

From the President

This year has been a great year for the Fremantle Football Club. It has been a year where the Club has continued its rise from the disastrous 2001 season, a rise that can be attributed to the efforts of all involved at the Club, players, staff and, most importantly, the Club's loyal and passionate supporters.

The end of the 2001 season saw the Club at the bottom, both on and off the field. We not only finished last on the premiership ladder but posted a \$2.5 million trading loss for the year. The end of 2001 saw a new Board of Management appointed, Cameron Schwab appointed as Chief Executive Officer, Chris Connolly take the reins as the new Senior Coach, and a new executive management team appointed to set about rebuilding the Fremantle Football Club.

While season 2003 is one that we can all be proud of, we are only still in the first stages of that rebuilding. The Club improved its financial position in 2002 by over \$1 million and in December 2003 the Club was pleased to announce a trading profit of \$711,223. This is a fantastic result and completes a significant turnaround over the last two years. This result clearly shows that the plans put in place at the beginning of 2002 are delivering the Club the financial stability necessary to be a real force in the AFL. I must acknowledge the efforts of the staff and players who have worked tirelessly to deliver what we have set out to achieve both on and off the field.

Fremantle had recorded trading losses of almost \$5 million from 2000 to 2002 including a trading loss of \$2.5 million in 2001. This Club has affected a turnaround in excess of \$3.2 million in the past two seasons. The Club is on track to be debt free by 2005, from a situation where we had total debts exceeding \$7.7 million in 2002.

This year was indeed an historic one for the Club in many ways, culminating in our very first appearance in the AFL finals series since entering the AFL in 1995. While we may not have played our best in that finals appearance, the future of our Club and our young players, will benefit significantly from the experience. The passion of our supporters and the outpouring of appreciation at game's end on that Friday September evening were amazing and drive all of us on for the future.

In another significant development during the year, the Club's constitution was amended to bring about two important changes.

Firstly, the previous two-tier Board structure, with a Board of Directors and a Board of Management, was replaced with a single Board of Directors. Our dedicated Directors, Syd Corser, John Fuhrman, and Tom James resigned to allow the seven members of the Board of Management to become the new Directors. I would like to extend sincere thanks on behalf of the Club and its members to the fantastic efforts of Syd, John and Tom over the years. Secondly, the changes to the constitution provided for two member-elected Directors to be appointed. The Western Australian Electoral Commission conducted the electoral process on behalf of the Club and we welcomed Mr David Garic and Mr Les Everett to the Board on 1 December 2003. Mr Garic was appointed for a two year term and Mr Everett for a one year term. We look forward to their contribution as we enter the next phase of growth.

Our year is just reward for our loyal, passionate and often long-suffering members and supporters. It is with their unwavering support that the Club has achieved what it has this year.

Whilst everyone at Fremantle takes great pride in what has been achieved to date, we clearly realise that we still have a long way to go. The foundations have been set for the long term success both on and off the field.

Our staff and players have shown the commitment, dedication and belief in what we set about achieving at the end of 2001, and it is a great credit to each and every one of them that they have given so much to helping us achieve what we have to date.

We can look forward to 2004 and beyond with much anticipation.

Fremantle was the last to be first and as a result there were nine seasons of pent up emotion which was played out on a single day of football at Subiaco Oval – our first taste of September, and we learnt just how tough this competition is.

It took nine seasons, three coaches,

198 games and 107 players for Fremantle to make the AFL finals for the first time.

It was only a step, albeit a very

significant one, as we stay on track to one day win a premiership.

Our attitude has been to take a long term view, and let the short term look after itself – and it has.

It is hard to imagine a club being at a more exciting phase than the Fremantle Football Club, regardless of who you are – player, coach, administrator or supporter.

Football is about moments, and we deal with them in different ways, and as exciting as this season was, it will mean different things to different people, and that is a personal thing.

But let us focus on some of these moments, and what it means to our Club.

I have said that the saddest thing about the Fremantle Football Club is that it has produced a generation of people who never experienced collective success. There has been individual achievement along the way, and a near miss here and there, but sadly little else.

So how does that generation feel today having watched the team play in its first final?

If you are a Ross Kelly, David Hatt, Gerard Neesham or Gerard McNiell who created an AFL football club from nothing, but with a million opinions on what it should look, feel and sound like, what are your emotions today?

Gerard was quoted in the paper the morning of the Elimination Final after his penultimate game as Fremantle Coach in 1998: "They reckon the best steel is made in the hottest furnace... ours has been a pretty hot furnace".

It might have taken a bit longer, but when you hear about the purple army, the house of pain, and the scope Fremantle has to build without being hand-cuffed by tradition, but at the same time so representative of the Fremantle tradition, you should be so very proud that you got it so right... even the theme song is starting to sound OK.

If you are Ben Allan, Peter Mann, or Stephen O'Reilly who walked away from successful clubs, finals and Grand Finals to come home, and be a part of something so different, but have your career over, well before team success, how do you feel?

If you are Chris Bond, captain when no one else could be, not because you were a superstar player, but because you were made of good stuff, but a career finished in the saddest of ways, how does it feel?

So proud Bondy, because the players still talk the example you set.

What if you are Dale Kickett, Jason Norrish, Luke Toia or Anthony Jones, and you straddle the old and the new. Always good enough to be a part of it, but careers running out of time, and just missing out?

There will be some sadness, some anger maybe, and perhaps some jealousy, that is understandable.

They feel pain

because they know and are close enough to those who took the field and could relate to the excitement and the emotion. Hard to console, but a huge part of the day. You are a big part of our Club's folklore.

And what if you are Troy Cook, a fabric person and the toughest of players, who missed his first game for Fremantle and could not even get to the game because of surgery to his ankle. We felt so much for him.

And what about the new generation, already a small part of history, but with so much responsibility to fulfil the promise and potential, a burden which will weigh heavily as expectations rise, and Club enters unfamiliar territory.

In 2003 many created their own special moments:

Paul Medhurst and his happy knack of kicking goals at the most significant

moment and in the most unique fashion.

Jeff Farmer who seems to end up with the ball in his hand, seconds to go, when a goal will win the game. And he delivers.

Matthew Pavlich, decided to take on a game like few have before him and etched himself in the collective conscience of anyone privileged enough to watch the game.

Des Headland, again seconds from the siren when the call was 'any score will do', and he did.

Peter Bell took the ball knowing that the full force of Mark Ricuitto was bearing down on him because that's what you do when you're Peter Bell.

Luke McPharlin flew over the top and marked it against the Premiers. Why? Because he knew he could.

Graham Polak marked in front of David Neitz, who crunched him, but he held his ground because he knows no better and that is what you do.

A coach who stays true to himself, reputations count for nothing whilst building his own, and tells you not to go out and do the garden during the third quarter, regardless of the score because you cannot underestimate the fighting qualities of the team – and we win by a point against the Kangaroos at the MCG

after the game seemed lost.

And the Fremantle supporters stayed, even after the disappointment of

getting beaten in our first final, because that was their moment, and they wanted to thank the players for what they did to make the year so memorable. That was a great moment, and I don't care what anyone says.

A famous photographer who was being interviewed about what he does and what he tries to achieve once said that he is 'pleading the fleeting moment to remain'.

Continue to enjoy the fleeting moments, contest by contest, phase by phase, quarter by quarter.

There will be other moments, because the Fremantle Football Club will have its day – of that there is no doubt.



From the Coach

We did achieve a lot during the season, and in the end exceeded the plans we set back

e beginning of 2002.

Season 2003 was a positive one for the Fremantle Football Club in many ways.

When I first accepted the senior coaching position my main fears did not concern the potential of the Club or the talented young playing group. The major worries were the Club's financial position, losing money and increasing debt, and the position of the salary cap. Both these concerns had the potential to impact significantly on maintaining our playing list and creating the right environment for our players to develop.

Thankfully everyone at the Club has

worked so hard, directors, staff and players, and things have started to turn around. This started in 2002 and

continued positively in 2003. Our salary cap management has been fantastic and the list management team has done a terrific job to increase our chances of keeping this squad together and hopefully adding to it as we continue to build and develop.

Reflecting on season 2003, the majority of our players improved their individual contributions to the team. As a team our brand of football has improved but our weaknesses were exposed against an experienced outfit in our first final. We did achieve a lot during the season, and in the end exceeded the plans we set back at the beginning of 2002.

It was always our plan to build the team towards making the finals in 2004 and once there to be consistent finals

contenders. The aim is to be on track to one day win a premiership. History shows, and I have always said it, that to be in premiership running you must finish in the top 2 on the ladder and to do that you must have a great team.

Our aim in 2004 is to again make the finals. We had our first taste in 2003 and we were all bitterly disappointed on that Friday night. But one thing is clear, we all learnt from that game against Essendon. What that night provided all of us was the highlight of season 2003 in my view. The reaction of our supporters after

our first final was amazing. On arriving at Fremantle so many people told me of the potential greatness of this club and that

it could establish amongst the most powerful clubs in the AFL. Whilst across the season we saw glimpses it was in the dying moments of our season that the dream stepped into reality. It was not an acceptance of mediocrity but an expression of commitment. It is this commitment on and off the field that will drive this club up the ladder.

We expect to improve our brand of football in 2004. Our players are desperate to improve and train in a dedicated fashion that would make everyone associated with the club proud. Our planning for this pre-season began back in July 2003 and our football staff have been diligent, and extremely focused, in evolving the skills based programme of last pre-season.

Our programmes are very specific and tailored to each individual. There are different running and strength programmes that are all aimed, as with last pre-season, to build each individual to be durable over the grind of the home and away season. We are working hard at improving our individual disposal techniques.

Our focus next season will be in three main areas – our ruck clearances, contested ball wins and direct ball movement. The playing group has now been together for a while and will be together for many years to come. We have recruited well again this year to add more young, talented players to the group. The players' attitude, which continues to impress, has again been fantastic and the commitment to take the next step is indeed very strong. Our membership is growing and the purple army is on the march.

Season 2004 will be the most exciting season in the Club's history.

Other teams are improving as much as we are and will also take their next steps as well. This is a very competitive and even competition and we must respect that at all times. Nothing can be taken for granted.

It was definitely a year to look back on with pride. We were fitter and stronger and while we have demonstrated a new tenacity and belief in each other and our play, we still have to continue to develop ourselves and our game plan. Some may



The Doig Medal

The Fremantle Football Club named its Best and Fairest award The Doig Medal in 2003, honouring one of the great footballing dynasties of East and South Fremantle. The Doig Medal honours the deep football heritage of Fremantle, represented by the many members of the Doig family over the years who have played for either East or South Fremantle Football Clubs since the beginning of the last century. (See feature story page 17.) The award dinner and presentations were held at the Grand Ballroom at the Burswood International Resort on Friday 3 October 2003, and was attended by over 1400 people.

WINNER - PETER BELL

Inspirational Fremantle Football Club Captain Peter Bell capped off an outstanding year winning the 2003 Doig Medal. Peter becomes the only Fremantle player to win multiple Best and Fairest awards, winning in 2001. He was runnerup in 2002.

Peter's individual performances and leadership in season 2003 have been exceptional as he led the Club to its first finals campaign. Peter became the Club's longest serving Captain in 2003.

The Captain's performances this year were recognised with his selection in the WA State of Origin side as Captain, winning the 2003 West Australian Footballer of the Year and All Australian selection for the second time. At the 2003 Brownlow Medal Count, Peter collected 19 Votes, the most by any Fremantle player in one season, and included four best on ground performances.


Peter played all 23 games this year and collected the most disposals for the Club with a total of 596 (354 kicks and 242 handballs). He was also in the top 5 for marks, tackles and goals and collected the most free kicks.

Peter was the first player signed by the Fremantle Football Club in 1995 and took the field in the Club's debut game against Richmond on 1 April 1995. He went on to play 2 games in 1995 and kick 2 goals before continuing his career at the Kangaroos until 2000.

During his 123 games with the Kangaroos, Peter was an AFL Rising Star nomination in 1996, played in 2 premierships in 1996 and 1999, a pre-season premiership in 1998, won the Kangaroo's Best and Fairest award in 2000, was runner-up in 1999 and placed third in 1997. He won All Australian selection in 1999 and played in the International Rules Series that year.








RUNNER UP – MATTHEW PAVLICH Matthew Pavlich continued the form that won him the 2002 Best and Fairest Award and in 2003 finished just three votes behind Doig Medallist Peter Bell.

Matthew earned All Australian selection in 2002 as full back and was instrumental in Australia winning the first International Rules Series match in Ireland. In 2003, he again earned All Australian selection as a half forward.

In his fourth season with the Club, Matthew continues to develop into an influential player of the future. Playing all 23 games this season, predominantly in the midfield, Matthew amassed 449 possessions (330 kicks and 199 handballs) and kicked 37 goals. He has now played 84 games and kicked 98 goals for the Club.





THIRD PLACE – PAUL HASLEBY Paul Hasleby played all 23 games in season 2003, arguably the fittest he has been since his debut year in 2000 when he won the AFL Rising Star award and finished runner-up in the Club's Best and Fairest.

The rewards of Paul's pre-season hard work showed, as he gathered a total of 561 possessions (341 kicks and 220 handballs), second only to his Captain. His outstanding year was rewarded with his first All Australian selection, his second consecutive WA State of Origin selection and 13 votes in the 2003 Brownlow Medal, including two best on ground performances. Paul has now played 86 games for the Club and with 17 goals this year, has kicked a total of 80 goals.



FOURTH PLACE - ROBERT HADDRILL After making his AFL debut in 2001 and playing a total of 8 games in his first year, a career threatening knee injury effectively ended Robert's 2002 season before it could begin. Robert's commitment to the long and often lonely rehabilitation program saw him rewarded with his selection for the Round 1 clash with Adelaide in 2003. Making the most of his chances, Robert played all 23 games for the Club this year and was rewarded with selection in the 2003 WA State of Origin team. Robert's efforts to return from such an injury and perform so consistently well in 2003 is an outstanding achievement.

This year has been without doubt the most consistent for inaugural Fremantle listed player Shaun McManus. An AFL Rising Star nominee in 1995 and Club Co-Captain in 2000 and 2001, Shaun played all 23 games this year to take his games tally for the Club to 146 games. Winner of the 2002 Best Clubman Award, Shaun's consistent performances this year, particularly on the road, were rewarded with his selection in the 2003 WA State of Origin team.






The Doig Medal

BEACON AWARD – GRAHAM POLAK

Graham played 6 games in season 2002 after being selected by the Club at selection 4 at the 2001 National Draft. He made his debut in round 1 2002 against West Coast but a shoulder injury curtailed his season. He played 22 games this year, earning an AFL Rising Star nomination in Round 9. Graham continues to show why he is regarded as an outstanding talent for the Club. His strong performances in 2003 were rewarded with selection in the WA State of Origin team.

BEST CLUBMAN – TROY LONGMUIR

With 36 games for the Club prior to the season, Troy's pre-season focus was clearly aimed at putting himself in the best position for a strong 2003. After being selected to play in the first three rounds, Troy returned to West Perth where he played the next 13 games before being recalled for the round 17 clash against Sydney at the SCG. He remained in the side for the duration of the season playing a total of 10 games, including the Club's first final, and kicking 10 goals. Despite the setback of being out of the team, Troy maintained his positive approach to his football and continued to train hard and enthusiastically. Troy set a fine example and his hard work was rewarded. He went on to play in West Perth's WAFL Premiership side in 2003.

The Doig Medal honours the deep football heritage of Fremantle, represented by the many members of the Doig family over the years who have represented either East or South Fremantle Football Clubs since the beginning of the last century.

Since 1898, the Doig family has been an integral part of the history of not only East and South Fremantle, but also of Western Australian football in general, with a total of seventeen Doigs playing for either Club from 1898.

(225 games for East from 1899 to 1912)

The family has provided seven life memberships at either club, club best and fairest winners, and club administrators. Their story is one of tragedy, courage and achievement.

Ron Doig Senior commenced his football career at South Fremantle in 1927 as a 17 year old. Tragically, at 21 years of age in 1932 as Captain/Coach of the Club, he sustained fatal injuries in a finals match against East Perth. He played 99 games





during his short career, including State games for Western Australia in 1930. He was an outstanding sportsman having also represented Australia in cricket against South Africa on one occasion.

Perhaps the best known of the Doigs is George Doig, known as the "Bradman of Australian Rules football".

George started his football career with the East Fremantle Football Club in 1933, kicking 9 goals in his first match and finishing the season with 106 goals becoming the first person to score more than a hundred goals in a season.

In nine consecutive seasons from 1933 to 1941 George kicked more than one hundred goals a year, with a season average of 120 and a match average of 5.46 goals per game. He missed his first and only match in 1938 after 142 games and went on to play 202 games before retiring. He also kicked 62 goals in 14 state games. George never missed getting a goal in any league match in which he played.

In September 1988 George was inducted into the Western Australian Hall of Champions, which includes representatives from all sports.

George was the inaugural inductee into the Fremantle Football Club's Hall of Legends in October 1995. As part of the East Fremantle Football Club's centenary celebrations in 1997, he was selected into the Team of the Century. In 1998 he was an inaugural inductee in the Fremantle Sporting Wall of Fame and in 2000 he was selected into the West Australian Newspapers Football Team of the Century.

In 2002 George was inducted into the AFL Hall of Fame in recognition of his outstanding career - 1,103 goals, 202 games for East Fremantle, captain from 1940 to 1941, played in three premiership sides (1933, 1937 and 1945) and played 14 games for WA.

The year in review

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

This year represented a significant and progressive change at Board level for the Fremantle Football Club. Our constitution was amended to provide for two memberelected Directors. Further, the Board of Management as a structure within the Club ceased to exist from 1 November 2003, with the seven members of that board being appointed Directors of the Fremantle Football Club Limited. As part of this process, the titles for the positions of Chairman and Deputy Chairman were changed to President and Vice President respectively to reflect a more traditional football club environment.

With the constitutional changes to provide for the election of two member-elected Directors finalised, the WA Electoral Commission was appointed to manage the nomination and election process on behalf of the Club. This took place in October 2003, with the election process completed in November. The Fremantle Football Club welcomed Mr David Garic and Mr Les Everett to the Board of Directors of the Fremantle Football Club on 1 December 2003. Mr Garic was appointed for a term of two years and Mr Everett for a period of one year.

The Club's Board of Directors now comprises Mr Rick Hart (President), Mr Len Hitchen (Vice President), Mr Mel Ashton, Mr Gary Berrell, Mr Tony Buhagiar, Mr David Rawlinson, Mr Greg Wall, Mr David Garic and Mr Les Everett. All members of the Club's Board of Directors assume their roles and responsibilities voluntarily.

FINANCE

Poor trading performances that culminated in a trading loss of over \$2.5 million for the 2001 financial year, together with mounting debt, placed the Club in a very precarious financial position. This was addressed by the new Board and executive management team from the commencement of the 2002 season and the development of the Club's Strategic Plan for the 2003–2005 period specifically focused upon turning the Club into a profitable and financially stable football club.

While inroads were made in 2002 that saw trading losses reduced by nearly a million dollars, it was the aggressive management of all business costs, sales and asset management that have seen the 2003 financial year deliver a significant turnaround in the Club's financial affairs. For the first time since 1998, the Club recorded a substantial operating profit of \$711,223 and positive cashflow after repaying in excess of \$1m in debt. On a normalised basis, the operating profit recorded in 2003 has not only delivered a financial trading turn around in excess of \$2 million over the previous year and \$4.7 million over the past two years, but is the best financial result for the Club since inception.

The increasing debt burden of the Club prior to 2002, reaching a level in excess of \$7 million, was also specifically addressed in the Strategic Plan and programmes developed and implemented to bring about a reduction of debt and improvements in the Club's net asset position. Positive cashflow has enabled payments to be made to reduce the liability on the AFL Licence Fee for the first time since 1998 and to continue repayments on debt relating to the Club's headquarters at Fremantle Oval. The Club is targeting to be debt free by the end of 2005.

Following reductions to the operating cost levels of the Club in 2002, management continued to implement further significant cost reductions during 2003 that contributed to the improved trading position of the Club.

The strength of the cost management initiatives implemented in 2003 will allow the Club to judiciously manage costs in subsequent years to align strategically with the growth of the Club.

The Club is again budgeting for another trading profit in 2004, additional repayment of debt and the achievement of positive cashflow and with continued monitoring of financial disciplines and performance, the Club aims to begin building reserves, repaying all debt and be in a position to provide a positive contribution to football in Western Australia.

COMMERCIAL OPERATIONS

Following the conclusion of the 2002 season, the last stage of the Club's administrative restructure was put into affect with the centralisation of all revenue generation, service and marketing functions into a unified business division, the Commercial Operations Department with a single management structure to guide the Club's revenue operations forward in 2003.

This restructure remedied the previously fragmented structures and established a coordinated and common strategic direction. Narelle Finch was appointed in October 2002 as the Commercial Operations Manager. The Club's Strategic Plan 2003–2005 identified that, along with stringent cost management, Club revenues required significant improvement to bring about the required financial turnaround necessary to correct the significant trading losses sustained over the 2001 and 2002 financial years.

The Commercial Operations division was subsequently structured into 5 business units – membership, corporate sales, merchandise, sponsorship and events – over the course of the year and were charged with implementing the Club's detailed revenue and cost management strategies.

While the focus for the Commercial Operations division during 2003 centred on the stringent cost management and the profitability of current operations, significant emphasis was placed on the development of new product initiatives and service improvements for implementation in 2004.

Following the significant growth in business activity during the year and with the development of the future commercial strategies, products and services, the Commercial Operations division was restructured at the conclusion of 2003 with the appointment of Steve Rosich as Marketing Manager to head up corporate sales, membership, merchandise, and events, and Narelle Finch taking the role as Sponsorship and Special Projects Manager. The new management structure will take the Club forward from the solid base established in 2003.

MEMBERSHIP

While achieving its highest ever membership levels in season 2003, the significant potential of the Club was realised by the end of 2003 with over 3,500 new members joining the Club, and many more promising to take this step. Membership records are set to reach unprecedented levels in 2004 and position the Club within the reach of the established and powerful Clubs in the AFL.

To capitalise on the potential for membership growth, the membership operations were streamlined under the leadership of the newly appointed Membership Services Manager Ben Hammond and the membership department was bolstered with additional staff. The new strategies for the 2004 membership year include new membership categories, developments to supporter groups, improved benefits and the



introduction of a member rewards program integrated into membership packages to provide additional value for members.

MERCHANDISE

The Club's merchandise availability and management has failed to contribute meaningful revenues for the Club. In 2003 a merchandising partnership was established with a third party aimed at re-establishing the Club's merchandise capabilities and increasing availability for members and supporters both at the Club's Fremantle headquarters and also for game days at Subiaco Oval.

The partnership delivered the Club much improved product and service delivery for members and supporters over the course of the year. As a result, Aaron Bester was appointed Merchandise Manager to begin establishing the Club's new merchandise operations and at the conclusion of 2003 the Club's new Team Store was opened at the Club's headquarters.

CORPORATE SALES

The Club has enjoyed loyal and valued support from its corporate partners since its inception. This loyalty had been tested during the tough 2001 season and while the level of corporate support through sponsorship and sales of corporate suites, private boxes and coteries has been steady since, there is great opportunity in this regard.

Again, 2003 provided for the development of the corporate sales activities and reassessment of the products and services offered to the corporate market in 2004. Greg Erskine was appointed as Corporate Sales Manager and an additional four staff were added to the sales team during 2003. New commercial properties were developed for the 2004 season, and existing products and operations were refined and enhanced so further improve the breadth of opportunities for the Club's corporate clients to become involved with the Club.

By December 2003, all corporate suites at Subiaco Oval had been sold out for the first time in the Club's history and all sales of private boxes and coteries remained on target to meet budget as the new year approached.

SUPPORTER DEVELOPMENT

A significant new initiative developed during the year and implemented in the off-season was the establishment of a new business unit – Supporter Development. The new unit is aimed at developing the Club's supporter bases and its community initiatives throughout Western Australia at all levels and Jon Haines, formerly from the WA Football Development Trust, was appointed to head up this new unit.

The activities of the Supporter Development group are based upon the long term development of the wide-based support of the Club and for football at all levels.

SPONSORSHIP

The restructure of the Commercial Operations division during 2003 saw the Club establish a new sponsorship department to capitalise on the outstanding support that the Club receives from its current sponsors, and the development of new sponsorship opportunities as the Club heads into the most exciting period in its history. Phil Gallagher was appointed as Sponsorship Manager to identify and develop new sponsorship opportunities for the Club.

The Club enters the 2004 season with BankWest becoming the Club's new Major Sponsor for the 2004 and 2005 seasons, replacing Alinta who will become a Premier Sponsor of the Club. In December 2003, the Club announced that leading WA company Allphones will also became a Premier Sponsor, with their brand on the playing shorts for the 2004 and 2005 seasons.

The Club has been successful in securing a range of new organisations who will partner with the Club for the first time during this exciting period in the Club's history.

FOOTBALL

The Football Operations division set out at the end of the 2001 season to rebuild the fortunes of the Club on the field and in the process establish itself as one of the most progressive and professional football operations in the competition.

Much was needed to be done as the Club had to address all areas of football operations, from player list management, salary cap administration, training and conditioning programs and team support services. This required a long term plan to be developed to set about establishing the Club as a leading edge football operation.

The first stage of the plan was delivered in 2002 and resulted in greatly improved on field performances. However, the 2003 season has enabled the full implementation of the changes necessary to establish the Club as a consistent finals contender. The player list management and salary cap administration protocols implemented in 2002 have restored respect to the Club that now operates with one of the most professional list management systems in the competition. While the Club operated during the 2003 season with a reduced senior playing list, it now enters the 2004 season with a full playing list of 44 players as a result of the stringent and effective administration of player rules over the last two years. More importantly, the increased professionalism has seen the re-signing of all out-of-contract players for 2004 and beyond.

The Club's strength and conditioning programs under the guidance of Strength and Conditioning Coach Adam Larcom over the last two seasons have seen dramatic improvements in the fitness, durability and performances of players and a significant reduction in injury rates that now lead the competition. The roles of Adam and Physiotherapist Jeff Boyle have been critical and the impact of having the Club's best players available for selection cannot be underestimated.

The Club continued to develop its leading edge training programs and resources with the appointment in 2003 of Kevin Ball as the first Biomechanist to be employed full time with an AFL club. The introduction of extensive player training and performance monitoring technology systems will again place the Club at the forefront in this area in the competition. This is a facet of football operations that the Club will continue to invest in for the long term future of the Club and its players.

Team travel routines that were refined and established through the later part of 2002 following extensive research of world-wide practices, proved during 2003 to be successful and, together with the increasing travel experience of the playing group, on-road performances improved. On-going research in this area will identify further improvement possibilities.

The continual development of the football operations for season 2004 has seen the appointment of Steve Malaxos as Assistant Coach to join fellow assistants Kelly O'Donnell and Chris Waterman under Senior Coach Chris Connolly. Steven Icke, who filled the dual roles of Football Manager and Assistant Coach in 2003 will now focus totally on his role as Football Manager.





There is little doubt that everyone associated with the Fremantle Football Club will look back on the 2003 with a sense of pride. We must also recognise that it was just a step, albeit a significant one, but there is substantially more that needs to be achieved.

Importantly, the foundations have been established.

The Club's objectives for 2004 remain unchanged, and accord with the Strategic Plan (2003-2005) that was developed and implemented in mid 2002. This plan effectively became our Club's blueprint for the future and centred around four strategic priorities:



Financial Viability – to turn Fremantle into a profitable, financially stable football club by building net revenues, judiciously managing costs and reducing debt



On Field Success – to build a team that is a consistent finals contender and is on track to win Fremantle's first premiership



uear ahead

Powerful and Definitive Brand and

Ethos – building a national, commercially attractive brand that reflects our values and traditions, establish a winning and professional Club culture that demands respect, and make an annual contribution to WA football



Successful Decision Making – to be regarded as the best decision makers in the AFL

The Club has remained true to these priorities and whilst they are continually reviewed and reassessed in the context of the changing environment in which we operate, the fundamentals of the strategy remain solid and will guide our progress forward.

The year ahead will be one focused on continually improving and developing, on and off the field.

Off the field, the stringent cost management practices set in place in 2002, and the cornerstone of the Club's 2003 profitability, will remain a key focus, as will the generation of long term and sustainable revenues. Another trading profit is budgeted in 2004 and we will operate on a sound commercial and business basis to ensure that the gains that have been achieved are not lost. The Club will continue to be innovative and lead the way.

On the field, we understand that expectations will be high. But we are also very respectful of this competition, one of the toughest and most even in world sport. Perhaps we achieved ahead of expectation in 2003, but that does not alter our objective of becoming a consistent finals contender, fundamental to giving ourselves a shot at a premiership. Our objective is to make the finals again in 2004, and this will again be a tough challenge. It seems that all clubs have recruited well, many will rise above their misfortunes of 2003, players improve and luck certainly plays a part. To achieve the objectives that are set, Fremantle must continually improve.



The international stage



2003 saw the Club represented on the international stage in the AFL Challenge match at the Oval in October against Collingwood and when three Fremantle players represented Australia in the International Rules Series.

Before a crowd of over 12,000 people in a carnival atmosphere at the Oval, including 2000 Olympic Gold Medallist Cathy Freeman, Collingwood's end of season woes continued with Fremantle winning the International Trophy with a 19 point win. Justin Longmuir took the honours as best on ground in the entertaining game. Due to the withdrawal of Peter Bell with a groin injury, acting captain Matthew Pavlich accepted the first piece of AFL silverware for the Club. The game also gave the opportunity for many young players to show their wares before the match committee.

Returning back to Australia after the match, Matthew Pavlich and Paul Hasleby donned the Australian jumper for the first test at Subiaco Oval in front of over 40,000 people while Matthew Carr joined Matthew and Paul in the team for the second test in Melbourne in front of a crowd of over 60,000. Peter Bell withdrew from the team before the first test as his groin injury had failed to recover in time.

Mathew Pavlich made his international debut in the first test in 2002 in Ireland where he was instrumental in Australia



securing a first test win, while for Paul Hasleby and Matthew Carr the home test series represented their international debuts.

The Australian side had never won an International Rules Series on home soil and despite narrowly losing the second test by 3 points won the series on aggregate by virtue of the 10 point victory at Subiaco Oval in the first test.



The Club had taken our seat at the table and had tasted the feast. While we were not able to dine this year, our hunger has grown.







Crowds & attendances

CROWDS

Support for the team has been at record levels over the last two seasons with both home ground attendances and membership reflecting the continued improvement of the team and the developing respect for the Club in the competition. Our home crowds, the Club's 23rd man, proved to be the decisive factor that helped the team get home in many close and important games in 2003.

Membership had risen to an all time high of 26,742 in 2003, an increase of 12.58 per cent over the previous year. Not only is the financial contribution made by individuals, families and businesses by taking out a membership of importance to the Club, but the demonstration of the vocal and colourful passion of the Freo supporters attending our games is what makes our Club unique.

Members and supporters have shown their support at games this year like never before. Since the beginning of the 2002 season, the aggregate home crowd has increased 103,644 or an average of 9,423 per game. The two home Derbies in those years exceeded 40,000 people for the first time.

Non Derby home crowds have exceeded 30,000 on only 6 occasions since the Club's first game in 1995 - one in 2002 and five in 2003.

Season 2003 also saw a raft of individual home game attendance records set against individual Clubs in eight of the Club's eleven home games. *A remarkable year.*



FREMANTLE LEGEND HONOURED

Fremantle legend Con Regan was honoured by the AFL in 2003 with the prestigious Jack Titus Award, the first Western Australian to receive the award presented annually in recognition of outstanding service to football. Con played a total of 264 League games for East Fremantle Football Club between 1953 and 1965. In that time East Fremantle made the top four every year and won two Premierships and Con became the first player to play 250 games for East Fremantle. He also played 25 WAFL finals games and 9 state games. The highlight of his career was playing in the winning 1961 Australian Carnival Team. Con has been involved in football continually since 1941 from junior football in Fremantle right up to the present time as Team Manager for the Fremantle Football Club, a position he has held since the Club's foundation. As well as his football achievements Con was also very successful in water polo, playing more than 50 years senior water polo with the Melville Club, where he is a life member.



SHANE PARKER

Inaugural player and Club stalwart Shane Parker became the first Fremantle player to play 150 games for the Club in round 4 of 2003, in the process becoming the first player to earn Life Membership with the Fremantle Football Club.

Making his debut in round 3 of 1995 against Fitzroy at the Western Oval on 15 April 1995, Shane has established himself as one of the most consistent and reliable defenders in the AFL, called upon each and every week for some of the toughest assignments that face the team, nullifying the opposition strike force. A true professional in everything he has done and continues to do for the Club, both on and off the field, the quiet, unassuming defender Shane is admired by team mates and supporters alike and represents the heart and soul of the Fremantle Football Club.




