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

THE NEW CLANCEE

At the end of the 2011 season, Clancee Pearce admits that he was at the crossroads of his career. Rather than accept his AFL journey was over, he cleaned out the cupboards and started again. Story: Costa Kastanis

HEN APPROACHED about doing this feature for *Docker*, Clancee Pearce's reaction was not that of a man who has become an integral and widely respected member

of an elite sporting club. "Who me?," he said with genuine surprise.

It seems that Pearce himself doesn't quite realise what all the fuss is about. The football world has.

He has been among Fremantle's best players on a regular basis in what has been a strong rise up the ranks for the 21-year-old this season.

The beginnings of the remarkable turnaround in a career that was at the crossroads can be traced back to an early October day in 2011.

Called into a meeting with his coaches, Pearce was left shattered by what he was told.

"They didn't really say I was delisted, they said I wasn't required," Pearce, who was officially delisted later that month when Fremantle had to submit its squad changes to the AFL, recalls.

OPPORTUNITY

However, he was offered the opportunity to train on with the squad by new senior coach Ross Lyon, with a possibility of being re-rookie listed in December.

Still suffering a bit of shock, Pearce went home, "chilled out" for a while, and spoke to his parents and his manager Jason Dover, who all told him to stay positive.

"I told them the situation, that I'd be delisted, but that they were going to give me a chance," he says.

"It's pretty hard to stay positive when something like that happens."

Pearce took a few hours of solitude

to think about his situation. His father, Des Pearce, came home from work to offer his support and some words of advice.

"Dad said 'you're not fully de-listed, they're going to give you a chance'," Pearce says.

Faced with a decision, Pearce asked himself: "Do I really want to be an elite sportsman?"

The answer was yes, but if he was serious about changing, he was going to do it properly.

The first step was to clear the cupboards.

Not just figuratively – he actually emptied all the food in his pantry he considered unhealthy.

"I went to the shops that afternoon, and I spent about \$400 on food that was more nutritious," he says.

TATTOO

Pearce then embarked on a rigorous cardio and weights training program.

"My days would be a run, come home and do half-an-hour on the bike, and then do weights," he says.

"It was really just a mindset – that I wanted to train. As soon as I got into it, it became an everyday thing."

Back in mid-October, when he knew being delisted was imminent, Pearce began to ink a new sleeve-tattoo of a tiger on his left arm.

He admits it could be seen as a symbolic reflection of the new Clancee.

"I just decided to get it," he says. "I like the tiger, it symbolises strength and courage."

Pearce, who was selected by Freo, again, with pick 75 in the 2012 Rookie Draft, says the changes in him have been all-encompassing.

"I think I've grown up since being delisted," he says.

"If you want to be an AFL footballer or an elite sportsman, you can't indulge as much as other people.

"I just try to lay low and let my football do the talking."

HUMILITY

If there's one part of Pearce that hasn't changed, it's his humility.

"I try not to let it sink in," he says.

"I just think about where I came from. I'm still a rookie player. I'm not the best player going around. I'm not Chris Judd.

"I'm just a hard working football player that's trying to do his bit for the team."

And, it's the team that he credits a lot of his improvements to.

"My teammates and coaches have been fantastic," Pearce says.

"They are the reason why I've been going so well."

As it turns out, the worst day of Pearce's football career, being delisted, provided the impetus to reignite his AFL dream.

"It's probably one of the best things that's ever happened to me," he says.

"My training over the break is what I've built on. I'm so happy that I did it."

Pearce now feels better qualified to offer advice to anyone who finds themselves in a place similar to where he was at.

"Don't let it get you down," he says.

"If they're going to give you a tiny little bit to keep your foot in the door, just give it all you've got.

"Even if it means not having a break during the off-season. When you're playing good football and the team is going well, it's all worth it in the end.

"I wouldn't change a thing."

The only thing that's changed is Clancee Pearce. $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{t}}$

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EVERYDAY HERO, OUR NUMBER ONE

In his speech on Doig Medal night 2011, senior coach Ross Lyon told his players it was what they did every day that either brought them closer to excellence, or further away from it. New Number One Ticket Holder, Corporal Ben Roberts-Smith lives every day of his life under a similar motto. When speaking to students at his former school, Hale, he said: "It's not the grand final you win, or the exam you pass, or receiving the Victoria Cross. ORPORAL BEN Roberts-Smith is used to fighting against the odds out on the battlefields while on duty in the elite Special Air Service (SAS) Regiment.

A Victoria Cross medal awarded in 2011 for his actions on 11 June, 2010 during a battle in the village of Tizak, in Afghanistan's Kandahar province, is the ultimate testament to that.

But that's not the only time Fremantle's Number One Ticket Holder has been outnumbered while serving his country abroad.

AFGHANISTAN

A Freo Dockers fan since day one, Cpl Roberts-Smith faces another battle – the footy banter with his fellow soldiers in Afghanistan.


"There isn't actually a lot of West Australians in the SAS," Cpl Roberts-Smith says.

"There's probably about three or four of us and they're not from my squadron, so when we're away on duty, I'm the lone supporter."

Growing up in Perth, Cpl Roberts-Smith chose to become a Freo supporter as soon as the club was founded back in 1994 because of his love of the port city.

"I used to spend a lot of time in Fremantle," he says.

"I'd come down with my mates and go to the park down by the water, kick the footy around and have some fish and chips.



"The fact it was a new club and something that was home grown for me, I was able to take that away with me.

"Being one of those people who takes loyalty pretty seriously, regardless of the ups and downs, I've stuck with them and followed the club over the past 17 years," he says.

CHERISHED

The game that sticks out as Cpl Roberts-Smith's favourite was in 2003, when Freo qualified for its first finals series and faced off against Essendon at Subiaco Oval.

"That was a big game for me," he says.

"It was a culminating point for the club to break into the finals. That was a pretty exciting time."

His most cherished memory is one that's still very fresh in his mind.

"It's today," he said on the day he visited the club back in March to meet his favourite Freo Docker, Matthew Pavlich, and accept the mantle as the club's Number One Ticket Holder.

"To be asked to be the Number One Ticket Holder is a pretty big privilege.

"This is something that I won't forget for a while."

Cpl Roberts-Smith will be busy fighting abroad for his country again in 2012. He takes his Freo beanie with him for the cold nights in the desert and wears it proudly when he gets the chance to watch a live Freo game, which are screened late at night in his time zone.

PURPLE HAZE

When he's back home in Perth, expect to see his

imposing figure at Patersons Stadium cheering his beloved Freo Dockers, not boisterously, because it's not his way, but definitely passionately.

"Every opportunity I've got when I'll be here, I'll be going to games," he says.

"This is another big year for me with work. I will be going away to serve overseas, so with that in mind, I will make as much time as possible to support the club.

"And not just on the field, the endeavours off the field, like Purple Haze and things like that." \updownarrow



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LEADINGTH

They are leaders of men. Varying in age and experience, they come together as one to set and live the values the club holds itself to. They are the Fremantle Dockers' leadership group.

Comprising Matthew Pavlich, Aaron Sandilands, Luke McPharlin, David Mundy, Matt de Boer and Hayden Ballantyne, these players have an important role to play both on and off the field. They are expected to be the best 'modellers' and defenders of the team's trademark and underpinning behaviours. *Docker* takes a closer look at each member of this proud group of leaders. MATTHEW PAVLICH – A LEADER AMONG LEADERS

A member of the club since 1999 and Fremantle's captain since 2007, Matthew Pavlich is well-positioned to comment about the evolution of the leadership group.

Back when Pavlich began his career, there was no leadership group.

"We had joint captains, Shaun McManus and Adrian Fletcher, and from memory there were one or two assistants," he said.

"The leadership group in a sense was Shaun and Adrian, and there were probably a couple of senior players who took charge at various stages throughout the year.

"It has changed quite a bit."

Pavlich said that leadership groups came into vogue around 2002 and 2003.

"They were still very much in the formation of it back then and I don't think it really started to have the cut through, not only here at Fremantle but at other clubs throughout the AFL, until around 2004, 5, and 6," he said.

"There were a few programs introduced that really started to engage the playing group a bit more, and the football club, to account to a set of behaviours and a real strong trademark."

Pavlich said how a typical week pans out for the

leadership group has changed slightly this year compared to the past.

"The weekly meetings we have are on a bit more of a needs basis, compared to having it scheduled in every week," he said.

And, unlike in the past, each member of the group does not have a set-role.

"It's more all encompassing and making sure that what we really value and how we want each player to behave, we hold them to account, and we do that well ourselves on and off the field."

Pavlich said, as captain, he had to ensure that the leadership group was at the forefront of moulding a virtuous club culture for generations to come.

"Other than modelling the best behaviours as best as I can and ensuring that I challenge my teammates to continually model that behaviour, I think it's really an opportunity for me to push the group that I sit with," he said.

"I have to ensure a really strong sense of leadership and behavioural standards are left behind."

AARON SANDILANDS – FIRST OFFICER

Fremantle no longer employs a vice-captain in its leadership model, but if there's a member of the leadership group who acts as a first officer to captain Matthew Pavlich, it's Aaron Sandilands.

"'Pav' is such a good leader, he does take most of the responsibility, but the rest of the leadership group is trying to become better as leaders and learn from him, because he's so

good at it," Sandilands said.

"We try and help him out as much as we can because there is a fair load on his shoulders."

Sandilands, who was the club's vicecaptain before this season, said he had enjoyed being in the leadership group.


But at 29-years-old, he was aware that he would one day have to take a step back and allow a younger player to take over.

"At some stage, the up and coming young guns will be in the leadership group and I'll be able to take a back seat," he said.

One of the players that Sandilands identified as a prime candidate for leadership in the future was Nathan Fyfe.

"He's been at the club a couple of years now and he's one of those players that, before getting injured, had been playing very consistently," he said.

"The next thing for him would be to step into the leadership group."



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MATT DE BOER – LEADERSHIP LESSONS LEARNT

Now in his second year as a member of the leadership group, Matt de Boer learnt an important lesson in his first season – that age is no excuse in the role.

"I wasn't there only to learn and to just go along with it," he said.

"I'm here to have an impact and represent the team as best I can.

"Being of the younger generation, and we've got a young list right now, I feel like I'm representing them."

De Boer also gave the aforementioned advice to the newest leadership group member, Hayden Ballantyne, at the start of this year.

The 22-year-old said the biggest challenge in the role was having the hard conversations with teammates.

"They are your friends, but you're supposed to hold them to account to the higher set of values that we set for ourselves," de Boer said.

"We don't take anything personally, but it's sometimes hard. "So you try and be demanding, without creeping into having a go at them

personally."

LUKE MCPHARLIN – LEADING BY EXAMPLE

If a footballer could be selected as an embodiment of a professional athlete being a role model, Luke McPharlin is a prime candidate.

A champion AFL defender, the 30-year-old has managed to balance his football career with a pharmacy degree, leading a music band and having a young family.

The father of two, who has been in the leadership group for seven of the past eight years, admitted that his lifestyle could be viewed as a form of leadership by example for his younger teammates and fans.

"While I'm very aware of all my deficiencies and faults, at times, you don't realise the influence you have around the place," he said.

"Given the fact that I have been around for a while, I must appreciate that younger players will look up to me as an example and I need to take that responsibility very seriously."

Coincidentally, the first single from McPharlin's latest album was titled 'Leaders'.

However, he said the song was more of a reflection on modern day leadership as a whole rather than his personal experiences in Freo's leadership group.

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"I've always been one to observe what's going on in the community and the idea behind the song was to look at what it takes to be an effective leader in the community," he said.

"I think for that to occur, there needs to be a strong connection between words and actions.

"Unfortunately, there's many examples in society where there is a disconnect between these two.

"There must be a strong connection between what you say and what you do."

DAVID MUNDY – THE DELEGATE

In terms of age and games played, David Mundy sits right in the middle of Fremantle's leadership group.

But he said that does not mean a whole lot in the group's process.

"When we all go into that leadership group meeting, we all speak with the one voice," he said.

Mundy and Matt de Boer are the leadership group's delegates to the AFL Players Association.

It's their job to relay any items of discussion from the leadership group to the AFLPA and vice-versa.

"We liaise with Ian Prendergast at the AFLPA quite often, and when an issue arises, we then take it back to the leadership group and discuss it, and then filter it out to the players," Mundy said.

"If we have any issues that require the AFLPA, they're generally brought up by the playing group and then the leadership group discusses it and we talk to lan."

For now, Mundy isn't harboring any thoughts of captaining Fremantle when Matthew Pavlich retires.

"It's not something I really think about, to be honest," he said.

"I just try and improve myself, first of all as a footballer, to give the team what it needs, and then as a leader, to help out after that."

HAYDEN BALLANTYNE – FIRST-YEAR LEADER

When Hayden Ballantyne arrived at Fremantle in 2008, he didn't envisage himself becoming a leader of the club. But in his fourth season, Ballantyne has been selected

as a member of the leadership group by his peers.

And he's brought with him some fresh new perspectives into the group.


"I think I've brought a lot of drive," Ballantyne said.

"I'm a pretty passionate kind of guy. I try to drive my teammates as much as I can, as well as myself."

A few months into his new role, Ballantyne said the biggest thing he'd learnt was the dedication required to be a successful leader.

> "You've got to put a lot of effort into not just your own game, but into the younger guys as well," he said. "I have to teach them the things I've learnt over the past few years and then try and work on my game as well." t



- "It was special to have such a big roar, but I tried as best I could to stay focussed on the game."

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
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Where have they docked? TONY MODRA

During Tony Modra's 165 AFL games, he kicked 588 goals and made his name as one of the most exciting high-flyers the game has ever seen. He joined Fremantle in 1999 and was a significant part of the club's first win at the MCG, where he booted a still-club record 10 goals. *Docker* caught up with the 43-year-old in his new home of Victor Harbor, South Australia.

What did you do after you retired from the AFL in 2001?

We actually hung around Perth for a couple of years and lived on a property down in Baldivis. Then I had a motor home and travelled around Australia for a year.

When did you move back to South Australia?

I moved to Victor Harbor a few years after I retired, after we had travelled around Australia for a year. We moved into a property that I had owned for over 20 years.

What do you do for a living at the moment?

I run my own 100 acre breeding property and I also cart livestock with my truck.

What do you find appealing about the lifestyle in Victor Harbor?

It's a good coastal community with a nice lifestyle on the sea. It was good to get back into the community spirit and play a bit of community cricket and football and things like that.

You play footy for Encounter Bay?

Yes. I actually played cricket to start with. They enticed me to play so it just went from there. The footy and cricket are played and trained at the same ground. I wasn't too keen to play footy again, but they enticed me to come down for cricket and it all went from there.

What do you like to do with your wife Erica, and children Hailey and Luke?

We like driving around and going to playgrounds. We go down to the beach and things like that. Luke is six-weeksold and Hailey is four-and-a-half-years. Is Hailey into AFL?

No, not at all. She just likes going to kindergarten.

What was the highlight of your time at the Fremantle Dockers?

Winning our first Western Derby. Winning that for the first time for the Fremantle Football Club was a big highlight.


What do you miss about WA?

So it wouldn't surprise me if there will be a few players this year who will kick double figures. I think it will all depend if the coaches leave the players in the same position for the entire game, because they like to change it up a fair bit these days. ‡




