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
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

Road (not) well travelled

TRAVEL IS a fact of life in the national competition. Over the years, the process of moving a travel party of over 45 players, coaches and support staff along with over 900kgs of gear around the country has operated with a clinical precision, as had the organisation of hotels, transport, meals, drinks and training venues.

Most locations are visited regularly each year. Added complexities occur depending on the fixtures in any year, such as a game in Darwin, but for the most part it's all pretty much stock standard. Until, that is, the trip to Geelong in round 8 that proved to be a trip of epic proportions.

Departure from Perth on Thursday for the Saturday game was as normal with departure at 12:50pm. Wrong. The flight was delayed over two hours. The arrival time in Melbourne was now going to be 8:30pm instead of 6:30pm.

After every flight, there is a wait for all the gear to do its rounds of the baggage carousel and then to be loaded onto the bus for the trip to the hotel. The trip to the hotel in Geelong would take another hour.

The late arrival in Melbourne was then followed by an extra long delay waiting for the gear to make its entrance on the carousel. When it did, the endless



procession of people carrying bags and gear back and forth to the bus began. It takes a reasonable amount of time to pack 900kgs of gear into the bus.

There has also been much to enjoy as well over the first half of the year. We have celebrated Shaun McManus reach the memorable milestone of 200 games as well as Paul Hasleby and James Walker playing 150 games for the club. We have also seen some of our future talent make their debut with Robert Warnock, Clayton Collard and Garrick Ibbotson all enjoying their first taste of senior football and showing that they will be good players for our club in the

Con Regan 30.9.1934 - 11.5.2007



THE FREMANTLE Football Club mourned the sudden passing of Fremantle Legend Con Regan on 11 May while holidaying overseas.

Fremantle President Rick Hart said that "Con was synonymous with football in Fremantle and his outstanding character

shone out every day as he represented himself, our great game and his community with absolute pride and distinction.'

"His commitment to the Fremantle Football Club from our very inception as the club's Team Manager and since 2004 as Vice Patron will never be forgotten.

"He represented a passion for everything that is great about our game and he will be sorely missed," Mr Hart said.

At the round 7 match on 13 May, Fremantle players and staff were joined by Hawthorn players and over 36,000 members and supporters to stand in silence honouring Con prior to bouncedown.

Con Regan was honoured by the AFL with the prestigious Jack Titus Award in 2003, the first Western Australian to receive the award. The award is presented annually in recognition of outstanding service to football.

At the time of receiving the Jack Titus Award Con said "I just love competitive sport. It's the fact that people have to become part of a team. The world today is very individualistic and selfish and football makes you become part of a team and think about other people. It's a big character-building asset."

Con played a total of 261 games for East Fremantle Football Club between 1953 and 1965. In that time East Fremantle made the top four every year and won two Premierships in 1957 and 1965. Con became the first player to play

250 games for East Fremantle. He also played in 25 WAFL finals games and 9 state games.

As well as his football achievements Con was also very successful in water polo, playing more than 50 years senior water polo with the Melville Club.

"The Fremantle Football Club will truly miss not only a great club man and football legend but we will miss one of nature's great men," Mr Hart said.

Con was 72 years of age.

Tackling Climate Change

LEADING UP to the round twelve clash against the Bulldogs in Darwin, Strength and Conditioning Coach Ben Tarbox turned up the heat on the players by exposing them to the WAIS Environmental Chamber to help preparations for the hot and humid conditions in the Northern Territory.

The players had two sessions in the Environmental Chamber scheduled into their training week in a bid to simulate the expected playing conditions. The players were exposed to a 30 degree environment at over 75 percent humidity whilst tackling a thirty minute bike session.





"It was about familiarisation and giving the players an expectation of what the conditions would be like when we got to Darwin so there was not the initial impact of the heat and the humidity," said Ben Tarbox.



"It was part of our overall plan for the players. We knew we would be training and competing in mild temperatures leading up to that and so we really targeted making sure that we prepared their bodies for the hot environment."



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AN EXCITING new programme was launched by the club in June that gives twelve young West Australians a once in a lifetime opportunity to become immersed in the culture of the Fremantle Football Club and live the life of an AFL player for five days.

The club, in conjunction with Alinta, presents Live The Dream, the first programme of its type to be conducted in Western Australia, offering participants the rare opportunity to develop skills and behaviours which can deliver long term benefits to themselves and their local communities.

Live The Dream is an in-house programme for 16 or 17 year olds running from 24-29 July. Thanks to the support of the club's loyal sponsor Alinta, the cost of this unique experience for the lucky participants is absolutely free and includes meals, accommodation, apparel for the five day programme and travel costs to and from Perth for participants travelling from regional areas.

Live The Dream is designed to develop teamwork and leadership skills, develop problem solving skills under pressure, provide participants with experiences that take them outside of their comfort zone and develop skills that participants can take back to their local community and pass onto their peers as positive role models.

The intensive five day programme will see each participant appointed a mentor from the Fremantle player group who will guide and assist them in one-on-one sessions through the programme.



The itinerary will include physical conditioning and injury prevention sessions with Fremantle sports science staff, interactive sessions on nutrition, media training, player welfare and player recruitment, senior team match day involvement and post game recovery session, a training session with Fremantle coaching staff and leadership and team building sessions with the Special Air Services (SAS) Regiment.

Three of the lucky participants, Kyle Dolling, Zachary Zucconi and Aaron Oliver visited the club recently for sneak preview of what their week of a lifetime has in store for them.

When asked how he reacted to the news that he had been chosen Zachary Zucconi said, "I was pretty shocked and excited to have the opportunity, it's pretty good."

"I'm hoping to take a bit of leadership, a few skills and all the things I learn from the players back to my footy club."

Aaron Oliver said he was looking forward to getting a first hand look at how life is for an AFL player.

"I can't wait to be spending time with the team to see what they do, see how they do the rehab and everything else."

Kyle Dolling says he was thrilled to be chosen and believes it will be a very good experience for him.

"I'd like to take back more confidence to my footy club and hopefully I can show them leadership and that with footy you should take the opportunities that are given to you as they may not come around again." •

THE ANNUAL Len Hall Tribute Game held in Round 5 against Adelaide this year commemorated the 50th Anniversary of the Special Air Services Regiment (SAS).

Kylie Russell and her daughter Leisa were flame bearers. Kylie's husband Andrew was Australia's first military casualty in the war against terrorism in Afghanistan. He was killed by an anti-vehicle landmine in 2002.

Sadly, Leisa never met her father as she was born whilst he was on patrol 10 days before his death.

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haun McManus had reached his Everest, 200 AFL games. It was round 5, 2007, thirteen years to the round since he made his AFL debut in round 5, 1995. He has proudly worn the jumper of his beloved Fremantle Football Club for so long. He has only been able to do that with the loving support of his family who shared that memorable milestone with him. He is a proud family man.

But where did this deep love of family and of football come from?

The second of five children to parents Henry and Sue, McManus grew up in a typical suburban house at the end of a quiet cul-de-sac with brothers David, Ben and Tim and sister Kelly. Life in the suburb of Willetton was relaxed and fun especially when your cousins, Catherine, Julie, Rove and Luke lived in the very next street.

"When we were younger we would always have family around," Shaun said.

"With cousins living next to us we were always catching up having BBQ's, celebrating birthdays and the like.

"I think sometimes our parents probably made up excuses for us to catch up with family but it didn't bother us kids because it meant we got to muck around and stay up late. "We would also go to my Grandmother's place most Sundays and catch up with the entire McManus family, there were usually about 30 plus people at these gigs.

"But it was great because we grew up heavily involved in family and were taught to love and support your family," said Shaun.

It is not surprising that family means so much to Shaun when you consider his strong family heritage. McManus' 93 year old Grandmother Johanna McManus came from a Miller family that consisted of 13 children. Seven of her eight brothers were jockeys including Jimmy Miller who rode arguably Australia's greatest ever race horse, Phar Lap and her nephew is legendary horseman JJ Miller who rode the Bart Cummings trained Galilee to victory in the 1966 Melbourne Cup.

The arms of the deeply enriched Miller family tree extend like the branches of a Weeping Willow. Stemming from the Miller family are the McManus, Regan/Kerr, Neesham, Sheey (pronounced Shay) and Coleman families. So it should come as no surprise to hear that Shaun is related to Fremantle inaugural coach Gerard Neesham, whose mother Peg was one of the five sisters that Shaun's Grandmother grew up with in the Miller household.

"I am the luckiest person in the world because I have so many relations and I have got a family that

is so into each other's lives and want to help each other at all costs," Shaun says.

"I bet a lot of people would look at my family and think what a bunch of weirdoes because of how much time we spend together.

"My friends at school would get annoyed at having to go to family functions but with my family I would want to be there in a flash, so we are extremely lucky."

Shaun's connection with football in Fremantle and the Fremantle Football Club almost runs as deep as the roots of the Miller family tree. As a child McManus grew up in the heart of the East Fremantle football district and from a young age supported the East Fremantle Football Club, a club where his Grandfather Bernard "Jack" McManus was a life member and also involved with organising past player functions for the club. In his early years Shaun would follow his parents and family to Moss Street, East Fremantle and join uncles, aunts, cousins and Grandparents in the stands at East Fremantle Oval.

"I remember Grandpa sneaking us kids into the Past Player functions at East Freo and we'd chow down on sausage rolls and cans of coke in amongst all the great East Fremantle players," Shaun reflects with a smile.

It was on these days while kicking the football

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in the dark on East Fremantle Oval that Shaun's strong desire to play football at the highest level began.

"I am from a sporting family with a football background," Shaun said.

"When I starting out playing footy, my Dad was working most weekends so Mum had to take me to the footy every Saturday or Sunday to play and the effort that she put in along the way was huge given that my brothers and sister were also playing sport at different times and places all weekend.

"The commitment that my parents had to do that, especially Mum, was awesome.

"They were always at my WAFL games, always taking me to training when I wasn't old enough to drive, always taking me to games and giving me every opportunity to keep going forward," said Shaun.

Starting out playing junior football for Willetton, he quickly began to impress with natural speed and athleticism on the football field. Before long he earned selection in the East Fremantle junior district sides and would go on to win a number of competition best and fairest awards.

Shaun's mother Sue, whose family home in Banjup boasts a cabinet full of association trophies her son has won over the years, remembers Shaun's early love for football.

"Shaun was always out the back kicking the footy with his brother David," Sue says.

"I would constantly have to call them in for a shower and dinner because if I didn't, I don't think they would have ever come in."

When it came to the weekend, Sue remembers Shaun always wanting to get to the game early, which goes against the mould for most members of the McManus family who are not known for their punctuality.

Sue says that in the car to games, she would always talk to Shaun about the conditions on the day.

"We would always talk about his game and I would try and give him a few hints, although he usually didn't need many instructions."

As Shaun progressed through the football ranks he found himself representing WA in the State School Boys competition in 1991 alongside current Fremantle team mate Peter Bell who captained the side that year. In 1992 he made the East Fremantle colts team as a 16 year old and it was around this time that the West Coast Eagles were beginning to make their mark.

"I always remember Dad taking our family to the

football to watch the Eagles play at Subi or under lights at the WACA," Shaun recalls.

"Back then there was nothing bigger or better than going to the footy for me and some of my fondest memories from my childhood are of going to the footy with family and sticking around afterwards so we could kick the footy on the ground, dreaming like every kid out there that one day I would play out here.

"And for as long as I can remember that is all I have wanted to do and still is now," Shaun said.

It is not just the desire to play football at the elite level that Shaun remembers, recalling the fun of attending games with his family.

"When the games were finished and it was too dark to kick the footy, my cousins and I would still be waiting for our parents to come out of the social rooms so we would search the stands for Whopper vouchers and see who could get the most. And as I recall I won hands down!" McManus says with a smirk

During his first year at the East Fremantle colts Shaun was one of five 16-year-olds selected in the WA Teal Cup side along with Bell, Stephen Jurica, Darren Gasper and former Fremantle player Craig Callaghan. That year Shaun gained selection in the All Australian team in only his first year. The following year in 1993 expectations on him were high, none more so than the expectations he put on himself.

Despite the weight of all that expectation, All Australian selection was once again awarded as well as being judged the best and fairest player for the competition, receiving the Larke Medal in 1993. But for Shaun he was disappointed with his performances. Apart from doing the odd flashy thing like having a few bounces or taking a big mark as he was known to do back then, he believed he had played well below his own personal standards. So much so that he wanted to give the medal back.

Later that year a premiership with the East Fremantle reserves made its way to the McManus trophy cabinet and as an 18 year old in 1994 was a member of the East Fremantle league side that won the club's 28th premiership.

The announcement of a second WA side, based in Fremantle, to enter AFL in 1995 provided Shaun a unique opportunity to be a part of newly formed Fremantle Football Club.

One of nearly 70 initial squad members invited down to trial for Fremantle, the lightly built wingman with the golden locks seized the

opportunity and was chosen as one of the inaugural Fremantle squad members and describes the venture into the AFL as interesting.

"We used to be at South Fremantle in the visitors change rooms," Shaun says.

"You couldn't swing a cat in there so you could imagine what it was like trying to fit 70 guys in there!

"We also had to go to Bicton Water Polo Club to do our weight sessions.

"It was really primitive stuff," said Shaun.
"If you were at a WAFL club at least you had a home base but we were at an AFL club and were all over the place but the best part about it being a young person was getting all this free gear. You would turn up and we were given free boots and that sort of stuff. It was amazing."

Shaun's much anticipated AFL debut for Fremantle came in Round 5 1995, unfortunately as a result of Tony Delaney injuring himself during the final training session before the game.

"I was only there to make up the numbers at that stage; I wasn't expecting to get a game so when Gerard Neesham called me over and said 'You've got a game, I'll ring your Dad and let him know and we will fly him over', I was stunned and excited," McManus recalls.

It seemed the years of hard work and sacrifice had paid off as Shaun joined his team mates for the ride out to Melbourne's outer western suburbs to take on Footscray at Whitten Oval on a typically cold autumn day in Melbourne.

Back home in Perth all 30 plus members of the McManus family crammed into the home of Shaun's aunt and uncle, a few hundred metres from his Willetton family home. So packed was



Everyone knows he is just a tremendous bloke. He is one of the first guys that I remember, when I rocked up as a 17 year old at the club, who very much welcomed me and ensured that things were good and I think that goes a long way to demonstrate what a great bloke he is. He enjoys having a beer and having a good time and is one of those guys who you know you are going to run into 10 years down the track and he is going to be the same "Shauny Mac". He is a tremendous guy and one of those people you will never forget throughout your whole life.

He is one of the most professional athletes I have trained and played with. He trains 100% the whole time and gives his heart and soul to the club, but a very important role within the club is to ensure the young guys feel welcome and socially the guys mix well and get along and Shaun does that. When I first arrived at the club a lot of the guys used to call him the "Freo Mayor" because he knew everyone in Fremantle, and still does. Professionally he was one of the hardest training guys I have played with and he sets a wonderful example for all the young blokes and for everyone in general, but he makes sure the guys feel at home and enjoy themselves and that typifies Shaun.

For the McManus family it was a tremendously proud moment and for Shaun himself it was an amazing experience as he had realised his dream of playing football at the elite level and was doing so representing the Fremantle Football Club.

'I was pretty nervous before the game obviously and then afterwards reflecting on playing my first AFL game I got really emotional, Shaun recalls.

Thirteen seasons and countless plane trips later, Shaun has gone onto represent Fremantle with distinction, forming a great bond with the club and the Fremantle community. Though it hasn't always been smooth sailing. Two knee reconstructions early provided big set backs, as did extended periods out of the game. But it was the season of 2005 that would prove to be the most difficult to overcome.

"In 2005 I only played seven games and things were going as bad as they could," Shaun says.

"I played 8 or 9 games for East Fremantle and things were going terrible and I did reflect a lot on my career and most of the things I reflected on were disappointments.

"It didn't look like I was going to play 200 games or get anywhere near it, which was a real disappointment for me," said Shaun.

It was at this point that Shaun would have to call on the support of his family to help him get through.

"I know that the love for me was there always and that the family was feeling everything I was going through and to know I had that support was enough to keep me going all the time," Shaun said. 'And whether we were at a birthday party or other family function: everybody was concerned in a good way and hopeful that I could get back and play football at Fremantle."

During this time it wasn't only his immediate family that Shaun turned too for encouragement. He looked to his other family, the Fremantle Football Club where he also found plenty of support.

"I have been here so long that I have made some great friends," said Shaun.

"I would speak to a lot of guys every week that I used to play with and again they are people who have felt every bit of agony I have gone through and every bit of ecstasy as well.

"Guys like Brad Wira, Jason Norrish, Anthony Jones, Luke Toia, and Ashley Prescott have been great.

"We normally go out to dinner together along with Shane Parker and "Belly", so I definitely speak to those guys often along with Peter Mann, Chris Bond and Matthew Burton as well.

"It is great to have a connection with those blokes and as soon as things weren't going well for me, straight away the phone will be ringing flat out because they want to show their support for me which is terrific," said Shaun.

But it is not just the past players that McManus knows he can turn too. The current players play an important role in his life as well.

"You can always talk to these guys because they have got the same experiences or different experiences which can always benefit you and you can talk about how to deal with what is going on.

"I've always had people I have needed to talk to and I think everyone here has had a need to talk to someone at some point.

"At times you have difficulties with your girlfriend or partner or your wife because you don't give them a great deal of time and that also applies with Mum, Dad and friends, so we share those problems," Shaun says. "We might not come up with the greatest answers in the world but at least you can talk about it with each other."

It was the support of these two families that got him through the most difficult part of his celebrated career.

"Everybody has always been behind me and followed every single step of my career, particularly when things haven't gone well, which has been a fair bit of time," says Shaun.

BYRON SCHAMMER on Shaun

Shaun was one of the older guys who initially helped me out and talked to me not only about my footy game but also off the field and helping me out as a person. I am really appreciative of that. He is also a bloke you can really look up to and learn a lot from, he is a fantastic leader around the footy club.

Shaun is certainly one of the greatest clubmen at the Fremantle Football Club and has been for many years. He is an outstanding individual who shows great leadership. He has also shown great character and courage in the face of adversity and is a great family man and I can't speak highly enough of Shaun McManus. He is someone that I look up too and try to emulate

"Periods of my career haven't been that successful but everyone has rallied behind me and offered words of inspiration and always offered words of hope for me to keep going.

"And when I have played well they're still behind me and when things haven't worked out everyone has still encouraged me the entire time," Shaun said.

As McManus learnt as a child at the family gatherings, that love and support is not only received but also given and he has tried to do that at the club as well, a club that has given him so much.

"I really hope that people could ask me anything," Shaun says.

"I have been through a lot of difficult times and a lot of good times on and off the field and I hope that if some of the guys needed someone to talk to about anything I reckon I have got the experience to be able to help them out and if I can't, then I will definitely be able to find someone that can help them.

"Hopefully that kind of leadership in a way might be able to keep the team really strong together and have that family attitude where you can just go and talk to Shaun or I can go and speak to Belly and say 'this is what I am going through" and "this is what I think" and "have you got any advice for me?"

"And that definitely happens now and hopefully will keep continuing," says Shaun.

However, having to juggle family life at home and at the club can be difficult, especially when you hate letting people down as Shaun does.

"It is difficult. Quiet often I will miss out on a lot of stuff like mates' birthdays and I have missed weddings, christenings and things like that which really hurts you.

"And with football, I have missed things that we have had on and that you really want to be a part of and trying to give yourself as much as you can to each 'family' without neglecting anyone as well is difficult," said Shaun.

Meegan Rubery, Shaun's partner of 11 years, describes the life of a "footy bride" as difficult.

"Most weeks are stressful and you feel on edge most of the time and it is certainly harder now that we have kids," Meegan says.

"Before we had Lachlan and Cooper it was always fun times.

'Now when Shaun comes home there is no down time as we have two gorgeous kids to take care of and I only have a number of weeks left before our

"And when the team heads away every second week you become a single parent, but I think parenting helps keep us both grounded," said Meegan.

The support of Meegan has only strengthened Shaun's resolve.

"Meegan has always supported me and has been to every single game and always brought Lachlan along to the game; although he likes to go to the crèche and not watch me play he is still there," Shaun says.

"And it is a difficult role for all the player's wives and girlfriends because when you come home when things haven't worked out well and even when they have worked out, you are still on edge and you



probably don't give yourself to them as much as what they need but they certainly understand how difficult football can be at times and how difficult it is on them some times.

"But they are always there for me, always there to keep you smiling and take your mind off football which is the best thing, just taking your mind off it."

"Being able to come home and do a drawing with Lachlan or see Cooper; even if he might be screaming his head off half the time is great," McManus says with a rye smile. "It means the world to me, or Meegan might want to talk about things other than football which is a good thing."

"At home we hardly talk about football," Meegan said "With kids it is a whole different ball game."

"As soon as Shaun walks through the door he is no longer a footballer he is instantly a Dad.

"I remember the week of his 200th game Shaun had a lot of media commitments to fulfill but still had to take Lachlan to Auskick training during the week.

"It is a good escape for him and helps mind off football," says Meegan.

As this year's pre-season ended, Shaun reflected on the fact that he had spent 13 of his 31 years at the club, both he and the club had grown together. His trademark golden locks may not have changed much in 13 years but he is no longer the free spirited 18 year old, he is now a father of two with a third on the way and strong figure around the club.

Along the way both have shared in high and lows, which is perhaps why many refer to Shaun McManus as the "heart and soul" of the football club. During the press conference on the eve of his 200th game a journalist asked McManus what it means to him to be referred to as the 'heart and soul of Fremantle'.

In typical McManus style he responded with "It probably means I have been the heart and soul of the club. No, it probably means I have been around for a long time and I have shared the ups and downs

and I certainly feel privileged in being here for a long period of time more than anything. I feel grateful that the community has got behind me. I hope that they have seen the passion that I have shown for Fremantle when I have played over the 13 years and the commitment I have for the jumper and I hope that the reflection of the feelings they have for me is a part of that."

So, as he prepared to run through the banner for his 200th game, carrying sons Lachlan and Cooper, hearing the deafening cheers of the Fremantle faithful, Shaun savoured the moment.

"It was great, I was over the moon! For me to be able to reach that goal and run out on the field with my boys and to still have the rest of the gang (family) in the crowd and to have Grandma McManus and Pop Vernon see me play football is a great thing," Shaun said.

It has been a tough journey for Shaun and he realises that he would not have reached this milestone without the love and support of both his families.

"I think it was almost like, although it was my 200th game, it was 200 games for everybody because everybody had been along the journey," said Shaun.

"We get so involved in each other's lives that when things don't go right for somebody, everybody feels it, everybody feels the pain.

"For me to play 200 games was 200 games for Mum and Dad, all the aunties and uncles, cousins and team mates, both past a present.

"They were more emotional than me because it was such a long journey for them," McManus says with his characteristic laugh.

While Shaun is not sure on his football beyond season 2007, he is not allowing himself the luxury of looking that far ahead. But one thing is sure, when you think of great players in the history of the Fremantle Football club, the name Shaun McManus will be there.

SHANE PARKER on Shaun

"He is someone who has worked through very difficult situations. I have said it before, one knee reconstruction is difficult to come back from, and two is unbelievable. I think it would be fair to say that he hasn't had the greatest support from people above him, I don't think. And he has worked through that and proven his worth and handled it very well. I think what he has done couldn't happen to a better person.

As a team mate he is very unselfish and he is someone who goes out of his way to help people. When people have their own issues he is always talking to younger blokes and trying to help them out. He is that sort of bloke. I would probably describe him as a people person really. That is him in a nutshell and that is a great gift.

You need people like Shaun McManus at your club. Without them the club doesn't function. Someone who naturally thinks outside of himself and it has been great having him around.

HENRY McMANUS on his son Shaun

Shaun epitomises what everyone would envisage as a very strong family man. His strong character and strong family background has held him in good stead. When a lot of people would have given up, Shaun keeps going.

Coming from a close family where everyone supports him, it gives him the confidence to go forward and the drive to achieve his goals.

If you are a good family person, younger people will look up to you and try to model themselves on that person. Shaun is not a good family person he is a great family man and he is setting a wonderful example for others to follow.

Building Bridges

THE FRIDAY night match against St Kilda was the AFL's inaugural Indigenous Round and Fremantle, with a VFL/AFL record number of Indigenous players on its playing list, had the honour of launching the round 9 celebrations of the unique contribution Indigenous athletes have made to Australian football and role the game plays in Indigenous communities.

The launch, held at the Beedawong Meeting Place in Kings Park on Tuesday 22 May, was attended by all Fremantle's Indigenous players, Clayton Collard, Troy Cook, Jeff Farmer, Antoni Grover, Roger Hayden, Des Headland, Michael Johnson and Calib Mourish, and featured traditional

dances performed by the Gya Ngoop Indigenous dance group.

Speaking at the launch on behalf of the Fremantle players, Troy Cook said that was an honour for the Fremantle players to launch the Indigenous Round.

"We, as Indigenous Australians, have played and continue to play an important role in our great game on and off the field," Cook said.

"As players we have been able to share our culture with our team mates and the community. Our role also allows us to make a contribution and have an influence in our communities. It is a role that we accept and are proud to undertake." Cook said.

MrColinMcLeod, the AFL's General Manager Marketing, Communications and Public Affairs, acknowledged the role Indigenous players have played in all levels of the game.

"In many parts of Australia, our game is the preferred sport. There are 87,000 Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander people participating in Australian football programs and this love of the game is reflected at the highest level.

"15 Indigenous players were drafted last year, bringing the current AFL Indigenous list to 71, which represents 10 percent of the playing group and is a VFL/AFL record."



A Kick the Difference

MUCH IS said about the difference in size of AFL grounds around the country and the advantages and disadvantages that those differences generate.

The longest ground is Subiaco Oval measuring 175.6 metres in length and the shortest is the SCG at 149 metres, a difference of 26.6 metres or the equivalent of an extra short kick required at Subiaco compared to the SCG. While that can mean two kicks to goal from the centre of the SCG it could mean three at Subiaco. When Fremantle take on Sydney at the SCG in round 14 the style of play will require adjustment, brought about by the very nature of the ground size, one kick shorter than Subiaco Oval.

A similar situation exists for teams visiting Subiaco. The different dimensions mean more distance to cover from goal to goal than teams may be otherwise used to. For those teams that rarely venture to the west it can be a daunting task. Can there be a tendency coming from the wider grounds to the narrow Subiaco for more balls to be kicked out on the full? Worth keeping an eye on.

The widest ground is the MCG measuring 141 metres with Subiaco Oval third narrowest at 122.4 metres, slightly wider than both Telstra and Skilled Stadiums. The difference is 18.5 metres. This season, Fremantle will tackle a full range of ground sizes. Adjustments are needed, some dramatic and some subtle to play the variety of playing conditions.

"Every ground is different and that is one of the great challenges of AFL football," says Senior Coach Chris Connolly.

You've got an extensive sporting history as a junior. How did you get involved with water polo?

I got into it when I was 13 through family friends. I went down to Bicton Baths one day with a mate to fill in for his side and I liked it so I went back a few weeks later to join up. I played for three or four years but stopped when footy got serious.

Docker understands you were initially a soccer player?

I played soccer in primary school and at the start of high school. I started playing in year one or year two because our primary school didn't have a footy team because our school oval was too small. That's probably the main reason I played soccer to start with instead of football. In year six or seven I joined up with a Canning districts team and played there for two years before I started footy.

How did you first get involved with football?

I played my first game of football in 2002 when I filled in for a mate's team at Bullcreek-Leeming Junior Football Club and ever since then I have enjoyed it more than soccer. I finished off that soccer season and played out the rest of the footy season at Bullcreek-Leeming. The following year I joined Bullcreek-Leeming full time. I played three seasons there before going onto colts at East Fremantle. It was a good club to be at

because my friends had been playing there for years and it had been quite a successful club as far as producing AFL players.

Are you currently undertaking any studies?

I'm doing a fitness course at the moment at the club with a few other guys. Hopefully I'll become a personal trainer after that. I might also try a real estate course next year.

What was the lead up like to your debut match against Richmond in round 11?

I had the worst night's sleep I'd had in a while on the Friday night before the game. I was actually out on the driving range on the Friday when Chris called to tell me I would be playing. I got a lot of phone calls from family, friends and people from school to say congratulations. I tried to keep my mind off the game on the Saturday so I pretty much sat around playing PlayStation.

What was it like when you came off the bench and ran onto the ground?

I was nervous. When I was sitting on the bench I was meant to go on at the 15 minute mark so as the time went on I was thinking, "far out I'm going to have to go on soon" and it was getting closer and closer. I think it was the 11 minute mark when I came on, so it came really quickly. As I ran out I was a bit nervous but once I got out on the ground the crowd faded out and it felt alright.

You came to the club quite tall and lean. What have you done in the past year to bulk up?

In my first year the younger guys did general strength training to get ourselves more used to the training and to get the conditioning. But in the pre-season that has just gone and so far this year I've been doing more weights and bigger programmes to get my weight up and get a bigger body. Our nutritionist has also helped with meal plans to make sure I'm eating enough of the right foods to help me bulk up.

Who have you learned the most from at the club?

Shaun McManus has helped me out a lot since I've been at the club. He's always been good to me since I arrived. He went to the same school as me so we've sort of had the same pathway to footy. He's always said I should play to my strengths and run and carry and everything else would fall into place.

Is he the hardest opponent to match up on at training?

I think he is. He pushes himself and he knows what he can do and he knows he has to work hard to do it. Watching him train and sometimes training next to him, you realise how hard he works. He does it for himself as much as the footy club. I think the way he goes about it is good to watch as he is a good example, and hopefully I can do the same.

Have you tried to mould your game on anyone?

When I was growing up I liked Anthony Koutoufides. He was my favourite player when I was young because I was a Carlton supporter at the time. But I've been trying to work on my own game more than anything else and trying to develop my own game with the advice of the coaches and senior players.

What are you hoping to achieve in 2007?

I'm still focussing on my development. If I'm not playing with Fremantle I'll be playing with East Fremantle and hopefully playing well. I'm looking to develop while I'm at Fremantle and train well and hopefully get a few more games.

Was it initially a relief to get drafted to Fremantle?

It was. I didn't mind going over to the eastern states but it was good to stay at home. I've been playing footy with East Freo and Bullcreek-Leeming when I was young, so it was good to stay close to where I've been my whole life. I think it made for an easier transition to AFL from WAFL, staying at home with family and friends around.

You recently entered into a new contract with the club for two more years. What were your thoughts at the time?


I was relieved, really relieved when I found out the club wanted to re-sign me. Being so young, playing footy at the highest level was what was most important for me. I came to the club as a 17 year old, I'm 19 now, so this new contract will take me through until I'm 21. Knowing I have that time to develop and get my footy as good as I can get it with those two years is a big relief.

Finally, what is the best thing about playing in the AFL?

I love playing footy so it's good to be able to have it as a full time job. It's also good fun to be able to hang around with the guys all the time. There is never a dull moment.

How have you been enjoying your time at Fremantle so far?

It's been a good experience. It's a lot harder preparation wise than last year when I was purely playing WAFL football. The training is a lot more intense and regular. At first it was really different being at the footy club everyday but I'm used to it now and enjoying it. At the start it was pretty hard and I had to adjust to it pretty quickly but I'm doing well now.

What sort of a player were you in your junior football days?

I played most of my junior footy as a midfielder. I was pretty good at it and really enjoyed following the ball. But as I got into higher levels the coaches swung me forward and made me a small forward. I've normally been given a crumbing role but I'm occasionally used as a leading forward at South Fremantle.

Des Headland said the eight Indigenous players at the club are very close. How valuable is it having the older players show you the way at Fremantle?

It's good. I look up to Des, Troy Cook and Jeff Farmer, so being part of the team with those kind of guys is good for me because they took me under their wing as soon as I got here and looked after me. I relate to them well because we have the same sort of background.

You have said that Jeff Farmer is your football hero. What is it you admire about him?

I'm a goal kicker and I respect the way he kicks his goals and how hard he works for his goals. He also has really good footy smarts and is a good footballer and a good bloke as well. At training he tells me where to go and stand to get the ball and how to crumb the ball. He's looked after me and helps me out at every training session.

Have you tried to model your game on any other players?

My other idol is Andrew McLeod. I grew up watching him and really liked the way he played when Adelaide won back-to-back flags and he picked up the Norm Smith medal in both games. He's very skilful. When I get the chance to play in the midfield I try to play the position like he does.

sure I played my best.
I enjoyed it.

Docker understands that you have an artistic streak about you. What is the story there?

I don't mind drawing and painting when I'm bored. Most of the stuff I do is landscape drawing and painting but I haven't painted in a while. I got into it at the start of last year when I was at TAFE in Mandurah. I do most of my drawings out in the country where I come from when I get the chance.

How valuable was your time at the AIS/AFL Academy?

It was really valuable. They pretty much get you ready for playing AFL football because all the drills and facilities are AFL based. When I first went there I was pretty nervous but it was another good step forward from playing WAFL colts footy. We went to Ireland, which was the first time I'd been out of Australia. I got to meet a lot of boys that play AFL footy now so I'm good mates with a lot of guys playing at all different clubs now.

Did you always have your sights set on playing AFL or did you have other aspirations?

Ever since I was a kid I wanted to become an AFL footballer. It was the only thing I wanted to be involved in professionally. I just wanted to play AFL since day one.

What makes up your busiest day at the club?

Monday is normally our busiest day at the club and all the players are there from early morning until late afternoon. My day normally starts with a weights session then a yoga session. All the players meet up for lunch and then we have a couple of team meetings before hitting the track. It took a while to get used to when I started but it's a good routine to have now considering we normally have Tuesdays off.

What do you like to do when you get some time away from football?

I try to catch up with my mates and family and spend some time with my girlfriend. Footy takes up a lot of time so I try to hang out with the people close to me when I get the chance.

Tell us about the day you got drafted to Fremantle.


I was watching the draft unfold on the internet with my manager, my parents and some mates. To hear my name get called out was a pretty big thing. I was really excited and everyone was sort of relieved and happy that the wait was over. It was nerve wracking sitting there not knowing if you were going to be picked up or not so it was a real relief when I saw my name pop up on the screen.

Finally, what are your goals for 2007?

Since the inception of the AFL's Heritage Round in 2003 to celebrate football's heritage and the traditions and history of the game, the Fremantle Football Club has worn the red and white playing guernsey that had its origins in that worn by the Fremantle Football Club that contested the first premiership in WA in 1885.

THIS YEAR'S AFL Heritage Round is the round 14 clash against Sydney at the SCG. This year's heritage theme is a celebration of football in the '70s.

With Sydney's red and white playing strip similar to the Fremantle Heritage guernsey worn since 2003 (white with red V), Fremantle will celebrate the '70s era and the famous 1979 Grand Final between East Fremantle (blue and white) and South Fremantle (red and white).

The 1979 Grand Final, played before the largest football crowd ever in Western Australia where 52,817 packed Subiaco Oval, was won by East Fremantle defeating South Fremantle 21.19 (145) to 16.16 (112).

In the 150th anniversary year of the foundation of Western Australia, more than one million attended football matches for the first time in WAFL history in 1979.

The East Fremantle Premiership side in 1979 was captained by Brian Peake, legend of the Fremantle Football Club (inducted in 1976) and father of current Fremantle player Brett Peake. Peake's Vice Captain was current Fremantle Football Club Director Tony Buhagiar.

Brian Peake led the side to the 1979 premiership in his first season as captain. He also led WA to victory in the State of Origin Championship, winning the Tassie Medal as the outstanding player of the carnival, was selected as captain of the All Australian Side and later won the Lynn Medal as East Fremantle's Fairest and Best for the fourth year in succession. Tony Buhagiar was also selected in the All Australian side in 1979.

The 1979 East Fremantle Premiership side was an all-West Australian side coached by a West Australian:

Kevin Taylor led the way in the Grand Final with 7 goals that took his season tally to 102 goals and he won the Simpson Medal. Tony Buhagiar played his 100th league game in the Grand Final.

Three members of the 1979 premiership side also played in the 1974 premiership side – Doug Green, Brian Peake and Tony Buhagiar.

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





WHY SUBIACO OVAL'S FUTURE MATTERS TO YOU, **OUR FOOTBALL FANS**

By now you have probably read about the report from the Major Stadia Taskforce, which makes recommendations on the best sites for a 60,000-seat stadium in Perth.

Many football supporters will have already formed an opinion on this report, which recommended Kitchener Park in Subiaco and the former power station in East Perth as the best sites for a new stadium. But you may not realise how big an issue this is for football.

Subiaco Oval's future matters to every player, parent and spectator engaged with football. This is because the oval generates most of the money the West Australian Football Commission ploughs back into football competitions including the West Australian Football League as well as community

programs like NAB AFL Auskick and primary and high school competitions for children.

Over the past 10 years the WAFC has provided almost \$33 million in funding to the WAFL. From coaching and management grants to WAFL umpiring and finals, the WAFC has been committed to ensuring the WAFL competition maintains its elite status and continues to thrive as WA's second tier of football.

The WAFL competition and these other football programs help bring our communities together, teach kids teamwork and leadership and provide a huge range of health and fitness benefits that combat growing problems like obesity. The fact that our state premier league competition and these other programs are largely financed by the current oval arrangements is in danger of being forgotten in the hype surrounding new stadiums.

The WAFC will review the report with an open mind and is awaiting more detailed financial information to clarify some of its concerns about the recommendations. The bottom line is that the WAFC needs to understand exactly how and why the Taskforce thinks its recommendations will leave football 'better off'. After all, that was the Government's public statement to the sport and its spectators - that football would end up 'better off' if a new stadium was built.

Some of the questions football has asked after seeing the report recommending a new stadium are:

- How will football be prioritised at a new stadium, both for games and training?
- Will football supporters be required to pay more to attend matches?
- How will football maintain the income streams required to self-

- fund its community and junior football development programs without taxpayer support?
- Is a new venue financially sustainable?
- Will operating costs and hire fees be more?
- How will the WAFC maintain its funding of the WAFL and grassroots football if it does not have the rights to manage its own stadium?

Football supporters interested in the WAFC's latest proposal for Subiaco Oval, which involves rebuilding 85 percent of the current site, should visit the website www.subiacooval.com.au. The New Subiaco Oval proposal was submitted by the WAFC to the Taskforce in March and is costed at \$460 million to deliver new seats for 89 percent of spectators and new facilities for everyone.







Fremantle's Welcome to the AFL Programme, a new initiative of the Community Development Programme in 2007, is designed to attract and engage new participants in Australian football, by introducing the game to those who otherwise may not have had exposure to or have a limited understanding of the game.







THE PROGRAMME will see more than 5,000 students from 25 primary and secondary schools take part this year from schools ranging from private girls schools to Intensive English Centres.

"It has been an exciting start to the programme with fantastic feedback received from all the students and teachers who have participated," said Community Development Coordinator Raffaele Guadagnino. "More importantly there are a number of students who are being exposed to Australian Rules Football for the first time and they love it."

Conducted over five weeks, the programme introduces students to different aspects of the game including the history of the game and the Fremantle Football Club, practical skill development sessions, as well as understanding and respecting the laws of the game and the officials who implement them.

Once students have a sound understanding of the game, they participate in modified game play, receiving Certificates of Participation from a Fremantle player or Johnny 'the Doc' Docker at the conclusion of the five-week course.

As part of the programme's graduation, participating students and their parents are invited to attend a Fremantle home game at Subiaco Oval, to either the round 13 game against Carlton on Saturday 30 June or the round 17 clash with Geelong on Saturday 28 July.

LEN HALL GAME 2007

Formed in July 1957, the SAS goes where conventional forces often cannot, providing crucial reconnaissance, surveillance and counter-terrorist capabilities, at times behind enemy lines.

The celebration commenced with a parade of more than 70 SAS veterans and family members around Subiaco Oval with Fremantle Vice Patron and Chairman of the SAS Resources Trust Professor David Malcolm AC, QC and Federal Minister for Veteran's Affairs the Honourable Bruce Billson MP taking the salute on march past.

The lighting of the Flame of Remembrance was again the highlight. In remembrance of the 44 SAS members who have lost

their lives while on duty, 44 flags formed a path of honour for the flame on its way to the cauldron.

Kylie Russell, widow of the late Sgt. Andrew Russell, and her daughter Leisa brought the flame onto the field represent the wives and children of fallen soldiers of the SAS regiment before passing the flame to Brian Kent, a former member of the SAS Operational Counter Terrorist Squadron. The flame was then passed to Bart Maverick, a Vietnam War veteran, before being passed to original SAS Regiment member, Eddie Renton, to light the cauldron.

The Ode was read by Gerrand Bampton, the Last Post and Reveille performed by Chief Petty Officer Musician Ted Tate, the National Anthem sung by Brendan Hanson and the coin toss undertaken by National President of the SAS Association Lieutenant Colonel David Lewis.

The SAS Regiment has a proud and successful history, rich with experience in dangerous operations which have been undertaken in the interests of all Australians.

Much of the Regiment's success can be attributed to the demanding training regime it undertakes and the high standards it requires of its members.

The Regiment has, over the years, performed with distinction in a wide range of operational areas. In more recent times, the Regiment has been heavily involved in Iraq and Afghanistan,

The Len Hall Game is named in honour of WA's last Gallipoli veteran Len Hall, 1897-1999, a member of the 10th Light Horse Regiment and one of the last men to leave Gallipoli.
