

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THE BEGINNINGS OF A HUMBLE HERO



N OLD JUNIOR FOOTY coach once gave 12-year-old Stephen Hill some words of advice, words that have stayed strong in the now 21-year-old's mind.

Back yourself in. Take them on and run, he was told.

"I guess that's what I still do now," Hill says.

Good guess.

Hill has become one of the most explosive players in the competition, taking the game on like few have dared to imagine since his AFL debut in round 1, 2009.

Contrary to the crowd noise he generates on a footy field, with his breakneck speed and gifted left foot, Hill is quiet, unassuming and humble off it.

Good with a secret is how a former official at his old WAFL club West Perth once described him.

BOXER

The twinkle in Hill's eye that set the ball spinning towards future stardom first happened at Sunday League footy, where he used to go and watch his dad, also named Stephen Hill, play for Wanneroo.

"I wanted to be like him and play football," Hill says.

Hill snr was a very good athlete, representing his state in football



when he was 16 as well as being an accomplished boxer and high-jumper.

Young Hill would play football, starting out at Auskick level before joining the junior ranks at northern suburbs club Quinns District.

It's here that one of Hill's earliest football memories exists, on the grass of Anthony Waring Park.

"I remember playing my first under 9s game," he says.

"I got put up a year from where I was meant to be so I was pretty nervous."

His favourite memory from his days at Quinns happened a few years after that.

This time, a 12-year-old Hill, playing under 14s, won a grand final.

"That was a great feeling, playing against guys two years older than me and winning it," he says.

"I remember kicking a goal in that game. I was pretty flattered."

That was Hill's first and only premiership in his footy career to date.

DRIVEN TO SUCCEED

If his junior footy coach was responsible for lighting the fuse that would scorch stadium after stadium today, it's his mother, Stephanie Gray, who drove Hill to where he is today — literally.

> "She would always take me down to training and to all my games," Hill says.

"I'm very thankful to her for where I am today and I owe her a lot."

Hill's parents separated too long ago for him to remember it happening.

"I lived with mum and my brother and four sisters, so I was often away from my dad," he says.

> "We used to go and see him every couple of weekends though.

"He was still there for me and was always supportive, coming to my footy games and giving me tips."

Gray says Hill has always been a kind-natured boy who cares deeply for his family and friends.

But she adds that he also has a competitive side to him that has driven him to succeed from a very early age.

"He would always be the first one down to footy training when he was young," Gray says. "And he never missed training. He always made sure he would go and he always listened to his coaches."

Hill says he always couldn't wait to get to training and get his hands on the footy before the session began.

PRIMED

"I never liked being late," he says.

"I'm the type of person who always..."

likes to be somewhere early and make sure I'm primed and ready to go."

Hill's talent led to an invitation to join West Perth's development squad when he was 14.

A few years later at the 2008 AFL Draft, a rangy young kid from Clarkson trumped the expert's predictions when he was selected by the Fremantle Dockers with pick three.

A dream that began all those years ago was realised and Stephen Hill set course for stardom.

Just keep backing yourself Stephen. Back yourself and run. ‡

A 1941 MEMORY... BY JJ WADE

In 1941 on our way to the Western Desert we met another WA Battalion at Mersa Matruh, the 2/11 Battalion, so we had a game of football. There were some good players who had played in some of our WA teams.

I forget who won but we had some great fellowship and some great stories were told.

The 2/11th went on to Greece and Crete, where the casualties were very high and many were taken prisoner.

We, the 2/28th Battalion, went on to Tobruk where we became the first to take the invincible tag off the German panzers in the longest siege in modern times.

Of course we had the general in charge (Sir Leslie Morshead) who has gone down in history as Australia's greatest general in the field in WWII.

The following year Morshead took us to El Alamein and another great victory, then home to more training and on to Lae and Finschhafen in New Guinea after which I was discharged, having suffered three wounds and a few other complaints.

Elite forces can be beaten by hard, tough resolute men. We were used to hard times having grown up in the depression years, where some saw more meal times than meals.






















2011 IS A SPECIAL year for Matthew Pavlich, who has been nothing short of exemplary since he booted two goals with his first two kicks in AFL footy in his debut match against Melbourne at the WACA in 2000.

It's a year when he ran out onto Patersons Stadium, as he had done 237 times previously, with his teammates in round 2 to make a club-games-record-equalling 238th appearance.

Pavlich played a great game in the midfield, with 28 possessions and a goal.

A week later, Pavlich lined up for game number 239 and sole ownership of the record. Ironically, he achieved this milestone in the city he grew up in: Adelaide.

With his family and friends looking on at AAMI Stadium, Pavlich played his part in a 25-point win over the Crows and was chaired off the ground on the shoulders of teammates Antoni Grover and Luke McPharlin.

2011 was also the year that Pavlich played his 100th game as captain of the Fremantle Dockers after taking over the job fulltime in 2007

He achieved the mark in round 11 against Hawthorn at the MCG, when the team took it to the Hawks for four quarters but couldn't hang on for the win.

And, if all goes to plan, Pavlich will break Peter Bell's most-Freo-games-as-captain record of 107 in round 20 against St Kilda at Etihad Stadium.

The icing on the captain's year of milestones was undoubtedly his 250th AFL game, which he played against new boys Gold Coast in front of an adoring home crowd at Patersons Stadium in round 15.

Pavlich was as prominent as ever in a 50-point win, with the crowd cheering wildly for every one of his 25 disposals, nine marks and three goals, which were kicked when the match was up for grabs.

The skipper gave us a prequel to his 250th with what was his best performance of the year to date in round 14, when he took over a game against the Brisbane Lions at Patersons Stadium to get his side over the line with a five-goal, 28-possession master-class.

Pavlich has been arguably the greatest player to ever pull on a Fremantle Dockers' guernsey in the club's 17 seasons. The milestones he has achieved in 2011 should be seen as testament to the professionalism and dedication he has displayed from the very moment he stepped foot into the club.

Hopefully, the encore to this absolute champion's career sees him reach the 300-game milestone and beyond.

Fremantle Dockers Footba



AYDEN BALLANTYNE GREW up riding horses and had thoughts of becoming a jockey. There was only one problem - he was getting a bit too big. That didn't upset him too much, because he loved football more anyway. But as Ballantyne made his way through his junior sides and was overlooked in three drafts, the feedback he got was ironic "People kept telling me I was too small," said the 174-centimetre Fremantle forward, who felt frustrated by the thought that his biggest flaw was something he couldn't do anything about. "The genes got me both ways."

It's history now that Ballantyne won a Sandover Medal in 2008 and was then drafted by Fremantle. He is closing in on 40 games and 60 career goals, but has not exactly crept quietly through his first two and a bit seasons.

PERSISTENCE

There are as many YouTube clips of Ballantyne playing the pest than kicking tearaway goals or dragging opponents to the ground in a tackle or chasing them into corners. "I don't do myself many favours when it comes to that stuff," conceded the 23-year-old, but his reputation distracts from a story that is more about persistence than peskiness, and Ballantyne hopes people don't think that's all there is to him.

"Too small" was not the only note beside Ballantyne's name when he was first overlooked as a teenaged Peel Thunder player six years ago. He'd never done a proper pre-season and he had struggled to follow one good game with another. But he felt he could get better at both and, leading into 2008, set about it.

In his fourth year as a welder – he'd picked up a knack for it, mending fences as a kid on his horse trainer father's property – he would get up at 5.00am on an average day, be at work by 6.00am, finish at 4.00pm and be at training by 5.00pm, to spend half an hour on the track alone, taking shots for goal. "A lot of my bosses weren't happy because they always thought I was putting footy before everything else all the time," he said.

"Which I was, really. People were telling me, 'You're not going to get to the AFL', but that didn't stop me from wanting to. My motivation was pretty high, then it dropped away for a while, but then you think about it. When the

question is, 'Do you want to be welding for the rest of your life or do you want to play AFL?' it's pretty obvious what you want to do. I didn't think it would happen, but I had hoped it would.''

When it did, Ballantyne needed to take another deep breath. The wrist he'd hurt in 2006 and thought was a little bit sore but not too bad, turned out to need a bone graft and a few months on the sidelines. He was told to stop, before he'd even started, and felt frustrated for new reasons. "It went forever," he said of his lost pre-season, "and I'm not really the type who can sit there quietly and watch footy. I got pretty aggravated."

HEARTBREAKING

His energy was drained again when, in the last round of last year, the foot he'd thought was a little bit sore but not too bad snapped during the first quarter and kept him out of Fremantle's first finals series since 2006. Again – at the end of a 19-game season this time, and a year that had convinced him he could play – he struggled to watch on. "It was heartbreaking," Ballantyne said. "It's something I don't want to have to go through again. There was nothing

I could really do about it, but now I've just got to make sure it never comes back again. I'm not worried about it, but I have to be a bit smart with it."

Ballantyne has always been busy, energetic and bursting with the desire to do something. Incidentally, on a power/weight ratio, the small forward is Fremantle's second-best bench presser. But his solid first half of the season – including a four-goal game in round 4 against North Melbourne – has come after another almost non-existent summer.

Seeing his podiatrist, getting his feet strapped properly and wearing the right orthotics have become crucial moments in his week.

Ballantyne went all-out for his chance, and has no plans to change that approach. But there's much more to him than that. "Now that I'm there, I'm doing everything I can to stay there," he said.

I'm probably a bit full-on at times, but I just love playing footy. I always think, 'How good would it be to get as fit as some of the other guys in the AFL, to be able to do a bit more?' That makes me just want to go full-on with all of the little details, to get better and do everything I can to get to that level."

I'VE JUST COMPLETED MY FIRST EXAM ON AERODYNAMICS. I PASSED, WHICH IS GOOD.

REO YOUNG GUN Nat Fyfe has been doing a fair bit of flying in 2011. He's soared above packs to pluck mark after mark with his big hands, and he has sky-rocketed into Brownlow Medal calculations with a stunning second season of AFL footy.

So it should come as no surprise to learn that the 19-year-old is studying to further his aeronautical abilities – literally. He's studying to become a helicopter pilot.

"I started my training with Rotorvation Helicopter Services back in March," Fyfe says.

"Usually it only takes seven or eight months to finish, but because I'm playing footy at the same time, it's going to take me a couple of years."

Fyfe's love for flying sprouted wings very early on in his life.

His first realisation that he wanted to take over the controls of an aircraft one day came when a family friend, who had his helicopter license, took Fyfe for a ride.

"I just fell in love with it," Fyfe says.

"At school, when the question came up 'what do you want to do when you're older', apart from footy, this was something that I was pretty keen on doing, so I investigated what I needed to do to get into it."

Fyfe's always had an eye on the sky, curiously gazing at passing aircraft and anything else that could fly.

"I've always been fascinated with planes and helicopters and flying," he says.

"Now that I've started to travel a fair bit, flying over East to play, it's something I really want to get into.

"I was lucky enough that the AFL and Freo helped me get a leg up into the industry."

AERODYNAMICS

Fyfe is currently finishing the theory element of his training, which he is doing via correspondence.

"They give me the course and I go away and teach myself," he says.

Fyfe has been doing most of his flight training during his time away from the football club or, ironically, on the plane after away games.

Once he feels confident enough to sit an exam, he is able to go and do it.

"I've just completed my first exam on aerodynamics," he says.

"I passed, which is good.

"Now I'll move on to part two, which is aircraft general knowledge."

Fyfe says there isn't much of a prerequisite for any aspiring aviators out there who want to fly.

"You don't really need much at all," he says. "Just a passion."

MISCONCEPTION

Fyfe hails from the country town of Lake Grace in the South-West of WA and he wants to clear the air about what his family does for a living.

"It's a common misconception that everyone from the country or outside of Perth are farmers. That's not true in this case," he says.

His parents run a transport business which he says has been a massive part of his life growing up.

"We have five trucks which we use to transport everything from sheep to water – everything you can think of basically," he says.

He still heads down to Lake Grace every off-season to give his father a helping hand.

"We've always helped dad from a very young age," he says.

"I've got my road-train licence so I do a bit of driving and I work with my brother pretty closely.

"It's something that I love getting back to and doing."





Fyfe says a typical day at work is fairly basic, but it's good physical labour.

"If you're looking at carting livestock, you go out and load up, take it to the destination and unload," he says.

"It's probably where I developed a work ethic early as a young kid."

SCENIC FLIGHTS

Fyfe says having the family business back home gives him a good fallback, post-footy.

"It's something that I'm still passionate about," he says.

"Whether I'll go into it later in life is another question, but it's something that I'll definitely have a lot to do with all through my footy career."

And he hasn't decided exactly what he will do with his pilot's license when his playing days are over, but there's no shortage of options.

"There are a lot of avenues you can take with it – mustering of cattle and scenic flights, things like that," he says.

"At the same time, I'd love to be able to use it for pleasure and just fly around Australia."

For now, Fyfe is more than happy to keep earning his frequent flyer points on the footy field. $\mathop{\updownarrow}$

Manager Drew Healy welcomed all by speaking the local language. "Shid ma Ho" he said, or "Go Dockers" translated into English.


After sampling the local cuisine, the travellers were treated to an impressive performance from the Chinese Community Centre Lion Dancing Troupe.

Club song vote to coincide with member-elected director poll

HE MEMBER POLL
planned for mid2011 to determine
the club's song for
2012 and beyond will now be
held in late November.

The decision will allow the member poll to be held in conjunction with the annual vote for a member-elected director, which takes place in November each year, making it a more efficient process.

Further details regarding how and when members will be able to vote on the song will be communicated via the club's website and in the Final Siren edition of *Docker* magazine, which is due in households two weeks after the club's last game for the 2011 season.



As advised in *Docker* in March, the options to be considered for adoption post-2011 include the retention of the existing club song, a re-worked version of the current song or the adoption of a new song.

Ken Walther, who wrote the current song, is reworking his original version for consideration in the members' vote on the song.

The club has also commissioned suitably qualified professional

recording artists, who will work within AFL intellectual property rights and copyright, to assist in the production of a shortlist of potential new club songs.

In the weeks prior to casting their vote, members will be given ample opportunity, via the club's website, to listen to the current version and the re-worked version of the song along with a short-list of potential new club songs.

Members will be able to vote to either retain the current song, replace it with a re-worked version or vote for a new song from the short list of potential new club songs. \$\Phi\$





WA's AFL teams in the WAFL

REMANTLE and West Coast have made a joint submission to the WA Football Commission and the WAFL outlining an opportunity for the two AFL clubs to field standalone teams in the State league from season 2012 onwards to make WA football stronger for the future.

Since Fremantle entered the AFL in 1995, and West Coast the expanded VFL in 1987, players not selected for senior representation have been hosted by WAFL clubs.

On 31 May, the two AFL clubs presented the submission to the WA Football Commission, stating that having their own teams in the WAFL from 2012 onward would allow Fremantle and West Coast to maintain control of their listed players and keep pace with their AFL competitors.

At a breakfast briefing on 2 June the submission was presented to representatives from the nine WAFL clubs and other football stakeholders.

In the submission, Fremantle and West Coast presented a case that the

State League also stood to benefit significantly from having two AFL teams in the WAFL.

The key reasons for pursuing this important strategic imperative for our club set out in the 52-page document include:

- Provides the AFL clubs with the best opportunity to play finals football and win premierships
- Allows direct control over their employees/assets
- Fast tracks the development of their players
- Provides better management of player welfare and injuries
- Improves operational efficiencies and logistics of player movement
- Saves costs in terms of staff resourcing at multiple venues
- Allows players to focus on AFL game style and tactics
- · Keeps pace with AFL competition
- Better manages the induction process of players
- · Assists in player retention


 Promotes better team cohesion, bonding and club culture
 On Saturday 11 June, the WAFC, in conjunction with the WAFL Council of Presidents, advised Fremantle and West Coast that they would not support the proposal in its current form.


However, the WAFC and the WAFL Council of Presidents made a commitment to have ongoing discussions about the submission.

"We are committed to addressing these issues while considering the needs of the AFL clubs and will engage in discussion to progress these points," WAFC Chairman Frank Cooper said.

Fremantle Chief Executive Officer Steve Rosich said he looked forward to progressing the key points outlined in the joint submission.





Where have they docked? DANIEL BANDY

An inaugural Freo Docker, Daniel Bandy kicked the first goal of his AFL career against the Western Bulldogs in 1995. He kicked his last ever goal ten years later playing against Fremantle, ironically for the Bulldogs. In-between he was a popular ruckman/forward who played 150 AFL games, 105 of which were for Fremantle. *Docker* caught up with the 35-year-old.



Where are you living nowadays?

I'm living down at Dawesville, close to the beach and the estuary, living the water life with my family. What are you doing for a living out there?

I'm actually in the real estate caper for a company called Port Bouvard Real Estate. It's a very interesting job at the moment because it's quite a tough market.

How did you get into that?

When I was living in Melbourne I did a course over there. I've always had a bit of a passion for it and decided that I'd get into it once I was established in a community. I've been here for a few years now and been involved in a lot of community based stuff with my children.

Tell us about your family?

I've been married to my lovely wife Alice for eight years now. I've got a beautiful 7-year-old boy, Jesse, and my daughter Indiana is four. Jesse's in year 2 at the local Dawesville Catholic Primary School and Indiana's at kindy. We are expecting one in the next two or three days, too, which will be born by the time this goes to print. We don't know the gender yet.*

What did you do right after retiring from AFL in 2005?

When I retired I took a bit of time off and moved back to Perth. I was living in Melbourne because I'd had a stint with the Western Bulldogs. I got a job at the Fremantle Football Club and I worked there for a year as an account manager in the corporate scene. I'd always been involved in football, so I thought it was time to do something different. I ended up getting a job as a sales marketing manager at The Cut Golf Course in Mandurah. Golf's always been a side passion for me.

Did you continue playing footy after you retired from AFL?

Yeah I played a couple of years for Claremont in the WAFL. I had a couple of good, fun years there with some ex-teammates. I played in the grand final but missed out unfortunately. I then took a year off and played at South Bunbury in the South West League. I hadn't played for two years and I decided to put the boots on again this year at the age of 35 with South Mandurah in the Peel League. Most of the players are about 15 years younger, which is quite scary. But I'm just enjoying the old football scenario, hanging out with the lads. Training isn't really a priority for someone in my age bracket.

What is your best memory from your time at Fremantle?

I suppose there are two that stand out. I remember the first training session, but the memory that really stands out was our first Derby win. I was a part of the first team that beat West Coast, which was pretty special. They'd had the wood on us for quite a few years and we had a great win and we celebrated at the Left Bank afterwards. We didn't have too much finals footy action in my time there, so things like that seemed to stick out more than others.

Do you still catch up with any former teammates?

Yeah I catch up with a few of the boys every now and again. I see Jason Norrish, Jess Sinclair, Luke Toia and Tony Modra, who I speak to quite regularly. Obviously, once you get a family, it makes it hard to keep up with everyone, but with Facebook and Twitter these days it's easier to keep in contact.

Do you still support the Freo Dockers today?

Absolutely. They're my number one team. Freo gave me an opportunity and I'm definitely purple through and through.

Who is your favourite current Freo Docker?

Nat Fyfe. He has terrific attributes. He's very skilful. I love the way he takes the football in the air and he racks up possessions. He's got a good 10-year-plus career ahead of him at the footy club.

New stadium to rival Etihad

HEN the new Perth
Stadium is completed
in 2018, Fremantle
Dockers' members
will be able to watch their team at
a 60,000 seat venue in the style of
Melbourne's Etihad Stadium, with
similar views, amenities and comfort.

The capacity range will more than adequately provide for members, corporate seating, general admission and visiting team supporters.

On Tuesday 28 June, Premier Colin Barnett announced that WA's new multipurpose \$700 million stadium would be built on the Burswood Peninsula.

"Burswood Peninsula is unconstrained by surrounding development and Governmentowned, which will allow us to achieve the vision of a world-class stadium precinct," the Premier said.

STATE-OF-THE-ART

"The new stadium will be the centrepiece of an emerging eastside precinct at the gateway to Perth and is within walking distance of a range of potential transport options including footbridges, ferries, and trains.

"The new Perth Stadium will deliver a high quality, state-of-the-art facility all West Australians can be proud of."

The final cost will be determined after a design process has been completed. However, the current indicative cost for the stadium is approximately \$700 million, excluding costs associated with upgrades to transport infrastructure.

Sport and Recreation Minister Terry Waldron said a steering committee would be established to oversee the project.

"The committee's first task will be to create a master plan for the stadium precinct, including a decision on the exact location and a detailed costing of the project," he said.

"It will look at details such as possible retractable seating, adequate amenities, the style and size of seats and the allocation of seats to members, corporate, public and supporters of visiting teams." Having a ball: Premier Colin Barnett and skipper Matthew Pavlich on the site of the new Perth Stadium.

AFL commission chairman Mike Fitzpatrick said the stadium would provide a tremendous boost for AFL in WA and deliver millions of dollars in revenue for the State.

"The new stadium at Burswood will be a world-class facility, provide worldclass amenities and be an unparalleled experience for fans."

Fitzpatrick said the stadium would allow the Fremantle Dockers and West Coast to grow their member base. Fremantle Chief Executive Officer Steve Rosich said that as part of the transition to the new stadium, the club would provide its loyal members with priority access to the stadium once it was completed.

"We look forward to working with the Government and the steering committee to help deliver a stadium that will not only be a great asset for the State but also for our football club and our highly valued members," Rosich said.\$\dpsi\$ © THE WEST AUSTRALIAN. Photo: Ian Munro

HAYLEY'S STORY

WHEN MY DAUGHTER Sinead was born in August 2009, she seemed perfect, we were delighted. But then our lives changed...

At about 11 weeks, I thought Sinead's forehead looked a bit blue. I asked a specialist about Sinead who said it felt like a buildup of pressure. An ultrasound was organised immediately.

The result totally changed my life: there was a tumour in Sinead's head. She needed surgery without delay. She was only 12 weeks old.

We were told we would lose her

We were told that the tumour was growing so fast that if they did



not operate she would not last more than a couple of days. It was an extremely rare brain tumour, with very low survival rates. A second round of surgery was required. As we sat at the bed, beside our sleeping daughter, one of the nurses told us that we should get ready to lose our baby. 'It's just a question of time,' she said.

Redkite was there, right from the start

I'll never forget the day Redkite's Red Bag was delivered, full of items that were just so useful in hospital. Even a notebook. I filled every page of that notebook with details of Sinead's treatment, the medication she was on and the steps we were going through, because you can't remember everything.

MAYNEY SPREADS THE AUSKICK MESSAGE

THE 2011 AUSKICK SEASON officially kicked off for WA in May when more than 24,000 children around the state began attending their local Auskick centres.

Among the 360 registered WA Auskick centres, the Australian Islamic College joined the Auskick program for the first time.

On Thursday 26 May, Fremantle Dockers forward Chris Mayne, visited the College in Kewdale.

"It's great to see Auskick reach out to boys and girls of all cultural backgrounds," Mayne said.

"Auskick was a great introduction to the game for me and I hope it will be the same for these students. I loved playing Auskick footy as a kid and it's fantastic to see these students getting involved and loving it too," he said.

The pain in our baby's head... she just cried and cried

Our baby spent so much time in my arms because every time we put her down she cried uncontrollably - the pain in her head and the pressure of the tumour against the brain was just too much to bear.

After the surgery, there was

chemotherapy, twelve months of it. During 2010, I spent almost my whole life in the hospital. Life outside was just a blur.

Redkite was there for us when we were at our lowest

One of the best supports for me was my social worker. As a trained professional, she understood the support needed and how hard it is when you think your baby is dying. I think it is great that Redkite funds social workers to support other families going through what we have.

The Redkite Music Therapist often

helped distract my youngest boy Rowan with music when his baby sister was having her traumatic dressing changes or procedures, this was such a big help for me. And as for the Redkite Christmas hampers, they were just wonderful.

We always had hope

We prayed constantly. And if you were able to see our bubbling 20-month-old little girl now, you'd see that our prayers were answered.

A visibly moved Lower said it puts life and footy in perspective when he hears the stories of these young people.

"It's fantastic to see smiles on their faces and if we can make them happy just for one day, it's job done for us," he said.

Acting-Executive Director of Fremantle Hospital Dr David Blythe read this quote from American writer Mary Anne Radmacher to all in attendance:

"Courage doesn't always roar. Sometimes courage is the quiet voice at the end of the day saying, 'I will try again tomorrow."

"Reading the stories of what these children have been through, I think every one of them will say 'tomorrow I'll try again'," Dr Blythe said of the 12 young recipients looking on.

In his speech, Fremantle President Steve Harris paid tribute to the families and carers of the 12 young award recipients.

"As adults, few things impact us more than seeing young people suffering," Harris said.

"I'm a parent myself and I know what it's like to have kids in hospital. It is traumatic and hard and it's pretty special for you all to be here today."

After all the youngsters had received their medallion and gift pack from senior player Luke McPharlin, HBF Managing Director Rob Bransby addressed the guests.

"I'm honoured to be in the room," he said.

"I sat at home last night and read the stories of these 12 brave



individuals. I looked around to my 10-year-old daughter and my wife and I thought 'gee, we take a lot of this for granted'."

Bransby said it made him proud to be associated with HBF, a not-for-profit organisation.

"It's all about community. We exist for the community. It's all about giving back and, at the end of the day, all that really matters is your health."

Bransby then announced that HBF had a very special surprise for the 12 award winners – they were all getting an X-Box 360 and a game to take home.


Watching the sheer joy and surprise on the youngsters' faces warmed the hearts of everyone in the room.





