to play the greatest game on earth.


Being part of the first ever women's derby is an experience none of us will take for granted and to contribute to something from the ground up was an incredible honour.

THE FRE TRANSITION

WELLER, LANGION +BLAKELY

In the middle of a quiet suburban street in Fremantle live three 20-year-olds with a love of sport and passion for football.

t the end of 2014, three budding young footballers in Lachie Weller, Ed Langdon and Connor Blakely, converged on Freo from across the country after being selected by the Fremantle Dockers in the AFL National Draft.

Weller made the move from Queensland after being selected with pick 13, Langdon (pick 54) moved from inner city Melbourne, while Bunbury-boy Blakely had some familiarity with the area, having been recruited from Swan Districts with pick 34.

Moving interstate at a young age can be a daunting experience, especially when combined with the

challenge of transitioning to AFL football, but Langdon said Blakely's familiarity with WA was a great help.

"It actually turns out I met Connor at the draft camp, but neither of us remembered it until we were drafted together," Langdon laughed.

"All three of us had a brief conversation when we got to the club and we got along really well from the first day.

"Lachie and I were living with a host family and Connor was living with family in City Beach who we got to know. We were eventually going to move closer to our footy, so we all decided to move in together near Freo."

Being a WA boy and having already experienced the move

from Bunbury to Perth, Blakely said it was important to make Langdon and Weller's move west as seamless as possible.

"If the roles were reversed, I know they would have done the same for me," Blakely said.

"I had plenty of family living around Perth, so to be able to take them over there and have dinner was good and it allowed them to speak with people outside of footy, which is pretty important.

"If you're just meeting people within the football world it can get a bit repetitive, so having the opportunity to meet my friends and family gave them an opportunity to refresh away from footy."

Transitioning from under-18 competition to the AFL environment always poses its challenges, but Langdon said being able to share the experience with his housemates was invaluable.

"You're never going to be absolutely ready for an AFL pre-season, no matter where you come from," he said.

"You get home from training, you're absolutely knackered and all you want to do is sleep, but we all kept each other accountable in our down time.

"It was pretty tough, so we all rode the highs and lows of that together."

Weller said being able to go through their first pre-season as a collective was beneficial and its significance has only been magnified now they've spent more time together at the club.

"The first pre-season was definitely very tough," he said.

"But it's all the more rewarding now that we've got to the stage where we're able to push to play football together.

"We've been through it now and are definitely better players for it."

While their first pre-season together strengthened their friendship and their resolve, there are still moments of competitiveness between the three.

As professional athletes, they're often on edge, unwilling to back down and as you walk out of the main hallway of the house into the living area, you can't help but notice the centrepiece of their household competitiveness.

"We're a pretty competitive bunch," Weller said.

"When we first moved in we had the choice of a Playstation 4 or a ping-pong table, and we like to test each other, so we went for the table."

While the most animated confrontation between the three may result from deciding who's given the role of referee, Langdon said the competition does have the propensity to spill over into other sports.

"As you can imagine, some of the table tennis games get pretty competitive between us," he said.

"We're always looking for ways to compete, whether it's shooting a basketball around or throwing the American football, we usually find a way to make it competitive."

Blakely said his own personality, combined with the sporting background of both Weller and Langdon made competition inevitable.

"We all love our sport and live an active lifestyle and obviously they're from a pretty good pedigree with both Lachie and Ed's brothers in the AFL," he said.

"Out on the track we push each other a fair bit and that transitions into our living situation, so I guess it was meant to be."

The competition in the household isn't just reserved for sports but also for fridge space.

Stuck to the front door of the fridge sits an old edition of the **WAFL Football Budget** with Blakely in full stride, footy in hand, with Weller in support.

Intruding on their cover photo is a roughly cut out image of Langdon playing for Peel Thunder that he had cut out of the same magazine, and stuck next to them on the fridge.

The image of all three side by side on the fridge door

in Peel Thunder colours provides a constant reminder of not only their friendship but also the importance of their first year playing together.

Whether it's the 45
minute drive to Mandurah,
or the northern expedition
to HBF Arena in Joondalup,
the three make the most
of their time in the WAFL
and it has proved to be
crucial to improving their
friendship and football.

"Playing together for Peel has been huge, it was probably the biggest part of the growth in our relationship," Langdon said.

"Obviously, we all wanted to be playing for Freo at the time, but we all knew we had to bide our time and earn our spot, so we ended up playing together with Peel for about three quarters of last year.

"You become pretty close mates when you're playing and driving all over Perth together."

Blakely championed Langdon's assessment of the importance of playing together at Peel, but disagreed with his recollection of who did most of the driving.

"You work out their strengths, weaknesses and it's an invaluable experience to play WAFL together and help us transition to AFL" he said.

"We had a rotation policy with the driving to and from the games.

"But recently, Ed wanted to institute the "rock off" policy to see who drives because he obviously backs himself in paper, scissors, rock, so more often than not we do that now."

In 2015, after 17 rounds of waiting, the household received its first debutant with Lachie Weller selected to face GWS in round 18.

Weller said after becoming so close with both Langdon and Blakely, he felt strange being the first to receive the senior call up, but his fears were quickly alleviated by the support given by his teammates.

"When I first moved in I thought it could get a bit competitive, like if one or two of the guys are playing AFL and the others aren't, but we never had any of those clashes," he said.

"They were really excited for me and that goes throughout the house, we're all thrilled for any little or big win we have."







Langdon's debut came against Melbourne in round 22, while Blakely followed in round 23 against Port Adelaide.

Langdon said for the entire house to go from WAFL players to AFL debutants in the space of a little over a month was a memorable experience.

"It's a pretty special moment because you all ride the journey together," he said.

'You feel proud of them because you're aware of how much work they've put in, especially being with them 24/7.

"Lachie debuted first, then myself and Connor, it was nice having all our first games together and it was a pretty excited household over those few weeks."

Now, midway through the 2016 season, all three have played at AFL level and it seems there is very little time for reflection about their journey, according to Weller.

"You get a lot of people saying that this is probably the best time

of your life, so we try to reflect a bit when we have the time," he said.

"That being said there'll be plenty of time to look back on it when we're older and I'm sure we'll look at it as a pretty special time in our lives."

Langdon said it was important that each of the three young Freo Dockers were aware of the opportunity they had received.

"It's an amazing situation," he said.

"We're all striving for the same goal and we're aware that not many people get to be in this situation, so we're very grateful for the opportunity."

While he acknowledged the periods of reflection are often exciting and always humbling, Blakely admitted the goals of the Freo youngsters lie further than just being able to say they played together.

'We want to play a lot of AFL footy but the coaching staff are never going to hand out games just because we're young," he said.

"We have to earn it and we're fully aware of that.

"We've all had fairly good opportunities so far and hopefully we'll play a lot of good footy together for the rest of our careers."

More than 34,000 Freo and Carlton fans put aside their on-field



FREO HONOUR

From taking the field on Fremantle Oval as a young footballer, to his aspirations of gracing the back page of the newspaper, football in Freo has always been an important presence in Richard Walley's life.

est Australian artist and Aboriginal Elder Richard Walley, who was announced as the club's number one ticket holder in March, has a long history with Fremantle that started as a budding young player and blossomed into so much more.

"I'm an old South Fremantle boy," he said.

"After running around on Fremantle Oval as a young lad it was really quite poignant and almost destined that I'd have a strong connection with the Fremantle Dockers.

"For me it's not about one thing, it's not just 'I came and watched the first game', it was more meaningful as it was a passive engagement which then became more hands on."

Walley said he was honoured to be Fremantle's number one ticket holder, citing football's ability to bring people together as well as Freo's history of innovation as a reason for his enthusiasm.

"It's an honour to be in this position, because the football world is a beacon of social engagement," Walley said.

"Every football club, whether it's an AFL or country club, they become a hive of activity for people to come along and interact with all levels and ages.

"The game has no barriers and I think Fremantle over the years has done exactly that, they've brought in people from all ages, all backgrounds and have been very inclusive and very innovative."

Innovation has long been a staple of Walley's personality, being one of Australia's best known artists and teachers of Noongar culture, so it's not suprising that he's used his skills to contribute to the football club that he loves.

He collaborated with former Fremantle player and current development coach Roger Hayden in designing the club's inaugural indigenous guernsey as well as delivering actions such as ceremonies and welcome to country messages as part of Fremantle's Reconciliation Action Plan.

Walley said being able to design the indigenous guernsey, as well as the club's willingness to bridge culture and football, have been important factors in his endless love for the Fremantle Dockers.

"When I grew up it was every footballer's dream to make it onto the back page of the newspaper," he said.

"I played for many years and the moment that made the back page for me was when I designed the indigenous guernsey, so that was very special for me.

"It was also really humbling to do the toss of the coin at a Freo game, and why that was so important was that I was able to do it with the kangaroo skin on.

"So I was able to bring Aboriginal culture into the arena, and we exchanged message sticks with the other team.

"It shows how Freo have been able to embrace the uniqueness of Aboriginal culture."

Fremantle has flourished as a football club that celebrates indigenous culture, having held the record for most indigenous players in a single game (seven, 2003), with Walley saying the strong connection was no surprise to him.

"Fremantle has a large number of Aboriginal players and the reason

for that is that there's a sense of camaraderie and belonging," he said.

"Aboriginal people are experts at building communities and a football club is a family and a community.

"The whole club embraces people, doesn't judge them and that opens the door for people of all races.

"It's a testament to the club, its staff and of course the players."

Being the Freo fan he is, Walley couldn't keep from talking about his favourite players, most notably, one very talented goal sneak.

"I love watching Son Son (Michael Walters) play," he said.

"He can do anything from take a freakish mark, kick a goal or tackle, he can do it all.

"He's got this bubbling, enthusiastic nature about him as well, which we all love."

As for Fremantle in 2016, Walley said he's ready for anything that his first season as number one ticket holder has to offer.

"Sport is a piece of theatre, you don't know what's going to happen," he said.

"There's anticipation, the experience of a game, the result and then you prepare all over again.

"It's about taking yourself on an emotional ride, and I'm enjoying the ride."

After I kicked the goal there was an overwhelming sense of relief. I don't think anyone would want to be put in that position. I would hate to be remembered as the bloke that missed.


Do you keep in contact with any past players?

MAYNEY'S

mac & cheese

You'll need to use a stove, so make sure you have adult supervision when cooking.

- + 400g macaroni
- + 50g butter
- + 2 tablespoons plain flour
- + 2 cups (500ml) milk
- + 2 cups (250g) grated cheese

Step 1: Cook the macaroni in a large pan of boiling water according to packet instructions until al dente

Step 2: Melt the butter in a medium saucepan and add the flour. Cook, stirring, for 1 minute over medium-low heat



Step 3: Gradually add the milk. Stir gently until the mixture comes just to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from the heat, add the grated cheese and stir until melted and smooth.

Step 4: Drain pasta and return to the pan. Pour cheese sauce over the pasta and stir until well coated. Season with salt and pepper then ENJOY!
