ATT DE BOER missed the first two opportunities in his career to play in a Starlight Purple Haze Game, and the 21-year-old Freo Docker was well aware of that heading into his third AFL season in 2011.

After missing round 1 in Brisbane with a hamstring injury, it looked like de Boer was set to sit out again as Freo prepared to face Geelong at Patersons Stadium in round 2, 2011.

Thankfully for de Boer, he recovered and took his place in the Starlight Purple Haze Game for the first time.

"I was lucky enough to wear my first Starlight Purple Haze jumper, which is a big deal to me," he said.

"That was a real honour."

REWARDING

Playing held a little bit of extra significance for de Boer, not just because it was an AFL game.

He was the newest Starlight
Purple Haze Ambassador, a role he
took great pride in performing in the
weeks leading up to the game as he
joined teammates Aaron Sandilands,
Chris Mayne, Garrick Ibbotson and
Byron Schammer to visit Princess
Margaret Hospital and help conduct
various other fund-raising events.

De Boer said it was incredibly rewarding just to see the smile on a child's face.

"They see us walk in with the purple shirts on and they think we're superheroes," he said.

"We're not of course, we're just there to have a good time with them and they give a lot back to us, too."

De Boer said he would definitely be putting his body on the line for the children if he plays in the 2012 Starlight Purple Haze Game.

"The kids are going to be down there with us, and you know they get such enjoyment out of that and you just want to get up for them," he said.

"It's a great day all round."

Alex Silvagni's first Starlight Purple Haze Game in round 1, 2010 was

also very special to him - it was his AFL debut.

He admits, however, that he found it difficult to take in the whole Starlight Purple Haze occasion.

"It was my first game and that's what I was focusing on, so it was tough to see what else was going on with the game," he said.

But Silvagni was injured in 2011, so he joined his non-playing teammates around the Patersons Stadium precinct to rattle tins and himself managed to collect almost \$500 for Starlight.

"It had an impact," he said.

"I actually thought about it and was able put things into perspective and realise what a worthwhile cause it is."

INFLUENCE

Silvagni is now a Starlight Purple Haze Ambassador in 2012, replacing the retired Schammer.

He's already been touched by the significance of not just the game itself, but the duty that comes with being a Starlight Purple Haze Ambassador.

"You see the impact that your visit can have on the kids," he said.

"You want to have an influence and show them that there's a light at the end of the tunnel.

"That's important for me personally, to give back to the kids that are less fortunate than me."

Both de Boer and Silvagni had a message to all the fans out there.

"It's important to dig deep and find us much money as you can," Silvagni said.

"There might be kids in their hospital beds not able to attend, so dig deep and give to a great cause."

"It'll be our first game for 2012 and I just can't wait to see all the fans out in force helping create the Purple Haze," de Boer said.\$



A BIG ACHIEVEMENT

THE STARLIGHT PURPLE HAZE GAME and Aaron Sandilands have a lot in common – they both debuted in 2003 and have become bigger and better every year since.

The champion ruckman doesn't remember too much about the first Purple Haze game, against Richmond in round 18, other than it was a long time ago.

But he does recall how much purple there was in the crowd.

"I remember running out and seeing the Purple Haze. The fans and supporters got right behind the game," he says.

Sandilands is in a good position to talk about how much bigger the game has become since 2003.

"It has grown year by year and the amount of money that's been raised has shown that," he says.

"It's great that all our members and supporters get behind the day."

The three-time All-Australian says he'd always hoped back in 2003 that the Starlight Purple Haze Game would grow and become an annual event on Freo's calendar.

"When you know that it helps out so many kids, it really makes it all worthwhile," he says.

Sandilands is now in his sixth year as a Starlight Purple Haze Ambassador, a role he cherishes greatly.

"When you go to Princess Margaret Hospital and you spend time with some kids that are really struggling, it means a lot to know that you can put a smile on their face," he says.

"It just puts life into perspective a bit."

Sandilands says it's important for all Freo fans to keep supporting the Starlight Purple Haze Game.

"In round 1 we'll be playing the defending AFL Premiers, Geelong, under lights at Patersons Stadium on a Saturday night," he says.

"We'll run out and see a swarm of purple in the crowd, which gives us a little reminder of the importance of the day.

"Hopefully, we can get a win and raise a lot of money for the Starlight Children's Foundation."

FREO INTOTHE FUTURE

Michael Barlow and a select group of his teammates, earmarked as the next leaders of the club, travelled to Melbourne recently for an experience of a lifetime. They learnt many things, but the most important lesson was that leadership doesn't happen overnight. Story: Costa Kastanis



HE FREMANTLE Dockers
know that if they are to
compete with the AFL's elite
teams, they must enhance
their on-field leaders to take the club
into the future.

So when Roderick Brown, chairman of engineering company RCR Tomlinson, approached the club in early 2011 about establishing a scholarship in the memory of the late Jeff Hogan, who passed away in December 2010, the Emerging Leaders Experience was created.

Hogan, a former director of RCR Tomlinson, was an ardent and passionate supporter of the club.

He developed relationships with young Fremantle Dockers players and was often regarded as a mentor to many of them.

DEVELOPMENT

While Fremantle possesses a strong, experienced core leadership group in players such as Matthew Pavlich, Aaron Sandilands, Luke McPharlin and David Mundy, the club has drafted 37 first year players in the past four drafts.

It's this next phase of players that the club has targeted for leadership development.

So Alex Silvagni, Hayden Ballantyne, Michael Barlow, Greg Broughton, Nathan Fyfe, Stephen Hill, Nick Suban and Anthony Morabito were chosen to attend the inaugural RCR Tomlinson Jeff Hogan Emerging Leaders Experience in Melbourne from 17 to 19 November, 2011.

It could be because of the long struggle he fought to make it into the AFL, or his subsequent battle to return from a broken leg, but Barlow already possesses strong mental toughness and leadership qualities.

But he acknowledged how much he still has to learn and the value of the Emerging Leaders Experience.

"You can't just get up out of bed one morning and say 'I want to be a captain or in the leadership group'," he said.

"It culminates over days, months and years and anything the club can do to fast track this is going to benefit the Fremantle Dockers in the future."

HISTORY

The players took part in a series of activities aimed at enhancing their leadership skills and abilities.

One that stood out for Barlow was a

tour of the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

"Most of us had played there before but we had not seen what goes on behind the scenes," he said.

"Most of the boys are West Australians and didn't understand the heritage of the MCG and the esteem that Grand Final day is held in.

"I think walking around the ground and seeing all the work that goes on to preserve its history and recognise the feats of heroes from days gone by really struck a chord with all of us."

Another highlight was meeting three-time NBA champion and Australian Olympian Luc Longley.

"I could listen to his stories about his era all day," Barlow said. "He's an Aussie icon. What he did in the NBA doesn't happen every day for Australians.

"He spoke about all the different personalities and leaders he encountered during his time at the Chicago Bulls."

LEGENDARY

One story Barlow found particularly interesting was about Longley's former teammate – the legendary Michael Jordan.

"While Jordan was probably the greatest of all time, Luc told us how even he had to be challenged by his teammates when it needed to be done," Barlow said.

"There were situations when even Michael Jordan had to be pulled into line. These are things you don't see on YouTube highlight videos.

"The fact he was the best player in that team and the world didn't make him the most important or the best leader."

MENTAL TOUGHNESS

The Freo boys also met Longley's fellow Aussie basketball star, Andrew Gaze, and the captain of Geelong's 2007 and 2009 Premiership teams, Tom Harley.

Barlow was inspired by the former Cat's story, which he probably felt parallels with.

"Tom acknowledged that he was never the most talented footballer," Barlow said. "Some guys can get by because of their 60m kick or their speed.

"Tom Harley didn't have any of those. He had to draw on all of the skills he had, of which he said 80 per cent existed between his ears.

"The mental toughness he displayed in being able to become the captain of a great club was a credit to him and an inspiration for the rest of us."

AURA

That great club has set a benchmark of sustained success that Barlow said Fremantle aimed to attain. "I remember playing against Geelong in my first year," he said. "It was a massive eye-opener.

"The respect you have for those kind of players that have been doing it day-in-day-out for a sustained period of time is substantial.

"The way they handle themselves and carry themselves, not just on the field but off it as well, is tremendous. They can be intimidating figures because of the aura they've created for themselves.

"That's the aura we're trying to create at our club."

Barlow said every player that went to Melbourne benefitted greatly from the experience.

"It felt like we got better every day that we were there," he said.

"It took a little bit to get the ball rolling, but all the personalities in this group respond well to that sort of environment. We bonded, became more proactive and flourished as time went by."

TRIGGER

The former VFL star now said he and his teammates couldn't wait to begin



expressing themselves on and off the field, no matter what the situation.

"We've talked about how it's all good to be that leading influence when you're winning, but there will be times when things don't go your way," he said. "We've talked about finding that trigger that promotes good behaviours when this is the case. That goes for on the field or off the field.

"And we've spoken about how we can encourage those around us to follow our example." \updownarrow

TOGETHER

A journey that began years ago in an isolated small town has forged a friendship that the Fremantle Dockers have only made stronger. Story: Costa Kastanis

ACHIE NEALE AND Alex Forster have been friends for so long, they can't even remember when and where they first met.

The pair look at each other and try to deduce how long they've been mates.

"I think it's been about eight years," Neale says to Forster, who nods and says: "Yeah, probably eight or nine years."

The pair have a tendency to finish or add to each other's sentences.

Both were born in a small town called Naracoorte, about three-and-a-half-hours drive from Adelaide.

"It's a nice little place of about 10,000 people," Forster says. "I spent the first 14 years of my life there and have some really good memories of the place."

Neale lived on a farm, just a bit out of town, until he was also 14.

It was in tiny Kybybolite, affectionately known as 'Kybee', where their football journey together began.

A small settlement just 20km from Naracoorte with a population of about 500 people, 'Kybee' is your typical outback Australian town.

It has some farms, a few houses, a post office and a footy oval where the cars tooting their horns after every goal can sometimes outnumber the spectators on the banks.

Neale says if he had to paint a picture of the place, it wouldn't be very big.

SUCCESS

Neale started playing for Kybybolite Football Club when he was 10, and Forster, whose father was coaching the A-Grade at the time, a year later.

But it wasn't until the under 14s that the pair ended up in the same team, and success soon followed. In 2004 and 2005, Neale and Forster enjoyed premierships together in a 'Kybee' team that was captained by Naracoorte boy and current Melbourne skipper Jack Trengove.

"There was actually four on the trot and we played in a couple of them," Forster says.

"It was a pretty handy side."

"Yeah, I was forward pocket and Alex back pocket, so we didn't get much of a go," Neale adds.

There must be something in the water in 'Kybee' considering three players from one junior team made it to the top level of the game. Another of Freo's 2011 draftees, Cam Sutcliffe, is also from Naracoorte.

DRAFT DAY

Following the 'Kybee' years, Neale and Forster moved to Adelaide where both wound up as members of South Australia's State under 18s side in 2011. Forster gained All Australian selection for his efforts off half-back.

The night before the 2011 National Draft, Neale and Forster joked about ending up at the same club.

"We didn't think it would actually happen," Forster says.

On draft day, the pair hung out,

playing FIFA soccer on Play Station 3 until about an hour before the first player's name was called out at the Sydney Olympic Park Sports Centre. They abandoned the button bashing and parted ways to join their families and friends back home, with eyes glued to their television sets. Neale was surprised when he heard Sam Kerridge's name called out by the Adelaide Crows at pick 27.

"I thought the Crows were definitely going to take Alex at 27 and then that didn't happen," he says.

"I knew he was going to go soon after that.

"So when Freo called his name out at 29, all my family, because we know his family pretty well, just jumped up and were pretty excited for him."

But after the commotion died down, Neale refocused his attention to the TV in angst.

Twenty-eight picks passed by and still nothing.

"I thought I might have been in a bit of strife," Neale says.

With pick 58, the Fremantle Dockers selected Neale and, in doing so, ensured his journey would continue on the same path as his best mate's.

"We knew Freo were interested in both of us," Forster says.

"We'd had interviews with them and, when I was selected by Freo, there was all the celebrations, but then I settled down to see where Lach was going to go.

"I remember when his name got called out there was about 30 people in my house watching and everyone just





went nuts. Everyone was just screaming for about 10 minutes straight.

"It was intense and it didn't sink in for a fair while."

Forster tried to call his old teammate who was now his new teammate, but couldn't get through.

"I was pretty excited and my family was going nuts and quickly realised that Alex and I were at the same club, so my phone was going pretty nuts," Neale says.

Forster eventually got through.

"We spoke for about five minutes, pretty much yelling and crying. It was awesome," he says.

That wasn't the only call the boys took that night.

"We got a phone call from Matthew Pavlich," Forster says.

"That was just freaky, picking up the

phone and hearing 'G'day it's Matthew Pavlich here'.

"That helped it sink in a little bit and then you're getting texts from David Mundy and Nick Lower. It was an amazing experience."

INSPIRATION

Neale and Forster both regarded fellow South Australian Pavlich as an inspiration growing up.

"I think South Australians still reckon he is theirs," Forster says.

"'Pav' is seen as one of the game's greats. He's been in Perth for 13 years now and he's been one of the best players to play the game."

Upon arriving at Fremantle headquarters, the star struck youngsters couldn't help but be in awe of their new workplace. "You walk in and you see these stars - 'Pav', Aaron Sandilands, David Mundy," Neale says.

"And just how big the organisation is," Forster adds.

"It's not just the blokes on the playing list. There are people everywhere and it shows you just how much work goes into an AFL club."

HUMBLE

Neale and Forster are intensely competitive against each other.

"Every single thing we do we try and beat each other," Forster says.

Whether it's basketball as youngsters, in which Forster made the State team, table tennis, or FIFA on the PS3, neither likes to lose to the other.

Neale admits Forster has him beat at hoops, while FIFA is split down the middle.

"But I beat him in table tennis, so that's all that matters," Neale says with a cheeky smile.

> When it comes to the sport that matters – Aussie Rules – both boys are surprisingly humble, giving the other credit.

"It's really hard to say, probably Fors," Neale says.

"I reckon I took a little longer to find my feet. I didn't quite play as good footy as Lach," Forster replies.

"I reckon he's been pretty solid all the way through."

CONSISTENT

While they've played juniors,

State, been drafted and now live together, Neale and Forster have also been allocated to the same WAFL club – Swan Districts.

Both would rather be playing in a purple jumper come the weekends, however.

"I just want to play some consistent footy, wherever that may be," Neale says.

"If that's at Swans then I'll try and crack into the Freo side and hopefully I can debut this year."

If, and when, these two young South Australians play in the same team for the Fremantle Dockers, it will add to an amazing journey together that began... well, they don't remember when it began.

All that matters is they're still in it together. $\ensuremath{\updownarrow}$



2012 Fixture Highlights

over Australia will be firmly focused on the Friday night footy stage in round 4 when Fremantle faces up to St Kilda, the team Ross Lyon led into three Grand Finals. This promises to be an intense contest at Etihad Stadium, a venue Fremantle struggled at in 2011. But Lyon built an ominous record at the ground when in charge of the Saints and he will be looking to pass on all his knowledge of the ground to his new troops. St Kilda possesses a classy, experienced midfield unit which should throw up some great matchups in the engine room as Michael Barlow, David Mundy and Nat Fyfe could potentially lock horns with Nick Dal Santo, Leigh Montagna and Lenny Hayes. Up front, Nick Riewoldt is still the man for the Saints, although Freo warhorse Luke McPharlin will be looking to keep him goalless for a third straight match.

There's no jumping off the blockbuster bandwagon, with Carlton next on the menu at Patersons Stadium for the Len Hall Tribute match in round 5. The Blues have improved steadily over the past couple of years, to the point where last year the club was knocking on the door of the top four. Chris Judd and his Carlton teammates will present Fremantle with yet another tough challenge in front of the parochial Patersons Stadium crowd.

Round 6 will see Fremantle travel to play Gold Coast at Metricon Stadium for the first time. while the arduous journey to the Apple Isle is back on the menu in round 8 when the club faces a powerful Hawthorn unit at Aurora Stadium. After falling agonisingly short of making the Grand Final in 2011, the Hawks are considered a major threat to take home the Premiership Cup this season, so it promises to be a major test in how far Fremantle have come.

DERBY

Round 9 presents Fremantle with the opportunity to regain local bragging rights when it faces off against West Coast in the Carlton Mid Derby. There's



no doubt the port club has been waiting for the chance at retribution ever since Hayden Ballantyne's after-the-siren set shot for goal sailed into the post in round 18 last year, leaving Freo with a demoralising one-point loss. This one's an away game for Freo, however, with a home derby set for round 19.

MECCA

In what will be one of the club's most testing encounters of the year, Fremantle step up to face 2011 runners-up Collingwood at the MCG in round 14. The Pies are tough to beat anywhere, but defeating them at the Mecca of football will take a giant team effort from all 22 players that pull on the Freo jumper that afternoon. The Pies run as deep as any side in the competition, with reigning Brownlow Medallist Dane Swan and Scott Pendlebury leading the charge. Favourite son Nathan Buckley is the new coach, taking the reins from Mick Malthouse. Ross Lyon knows the Pies well, having coached the Saints to a Grand Final draw and replay, which Collingwood won, in 2010.

Another historic fixture beckons in round 17 when the AFL's newest team, Greater Western Sydney and former Freo Docker Rhys Palmer, coached by VFL/AFL legend Kevin Sheedy, travel to Perth to face Freo at Patersons Stadium.

After having to travel east for the final fixture in 2011, Fremantle is back in Perth against Melbourne at Patersons Stadium to round up the 2012 home and away season. Should the club qualify for the Finals Series, it will no doubt be a huge bonus having this match staged in the West.

POTENTIAL FREO MILESTONES IN 2012...

After a season of personal milestones in 2011, **Matthew Pavlich** is set to break more records in 2012 – this time on a West Australian football scale.

The skipper has played 256 AFL games heading into this season, leaving him just 21 appearances away from breaking West Coast Eagles' legend Glen Jakovich's long-standing mark of 276 for most AFL games played at a West Australian club.

Pavlich currently sits in fourth position, behind Eagles' Guy McKenna (267) and Drew Banfield (265).

If he plays every game, he is scheduled to pass Jakovich in round 22 against North Melbourne at Etihad Stadium.

The Freo captain has another goal in sight – 26 of them to be exact.

He has kicked 489 career goals, leaving him just 11 shy of 500 and 25 short of the WA record of 514 AFL majors his current assistant coach, Peter Sumich, kicked during his esteemed career at West Coast.

A likely move back into attack this season means Pavlich has both these marks well within his sights in 2012.

If that wasn't enough for Freo's milestone man, if he tops Freo's goal kicking this season he will have done so for an eighth occasion – moving ahead of Sumich's seven at West Coast.

Other possible milestones of note at Fremantle in 2012 include club legend **Luke McPharlin**'s 200th AFL game.

'Woosh', as he has been affectionately known for most of his 188-game career, could play his milestone match in round 13 against Essendon at Patersons Stadium, if he appears in every match until then.

David Mundy is close to playing his 150th and achieving Life Membership status at Fremantle.

He needs just eight appearances to join the likes of Shane Parker, Shaun McManus, Matthew Pavlich, Aaron Sandilands, Luke McPharlin and Antoni Grover.

If the 26-year-old plays every game, he'll join that group of players as a Freo Life Member in round 8 against Hawthorn at Aurora Stadium.



What do you consider to be the biggest challenge the players will face in your first season as Freo coach?

The AFL itself is a big challenge. Every week you have a tough challenge, facing elite teams with the challenges of form, injury and travel. At the end of the day, to be a top flight team you have to be able to play anywhere at any time, adapt and try to get the job done. What about you personally, from a coaching perspective. What's your

Coming into a new environment of 46 players and trying to understand everyone's strengths and weaknesses and personalities, how they learn and how they handle feedback. At all times you try and make decisions in what's best for the group, but at the same time, trying to balance up the human side.

biggest challenge?

How are you approaching facing the reigning Premiers first up? Are you

looking at it as an opportunity to measure where the team is at compared to the best?

That's obvious. We're going to find out pretty quick. But you have to be cautionary. It's a 22 game season and that's one game. Our season's not going to ride on one game. It's about doing the work over 22 weeks and accumulating enough wins to play finals. Certainly it's going to be a big challenge but it's one we're prepared for and have been for four months. At this stage things are not perfect, but they are going to plan. Fitness-wise, personnel availability and game plan-wise, we'll see what we're made of.

Fremantle has a tough block of games to start the season. How crucial is it to get the wins on the board early?

I remember when I was at Fitzroy, one of the great coaches, and someone who had a big influence on me, David Parkin, always spoke about getting on the board early and trying to win the first one. He said it gives you a bit of momentum and builds some confidence through actions. That's always sat with me. I can remember his talk and his passion, he coached premiership teams. It is good to get off the mark with four points.

What on-field values do you hold the dearest that

you'll be expecting your players to abide by?

There are some common threads and some non-negotiables to being a really good AFL team. That's to be hard at the ball and work exceptionally hard when you haven't got it, and do your bit for the team. If you work for your teammates and with your teammates, bring great effort, execute your role and be hard at the ball, they'll stand you in good stead.

You obviously rated Stephen Hill highly enough to send your best tagger to him in the past. Where does Stephen have to improve to be able to shake the best taggers?

I think he's done it pretty well in the past, to be honest. He's a young player who's worked really hard and, what he's done this summer, he's only going to get better. He's had a super pre-season, he's in our elite runners, he's elite in the gym and he understands what we're asking him to do game day. He's a big part of our future and I'm really optimistic Stephen will have his best year.

You've already said Lachie Neale has impressed you. Are any of the other draftees travelling nicely at the moment that could push for a senior berth this season?

I think Tom Sheridan is going quite well. Lee Spurr

is a mature-age rookie who is going really well. Hayden Crozier's football has been going well but he's quite light, so there'll be a consideration to look after him a little bit. Sam Menegola and Haiden Schloithe are all showing a bit. Alex Forster and Jordan Wilson-King have been injured and Cam

Sutcliffe was having a super summer before he was injured. The two obvious ones are Sheridan and Spurr. Two areas of the game the club struggled at in 2011 were kicking goals and contested ball. What have Peter Sumich and Mark Stone brought to the table for Fremantle in those departments?

They've brought plenty of experience and they're from successful systems. We've got good stoppage principles that Mark and I have worked together on that the players seem to have been embracing and are really enthusiastic about. We want to harness the strengths of Aaron Sandilands and Jon Griffin and win the ball at ground level. Peter Sumich has been focusing on some forward leading patterns and on our forwards working hard defensively. It's been nice that they complement what was already in existence in the coaching department here. I think it's a really strong coaching panel. They aren't

"'yes men' and they're really strong in putting an opinion forward. They've helped me grow as well.

What excites you the most heading into your first season as senior coach of this club?

The unknown. We've been preparing very well. We're a young group - there are 30 first to third year players in our squad. We're in for the duration here. We're not flicking a switch. We're building and we're about growth. That's what

excites me - continuing to see growth and developing some great players of the competition.

Finally, how will you measure success in 2012?

Quite simply we need to improve. As I've alluded to, the contested ball, scoring and defence are key areas. There are some measurements there that we've got. We want to be able to play with great effort so, whether we're winning or losing, I just want to see a never-give-up attitude. \$\psi\$

New recruit Lachie Neale grew up in a small country town and understands the impact a special visitor can make to a small community.

Crute said it was vital that the AFL clubs continued to support the Community Camp initiative.


"For many children in regional and remote areas of Australia, it may be the only chance they'll get to meet an AFL player, which potentially creates a lifetime memory," he said.

The comparisons were inevitable. Both are Indigenous footballers who play in the backline and landed on the Fremantle Dockers' rookie list. One wore the number 43 jumper for 128 games, and the other dreams of the day he can play his first in it. Story: Costa Kastanis

REMANTLE development coach Roger Hayden admits that newly drafted Jordan Wilson-King, who he has taken under his wing, reminds him of himself when he arrived at Freo back in 2001.

"I was also a fairly quiet and skinny young man," says Hayden, who left the game a fair bit more talkative than when he started.

Wilson-King is ahead of him in that department already.

"Jordan's a bit more outgoing in that he will ask a question," Hayden says.

"You learn a lot quicker when you do that.

"He just needs to keep asking questions. That will be something really positive for him in the future."

Wilson-King grew up in Darwin with his mother Annette Wilson, who works as a lawyer.

He has a 23-year-old sister, Kristen King, who lives in Darwin, and a 20-year-old brother, Shaun King, who has just moved to Melbourne. His father Reginald King, lives in Sydney, where he works as a boxing coach.

LEGEND

After playing for the Darwin Buffaloes in the NTFL, Wilson-King made the move to SA at the age of 16 to board at Rostrevor, an all boys' Catholic College in the foothills of the Mount Lofty Ranges. It's here that he says he had some of the best times of his life.

"Once the footy season starts there, it's the best place to be at," he says.

"I loved playing every minute of college footy. Those are memories I'll cherish forever."

He also played for SANFL club North Adelaide, but when Fremantle called out his name at the 2012 AFL Rookie Draft last December, Wilson-King packed his bags again and moved to Perth.

That didn't present any issues for him. "I had three years living in Adelaide on my own so moving over here wasn't a problem," he says.



"And the weather's pretty much like Darwin in Perth at the moment anyway."

SHOCK

What Wilson-King wasn't used to is the demands placed upon an athlete at an elite sporting organisation.

He has never had a pre-season because the football season in Darwin begins in October and ends when the South Australian one begins.

That meant that he played the game competitively all year round.

His mentor, Hayden, is charged with helping Wilson-King adapt to this new life.

"It can be a real shock to the system," Hayden says.

"Jordan is only used to football based match fitness.

"He's not used to the 1km and 3km time trials and the rigours of an AFL pre-season."

"That was similar to me when I arrived at the club. I wasn't used to the whole structure of a pre-season at AFL level and I think the quicker you get used to that, the quicker you get your head around it and the better off you're going to be."

Both Hayden and Wilson-King admit to not knowing much about each other before Freo brought them together.

"I hadn't seen him play," Hayden says.

"The club told me they'd be picking some young kid from Darwin who was pretty quick off half-back and that I was going to be looking after him."

All Wilson-King knew of Hayden was that he was a skilful player. Now that he's had a chance to browse over the history of the club, he's flattered to have such a well respected individual pass on knowledge to him.

"Roger's mentored me the past few months and he's been a great help," Wilson-King says.

"To get the knowledge from his 128 games is the best thing for me."

EXPERTISE

Wilson-King describes himself as an attacking defender who loves carrying the football and kicking it, but it's the defensive side of his game that he feels Hayden's expertise will rub off on him the most.

"It's the biggest area he can help me in considering he was an AFL defender for 10 years," Wilson-King says.

Hayden says defensive skills are the most important if any attacking defender wants to succeed.

AJUMPER

"Jordan's attacking flare and his skills are really good, and I don't want to take away from that, but he has to improve on his defensive skills to make him an all-round player off half-back who can create for the team, but also do what's necessary going the other way."

Wilson-King wants to exhaust all the knowledge of his mentor's experiences as a rookie-listed player.

"It's good to have someone who knows what it's like to be on the rookie list and knows just how hard you have to work to make your way onto the senior list," Wilson-King says.

"He's told me to remain positive and always keep my head up. Don't think because you're a rookie you're not as good a chance as every other bloke."

If Wilson-King wasn't going to get compared to Hayden for his heritage

and his path into the AFL, taking the 43 jumper that his mentor made famous ensured he would.

"It was an honour to get the jumper that someone's played over 100 games in," Wilson-King says.

"I just want to keep it going."

APPRENTICE

Hayden was happy to hand over his old number to a worthy recipient.

"I thought it was really nice to have someone like Jordan take it and hopefully he can represent the jumper and the club well."

While the apprentice appreciates all the comparisons to his master, Wilson-King is desperate to make his own name in the game.

"I don't want people to just say I'm Roger all over, and 'he's exactly like Roger'," Wilson-King says. "Making my own name would not only make me feel good, but also make my family feel proud.

"That's what I want to do. Make my own name."

Hayden agrees, saying it's important for Wilson-King to be his own person.

"I don't want to make him into the next Roger Hayden, I want him to be the first Jordan Wilson-King," he says.

"The similarities end at number 43." \$\dpsi\$





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Where have they docked? TROY COOK

After starting his career at the Sydney Swans in 1997, Troy Cook moved to Fremantle in 2000 and became one of the most popular and well-respected players in the club's history. A Life Member at Freo, Cook was second-to-none for his hardness and attack on the ball.

Do you have any children and, if so are they old enough to be footy fans yet?

My eldest boy Xavier is three, and my girl, Lola, is two in April. They're not old enough to be footy fans yet. I'm trying to brainwash Xavier into becoming a Freo Dockers supporter, but that's an ongoing challenge.

What did you do after you retired in 2007?

I had a bit of a break. Stepping away from something I had done for a long time was hard to do. It was a bit of Troy time to be honest. I also started looking for employment after footy, so I started with the Wirrpanda Foundation in February, 2008. I've been at the foundation for a few years now. I had already done a bit of parttime work there while I was at Freo and David (Wirrpanda) was at the Eagles.



Did you continue to play footy after your AFL career was over?

My footy career started with the mighty Perth Demons and, the year after I retired from AFL, I signed up there again and spent the next two-and-a-half years there. They asked me to be captain of the side too, which was a great honour. Halfway through 2010 we didn't look like we were going to make finals and the passion wasn't there anymore, so I hung the boots up.

Do you still get recognised around town?

People still come up and say hello, which is good.

What do you miss most about playing AFL?

I miss the comradeship and the challenge of competing against the best players in the AFL, and the winning aspect of things. It's a routine you're in for a long time, which can be pretty addictive actually.

What's the sweetest memory from your time in the AFL?


My first game over at the Sydney Swans in 1997. For Freo it was playing in that 2006 preliminary final against Sydney where we got beaten by a few goals when we were hoping to make the Grand Final. That was the best and probably the worst day all in one. Becoming a life member of the Fremantle Dockers was incredible. That will always be special for me. I'll be a part of the club forever.

Do you still catch up with any ex-teammates?

I see few of the boys around the area. Haze (Paul Hasleby) I catch up with every now and again. I've caught up with Scham (Byron Schammer), Justin and Troy Longmuir, and a few of the other boys who live close to me. We often bump into each other at the shops. I worked with Dale Kickett, too.

Are you a Freo supporter today and what's your take on the current team?

I'm still very much a fan. Last year was a bit disappointing for a few reasons, most obviously with the injuries. But there are some positive signs. It's still early days and by the looks of it the boys are trying to get their heads around the game plan that Ross is trying to get them to play to. They've got some exciting young blokes coming through but there's also a great opportunity for some of the old blokes like Pav, Groves, Sandi and Luke McPharlin. They've got to make sure they make the most of it because their window is getting smaller and smaller. I think this year is going to be a big one for them.



Which players do you like to watch?

I've always been a big fan of Pav. Tendai Mzungu is another one. He's a Perth Demons boy and he caught my eye a few years ago when I went back to Perth after retiring from AFL. I always make sure to keep an eye on him.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

The kids take up most of my time. They're always a lot of fun. I try to play a bit of golf now and again and I love getting down to the beach. I'm trying to find a few sports that don't require physical contact anymore. The body can't handle it.\$\display\$


